INDIA PRINCESS EXILED FOR DANCE

New York, Feb. 10.—Having offended the people of her own caste by doing a dance of the temple before the white race of another nation Princess Sita Devi, an East Indian of the purple and the daughter of a rajah, is in New York a refugee. She sat in a room at No. 238 West Forty-Fourth street yesterday and told her story. About her neck she wore a chain of gold pieces, given her by her father and covering her was a red and darkly shaded costume folded about her in a loose but picturesque fashion. At her feet lay a pet python, who now and then lifted its head to be petted.

"But our happiness was to end," said the princess. "The tattooing between the eyebrows, which marks every girl of the temple, disclosed my identity. My people deserted me and I was followed everywhere by men who watched and sometimes threatened. Finally, desperate I went back home, where one night at the home of the Postmaster-General's assistant I did one of the dances. Some of the servants told it, I was almost driven from the city. So I fled to America."

After leaving Bengal the princess went to Calcutta, where she met Dr. Butt, a surgeon-general of the English army. They were married. Most of the five years of their life they spent on the continent.

The Princess attended the meeting of the Federation of Women's Clubs at the Astor yesterday and was the object of much interest.

DOUBLE FATALITY AT MONTREAL FIRE

Montreal, Feb. 13.—An overheated stove pipe caused a fire this morning which had fatal results. The blaze took place at a boarding house kept by Joseph Phillips, aged seventy, who with one of his boarders, Michael McMahon, aged forty-seven, lost their lives.

John Quinlan, who, fortunately, had retired to rest fully dressed, was almost suffocated when he awoke to find the house in flames. The heat was so intense and the smoke so thick, that Quinlan made a hurried escape, through one of the windows on the stairway, and raised an alarm. Quinlan's face and hands were badly burned.

When the brigade arrived the fire was quickly extinguished. Groping their way through the house, the firemen discovered the dead bodies of Phillips and McMahon and also the body of Mrs. Phillips, aged seventy, who was lying unconscious on the dining-room floor. She was taken to the general hospital, where tonight her condition is considered serious.

MEDUCTIC RESIDENTS WANT NO DELAY

Meductic, N. B., Feb. 13.—At a meeting of the Meductic board of trade which took place here yesterday afternoon it was decided to enter a protest to the provincial government against granting an extension of time to the St. John Valley Railway Company for the commencement and completion of the said railway. The following resolution to this effect was drawn up and adopted.

Whereas, the St. John Valley Railway Company at the session of the New Brunswick legislature, 1909, secured a charter to construct a line of railway along the St. John Valley, work of construction to begin not later than April 26, 1911; and

Whereas, the said company have applied for an extension for time for the commencement and completion of said railway, and

Whereas, we believe an extension of time will be detrimental to the interests of the St. John Valley, causing further delay in this much needed and long delayed project;

Resolved, that this board of trade protest against the government granting an extension of time to the above named company, but pursue a policy that will ensure railway facilities to the residents of the St. John Valley at the earliest possible moment.

HON GEO. E. FOSTER ON RECIPROCITY

(The University Magazine, Dec. 1910)

"Would you then veto all attempts to improve trade relations between Canada and the United States? By no means. My aim has been to make clear to readers the Canadian view as I hold it, and as I believe it is held by the majority of our people. If there are no illusions there will be fewer errors. Granted that you fully realize that we are bent on developing a nationality absolutely independent of you politically, on main raising as a means thereto a fiscal system under which we may develop to the utmost our industries and our resources for our own strengthening and upbuilding, and that no scheme of reciprocity which interferes there with is desirable, that understood, we welcome the fullest trade and intercourse consistent therewith. We owe you much, we admire your enterprise and your wonderful growth, and sympathize with efforts you are making to growth rightly and develop the best forces of a great democracy. We convert your virtues and try to avoid your faults, individual municipal and national. If we can make easier channels for trade between the two countries, consistently with the above conditions, we will be glad to co-operate. Mean while as a neighborly beginning could you not give our products tariff entrance to your market at the same rates which we accord to your in our market? You are bigger, older, richer, more skilled, and more populous. What competition should you fear on a basis of equivalent tariffs? If you were to do this it would be an earnest of good feeling and might dispose us to further converse."
