## INTERESTING NOTES ON FADS AND FASHIONS

New York, July 3.—It cannot be denied that the one-piece linen frock is extremely popular this summer as is the one-piece tub frock of any and every material, and it will form the cornerstone and foundation of the average girl's summer outfit this year. The manufacturers have made great improvements in the linens and they remain fresh much longer than they used to and are so soft that they can be easily laundered.

The colorings in the linens are lovelier and more varied than ever before and the fashionable shops display a large variety of the hand-some models of such one-piece linen frocks. Most of them are made with admirable simplicity, which is a great advantage when it comes to laundering.

Little boleros are very chic this season. They are slightly full, and many are edged with ruffles and frills of silk. They are cut low and fastened at the waist line, and are cool and lovely. Pale pinks, blues, greens and lavenders are much in evidence for these short jackets over the frocks. The striped "coatees" are very effective with the plain goods, the plain with the figured.

Deep revers and sailor collars are pretty finishes for these coats. The simple ruffle of chiffon or net is also good, while hand embroidery or beadwork, always is the distinctive touch that a needlewoman can give. These little jackets are in most cases sleeveless and are seamless on the shoulder.

Because the bolero is so much in fashion among the exclusives, the bodices are now made with a wide tuck in them, put above the edge of a short bolero jacket just reaching the top of the Princess skirt. Sometimes the tuck is made of the material of the skirt if the bolero is of another fabric. Again it is made of the same stuff that trims the skirt.

All the new laces that have a heavy raised design on a net foundation are now called repoussé. There is a wide demand for this sort of lace work, although it differs from filet and the ecclesiastical laces that are also in favor. There never was a season like this one for lace, anyway. Whole rooms are given over to it in some of the big shops, and machine-made and hand-made kinds lie with each other in beauty and dignity.

Almost every kind of lace the world

has ever known has been revived. No gown or simple coat seems complete without the addition of some pattern. The huge Revolutionary revers are made of marvelous meshes, sailor collars are cut from pieces of square lace that have figures of all sorts woven in the net, and stocks and chemisettes are made from fine French laces that have been revived this summer.

Almost entire corsages are made of coarse imitation Venice lace, from which hangs a long draped skirt of crepe de chene. There is a great tendency too, to outline these coarse laces with a thread of gold and silver, and sometimes an edging of Valenciennes. In fact lace is the craze of the moment.

Tailored costumes of soft white serge or camel's hair are trimmed with many rows of machine stitchings in a design of arrow heads. White serge coats are also trimmed with tabac brown linen nearly as coarse as baggins.

Shot taffeta and striped silks are the popular fabrics for the dressy tailor-made costumes and for summer wear white is used either in the stripe or the body of the material. With the all-white silk serge costumes white crochet or Venice lace over collars on black chiffon are worn. Indigo blue and white with large white revers of mousseline, crepe satin or moire and even of white suede is popular. Sometimes the revers form a part of a deep sailor collar of plain satin inlaid with white Venice lace, and having an overlapping hem of the plain satin.

An effective suit is developed in white linen of a coarse weave. The skirt is high waisted and the jacket is short without being extreme. The broad roll collar is of linen in a fine black and white stripe, arranged on the bias and edged with narrow white novelty braid. The jacket seams are finished with this braid, and near the base of each is inserted a pointed piece of black and white material trimmed with pearl buttons. A similar arrangement is carried out along the skirt hem and on the outer side of the sleeves as well. Black satin ties are fastened under each side of the collar to form a sailor's knot at the front. Sleeves are made rather wide and short and the trimmings of the jackets are mostly Breton.

## NEW MINISTERS FOR N. S. GOVERNMENT

Halifax, N.S., July 4.—Vacancies in the Murray government consequent on the changes caused by the general elections, have been filled by the appointment of Hon. George E. Faulkner, M.L.A., for Halifax, R. M. McGregor, M.L.A. for Pictou, and J. W. Comeau, M.L.A. for Digby, as members of the executive council without portfolio.

Mr. Faulkner, who was speaker at the last House, succeeds Hon. David MacPherson, of Halifax, who did not seek re-election. Mr. McGregor takes the place of Hon. B. F. Pearson, who was defeated in Colchester, and Mr. Comeau that of Hon. H. S. Leblanc, who was defeated in Yarmouth.

It is expected that a seat will be vacated for Hon. C. P. Chisholm, who was defeated in Antigonish, this enabling him to continue to hold his portfolio as commissioner of works and mines.

## IRISH M. P.'S AND CORONATION CEREMONIES

London, July 4.—The Irish Independent printed a circumstantial account of a meeting of the Irish Nationalist party, which had been held to discuss the question of non-attendance at the coronation.

It is said that John Redmond, the leader of the party, made an impressive speech, in which he urged that the Irish members of parliament should take official part as a party in the coronation festivities, as he claimed it would be of untold benefit to the cause of Home Rule among English constituencies and the House of Commons. John Dillon, W. H. Redmond and others opposed this and a show of hands gave 29 votes in favor of attending and 33 against.
