## SENSATIONAL EVIDENCE

(Continued from page one.)

Cornwall, Ont., Oct. 25.—The McRae murder case occupied the assizes before Justice Sutherland today.

The first witness called was Dr. Magee, of Carp, Ont., who made two expeditions to the McRae home last summer in search of his child, who had been taken there by his wife when she fled from him owing to domestic quarrels.

It was on the second of these visits that the alleged murder took place, William Shaw, a young friend, who accompanied Magee, being shot as the party were leaving the McRae home, after being turned away by D. C. McRae, the proprietor, and F. D. McRae, his brother, who is accused of the shooting.

Dr. Magee, in cross examination, testified that he had not treated his wife well, she having been a Roman Catholic prior to marriage and he a Methodist.

He grasped her by the hair on one occasion. He knocked her down and roughly used her when she refused to attend a Methodist social shortly after her confinement. He had also written to her, calling her a "Papist B—"

Other witnesses examined were D. C. McRae and Constable Uren. D. C. McRae told briefly of the second visit of Dr. Magee and his friends on July 1st. On this occasion Mrs. Magee and the child hid in a field and Dr. Magee, in his search, was near the place, when he seized an old shot gun and drove him away with this. The hired man, Rosser, also threatened the visitors with his gun. Dr. Magee rejoined his friends on seeing fire arms and they re-embarked in the automobile in which they had arrived.

F. D. McRae was near the witness at the time.

Witness testified that suddenly, as the party were leaving, he heard a shot, but did not see it fired. He did not know till the next day that anyone was injured.

Constable Uren, who accompanied Magee, swore that he was in the automobile with the party when the shot was fired and that it was F. D. McRae who fired. McRae had run down the road, dropped on his knees and apparently aiming at Magee, cried: "You Protestant B—," and pulled the trigger. The bullet struck Shaw, who died six days later.

Uren claimed that he had no papers to permit a search of the premises but said he had arranged with Dr. Magee to accompany him to see that no one interfered with him in his search.

The case continues tomorrow.

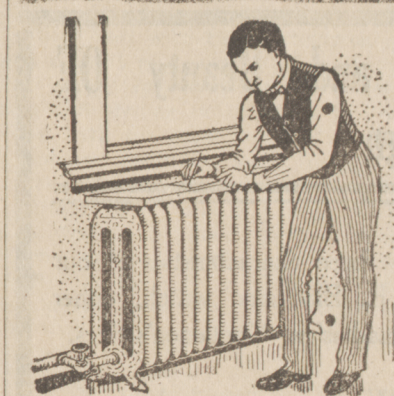

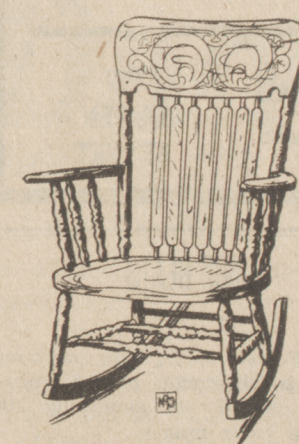
