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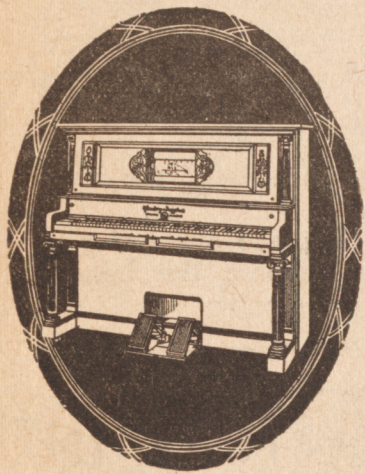

**MEXICANS USING  
ARMORED TRAINS**

El Paso, Tex., Feb. 13.—The Mexican revolutionists may be transformed into a war on wheels. An armored train consisting of freight cars fortified by having stripes of steel nailed over the outside and interior of the cars, is en route northward somewhere south of the city of Chihuahua and others are being constructed to be sent into the northern part of Chihuahua.

It is the plan of the government to keep fortified trains filled with soldiers moving over all the railroad lines in North Chihuahua.

**RECIPROCITY WOULD  
HELP LUMBERMEN**

Ald. J. A. Likely of Montreal gives his views on reciprocity to The Montreal Herald as follows:

Our one important export market for deals is in Great Britain and for scantling, laths and shingles in the United States. I do not think there is a sufficient demand for our deals across the border to make itself felt to any great extent even if the duty is removed. It would, undoubtedly, be a great advantage to the producer and shipper of the lines that they are taking from us now and everyone connected with the business would feel the benefit. I was in business when the last reciprocity treaty was in effect and we found it a great help to us. It is almost impossible to compare conditions then with the present however, as lumber was much more plentiful and much cheaper then. The market was easily glutted and prices fluctuated greatly. Now that lumber is more scarce the markets are steadier. I am convinced that reciprocity would be of great benefit to our proximity to those who help to build up the agriculture of the province. The consumers might feel the effects of the change in some respects as the people of St. John have since the city became the winter port of Canada. Since then we have had to pay double for our poultry, eggs and butter owing to the fact that steamers taking away large supplies have run the price up. The producers benefit but the consumers have to pay.

John E. Moore, of John E. Moore & Co., lumber merchants:

"There is no doubt whatever that reciprocity with the United States would be a very great boon to the lumber industry of the province. It is natural that our nearest market should be the best, but under the present tariff we cannot reap the full benefit of our proximity to those who want our lumber. We have had to depend on the British markets, but that trade is growing more unprofitable each year, owing to the competition of Russian lumber which is produced by and which has an advantage of almost twenty shillings per standard in freight rates. With a handicap like that it is hard for us to make any money on the English market. The Americans need our lumber and if the duty were removed it would be an immense advantage to our lumber industry. The increased cut would give more work to our men and more business to our merchants. It would increase the revenue of the province from the crown lands and would enhance the value of all timber limits. We would not have the full amount of the present duty added to our profits at once, but I think the tendency would be in that direction. Increased transportation facilities would be required, and the province would reap the benefit of the stimulus to the shipping. If we could have lime placed on the free list also it would be a gain of almost more importance. We have a supply that is practically inexhaustible and with free trade in that product, all the idle lime kilns along the river would be set at work again. There is no fear of depleting our supply and the trade would be a very large source of income to the province."

**WAR BETWEEN  
NEGROES AND WHITES**

Boston, Mass., Feb. 13. Prediction of a world-wide war between negroes and whites, made in an address here last night by Prof. Wm. E. Dubois of Atlanta University, a colored educator, caused widespread discussion here today. Prof. Dubois said in part:

"The race problem is the most important question that confronts the world today. Unless it is solved in the humane way by raising the standards of our common humanity, and by making it possible for men to live among us regardless of color, caste or position, this world-wide question will be settled in blood-shed, for the white man is the negroes' hereditary enemy."
