## PUBLIC UTILITIES.

The monthly meeting of the New Brunswick Public Utilities Commission was held yesterday afternoon in the provincial government rooms, St. John. Colonel D. McLeod Vince, of Woodstock, presided and there were present Commissioners G. O. D. Otty of St. John, and O. W. Melanson of Shediac, and the secretary, Fred P. Robinson of Fredericton. The session was a brief one, only routine business being before the board.

## GROSSLY EXAGGERATED

The report which gained circulation yesterday to the effect that the city's electric lighting plant on Carleton street had been so seriously damaged as to prevent the lighting of the streets was grossly exaggerated. Early yesterday morning the cylinder head of the old Wheelock engine blew out just as it did about two months ago the engine carrying a heavier load than should have been put upon it. Repairs will be made shortly. Last night the street lights were put in commission at the usual hour the new engine at the power-house after some readjustment being used to furnish the power. An expert of the Canada General Electric Company who was reported to be on his way to make the necessary repairs at the power-house turns out to be a commercial traveller of that company who makes regular trips to Fredericton to sell supplies.

"BOY PROBLEM"  
SERIOUS QUESTION  
IN CITY SCHOOLS

Trustees Recognize Need of Reformatory--Regent Street School Wins One of Strathcona's Prizes

At the regular meeting of the School Trustees, held yesterday afternoon, Dr. Atherton presided, and the other members present were Mrs. Clark, Mr. Sterling, Mr. Weddall, Mr. Spurden and Secretary Sampson. Considerable business was disposed of.

## REFORMATORY NEEDED.

In the report of the secretary, the temporary absence of some of the teachers from duty was referred to, and the disposal of some truant scholars was treated by Truant Officer Roberts. The boy problem is still in the forefront and the secretary admits that the children in attendance at the schools would be benefitted if three or four outland lads were kept out of school altogether until the authorities are able to place them in a reformatory.

A number of new maps were recently purchased for the High School and its apparatus is being fairly well maintained in view of the constant strain upon the board's finances.

## TO VISIT BOSTON SCHOOLS.

Prof. Harrison, the musical instructor in the city schools, is understood to be making good progress in his work and today all the pupils in the public schools are receiving the benefit of his instruction. He will shortly visit the schools of Boston, and probably will bring back a few more "wrinkles" from that cultured centre.

## REGENT SCHOOL SCHOOL FIRST.

Regent Street School has led the city in the competition for the prize offered by Lord Strathcona to the schools in York County for proficiency in physical exercises. It is presumed Inspector Hanson discovered the best school in some suburban district, for the prize awarded to Principal Hughes' school was of the second denomination. The principal and Secretary Sampson will decide upon a trophy to be purchased with the cash award.

## IMPROVEMENTS MADE.

Upon the recommendation of the committee, it decided to defer repairs to fences at the Charlotte Street School until next spring. A new furnace will at once be installed and the secretary will have necessary repairs made upon the building.

Electric lights were recently installed in the office and hallways of the High School building, and this will prove a great convenience. A small additional grant was made to the excellent library at present connected with that school.

Many matters of a routine character engaged the attention of the trustees, and after ordering the payment of a number of accounts and the teachers' salaries, the board adjourned.

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HERBERT MALONE  
CRUSHED TO DEATH  
AT CHATHAM JCT.

Brakeman on Wayfreight Caught Between Drawbeams of Cars--Survived by Widow

Herbert Malone of this city, an employe of the Intercolonial Railway of Canada, was crushed to death early this morning at Chatham Junction, being caught between the drawbeams of two freight cars. News of the fatality reached the city shortly after it occurred and caused widespread expression of regret as the deceased was a well-known and popular young man. Stories of the accident which were received at first were conflicting, but a despatch received about noon stated that Coroner Benson had viewed the remains and that an inquest was unnecessary. The body was brought on the train on which the deceased had been working to Cross Creek and from that place was taken to Stanley, where his parents reside.

## WAS SHUNTING CARS.

Malone was brakeman on the wayfreight, which was bound for this city at Chatham Junction the train-crew shunted some cars. Driver Cameron of the wayfreight, saw the brakeman go between two cars to make a coupling and was surprised at the length of time it took. Becoming alarmed, he left his cab and went to the place where he had last seen Malone. He was shocked to find the brakeman lying dead beneath a car with his hips horribly crushed. No one saw the accident, but it is certain that Malone was caught between the drawbeams of the two cars. Death occurred instantly.

## SURVIVED BY WIDOW.

The deceased was twenty-eight years of age, and leaves a widow, formerly Miss Lottie Hayes of Chatham, who resides on Charlotte street. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Malone of Stanley, and is survived by his parents, two brothers, Jean and Leo of Stanley, and another, James of Cut Bank, Montana. He had been a conductor on the York & Carleton Railway before entering the service of the Intercolonial. He was very popular with his fellow-employees and also with the travelling public. His relatives feel keenly their bereavement, the widow being particularly affected when the news of the accident was broken to her by Rev. Father Howland.

JUDGE WILSON  
REFUSES RECOUNT IN  
SUNBURY-QUEEN'S

Judgment Given this Morning Set Aside one Objection and Sustained Two Others

Judge Wilson in chambers this morning delivered judgment in regard to the objections made by the Counsel for Col. McLean against his ordering a recount in the Sunbury-Queens elections. Two of the three objections were sustained by the judgment and one was over-ruled. His Honor decided against a recount and Col. McLean is elected except in the case of an appeal to a Supreme Court judge and the sustaining of such an appeal, as far as is known it is unlikely that such an appeal will be made particularly in view of the decision of His Honor Judge McLeod against a recount in Carleton County.

This morning's proceedings which were not largely attended, took place in Judge Wilson's chambers at the Parliament Building. Mr. R. B. Hanson appeared as legal representative of Mr. L. B. Smith the Conservative Candidate and Mr. F. H. Peters as the representative of Col. McLean the Liberal candidate. Returning Officer Dykeman and Sheriff Holden the deputy returning officer were both present. There was also a few interested spectators.

## LENGTHY JUDGMENT

His Honor's judgment was lengthy containing a large number of references and citations. It was delivered at eleven o'clock.

His Honor referred to the application made for a recount which came before him in the way of a petition presented by Luther Smith. His Honor made an order for a recount at Gagetown afterward adjourned to Fredericton the case coming up last Friday.

## OBJECTIONS RAISED

Three objections were made to the applications.
