YORK COUNTY COUNCILLORS ENJOYING THEMSELVES

(Continued from page one)

SCOTT ACT COMMITTEE.

The report of the Canada Temperance Act committee was presented by the chairman, Coun. Smith, and read by the secretary, Coun. Reynolds. The report showed that \$500 had been collected in fines with outstanding fines, in addition. Fifteen convictions had been obtained at a cost of \$100.20. It was recommended that a cheque for the amount issue in favor of the inspector. Of the fines \$400 had been paid by the police magistrate, and \$100 was still in his hands. A substantial balance in favor of the committee was the result of the year's work.

On the motion of Coun. Sterling, the report was adopted.

COUN. SLOAT'S INQUIRIES.

Coun. Sloat inquired why the county valuation had been raised on the eve of the payment of the last debt against the county, also what right telephone companies had to set poles so close to highways as to interfere with the operation of road-machines.

Coun. Colter stated that he had prepared a resolution dealing with the telephone pole nuisance.

Secretary Bliss stated that telephone companies had no right to interfere with highways by the placing of poles or otherwise. With regard to the inquiry concerning the increase in valuation Secretary Bliss said that an effort had been made to make wealthy property-owners pay their proper proportion of taxation. He congratulated Coun. Sterling and Coun. Colter on the results obtained from their efforts in connection with the re-organization of the valuation. It should be remembered that increase in valuation meant decrease in rate of taxation.

Coun. Reynolds spoke along similar lines.

Coun. Robt. Graham mentioned an instance of the N. B. Telephone Company shifting poles when requested to do so by the highway commissioner.

INCREASED VALUATION.

Coun. Colter said that increased valuation meant practically no increase in taxation but there was one important exception as the road tax was fixed by law at 20 cents, on each \$100 valuation. It was possible to

avoid that by taking a full valuation of property and a certain proportion of that for assessment. However, he thought not too much money was being spent on the roads and was desirous of seeing the law with regard to valuation properly enforced.

Coun. Fred Pond asked how many parishes had really increased their assessment as a result of the circulation of the resolution passed. He also wished it to be noted that the Scott Act fund was self-sustaining and had been for years. The impression was abroad in the county that Inspector McFarlane was being paid out of county taxes. That was not correct. There was a surplus in the fund.

Coun. Carson remarked on the fact that the surplus had been decreasing.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED.

Coun. Colter introduced and moved the adoption of a resolution calling upon the chief commissioner to take steps to prevent telegraph and telephone companies from placing poles so close to the travelled portion of the highways as to interfere with their maintenance.

Coun. Morrison seconded the resolution which was passed.

Coun. Colter also moved a resolution calling upon the acting attorney general, Hon. H. F. McLeod, to take steps to prevent the C.P.R. from encroaching upon the highways of the Parish of Douglas when replacing fences. The resolution was seconded by Coun. Fred Pond and passed.

On the motion of Coun. Sterling, seconded by Coun. C. W. Pond, a cheque for \$300 was ordered to issue in favor of the highway commissioners of the Parish of Stanley.

An invitation to the warden and councillors to attend the ball game at Scully's Grove tomorrow was passed unanimously.

On the motion of Coun. Reynolds, it was decided to pass a by-law prohibiting the running at large of cattle on the highways of District B, Parish of Bright.

On motion a vote of thanks was extended to the warden and the county secretary for the entertainment of the preceding evening. A similar vote was passed to the gentlemen who permitted the councillors to use their motor-cars yesterday.

The council then adjourned until this afternoon.

ANOTHER LINCOLN MEMORIAL

Washington, D. C., July 5—A huge boulder, bearing a descriptive tablet of bronze, is to be unveiled next week to the memory of Abraham Lincoln on the spot where he stood at the battle of Port Stevens, in which memorable engagement the President played a conspicuous part. The memorial project is the work of the Port Stevens Lincoln Park Association.

SUNDAY SCHOOL OF METHODS

Asbury Park, N. J., July 5—The annual school of methods of the New Jersey Sunday School Association met here today and will remain in session for one week. The materials of religious education, worship in Sunday Schools, the relation of the home to religious education, and the issues of the recent Sunday School convention in San Francisco are among the subjects slated for consideration.

DRAGOONS SHOW UP WELL AT SUSSEX

Sussex, N.B., July 4—The second camp for this year opened today with a scorching sun, and officers and men of the different regiments did their work with streamy faces.

All the regiments are in camp tonight. There are in the vicinity of 1000 men under canvas far in excess of what was expected, as it was felt that during the camp was going to have the effect of greatly reducing the attendance.

Nearly all the regiments are up to full strength. The addition this year of the 28th New Brunswick Dragoons greatly helps out the camp. Their bright looking uniforms and soldierly appearance is quite noticeable and they are receiving very favorable comment.

The 74th Regiment have been supplied this year with new uniforms, which add very much to the men's appearance. It is conceded that the camp has the smartest looking men and the best horses which have attended camp Sussex for years.

The regiments in camp are, besides the camp headquarters, the 8th Hussars, 28th N.B. Dragoons, 73rd, 74th, 9th Field Ambulance from P. E. I.; detachment of the 8th Field Ambulance from St. John; Hospital Corps, Halifax; R. C. R. and Army Service Corps, St. John.

The regiments are occupying their old grounds with the exception of the Army Medical Corps from St. John, who are this year up near the staff lines. The 28th N.B. Dragoons are encamped on the hill close to the Army Service Corps.

The large flat near the railway has been divided for drill purposes between the Dragoons and the 8th Hussars, the Dragoons taking all above the siding, while all below has been assigned to the Hussars.

Tomorrow muster parade will be held and the shooting will start tomorrow afternoon.
