**FRANK BOUTILIER**  
BOUGHT GOOD ONE  
AT NEW YORK

Got Trotting Stallion Benares Half-Brother of Kushan--Bred by Russell Farm, Springfield

(Acadian Recorder)  
Frank Boutillier who has been attending the New York horse sale, purchased the richly bred trotting stallion Benares, 41,817, record 2.31, a half-brother of Kushan, 2.18½. Benares is by the same sire as Baring, Bingara, and his dam is Rusalka, by (in fact, 2.26½ son of Electioneer and Rosina own sister of Nutwood, 2.18½. Benares is a bay stallion 15.1 hands bred by Russell Farm, Springfield, foaled 1905 and sold as a youngster to J. P. Warren, Townsend, Va. He was worked a little as a colt and in his only race took a record of 2.31 over a slow track. He has shown a trial in 2.21½ and a quarter in 2.34 seconds. His owner in his sale announcement says that if this horse is properly trained he feels sure the purchaser will draw a prize.

**"MOONEY" GIBSON DOES  
SOME GREAT FARMING**

London, Nov. 30--Geo. "Mooney" Gibson who was once a catcher for the Montreal baseball team, was in town yesterday and purchased some heavy harness for his team of general purpose horses, and baseball fans of this city should not be surprised when they see the big Pittsburgh catcher driving into the city with a load of hay any time within the next few weeks.  
"Mooney" has about thirty tons of hay on his farm at Delaware that he has disposed of in the city and daily visits to London will be in order for some time.  
His work on the farm will do much in getting him in shape for the coming season with the Pirates. George says that Pittsburgh will be right in the fight for the National League pennant next year and from the showing they made at the close of the present season one cannot but side with "Mooney's" opinion. The Pirates at the present time have not many of the original players who won the world's series in 1909. "Mooney" being one of the few.

**STOVALL EXPECTED TO  
DO SOMETHING WITH BROWNS**

Col. Hedges Decision to Retain Stovall's Services is Approved--That Manager has had Good Record--Raised Cleveland Naps Out of Rut in 1910 and Also Did Well With St. Louis

(Brooklyn Eagle)  
President Robert E. Hedges of the St. Louis Americans comes out flat-footed with the announcement that he is going to keep George Stovall as manager of his team next year, no matter how much other material may be on the market. Col. Hedges has not astonished the world by the profundity of his baseball wisdom in the past few years and he is to be congratulated upon his decision in regard to Stovall. All he needs to do now is to spend some real money for performers and his Browns may cease to be a joke. Col. Hedges admits that he tried hard to land Roger Bresnahan, but only as a catcher. His idea was that Roger would not only be a useful hireling behind the bat but that he would be an attraction at the gate. That was a fairly brilliant but ill-digested scheme, for if Roger had gone to the Browns in the same town where he had made a good record with the Cardinals, even if Mrs. Britton was unable to appreciate that fact, it is a cinch that Roger would not have been satisfied to have worked under Stovall. It would not have been because Roger was a mean disposition but because he was a human being and a ball player. Stovall will bear watching. In the matter of producing results we do not see that a single manager in the major league, Clark Griffith and his sensational Washington Nationals to the contrary notwithstanding, has caught on George. He took the Cleveland Naps in the early part of 1910 when they were giving a perfect imitation of dead bones that never would rise again, and raised them from a rut to the first division, finishing third. He was traded to St. Louis because Harry Davis has been engaged as manager of the Naps before Stovall made good, played there for a while, and in the middle of last season was made manager. With the same old material which had made the Browns a laughing stock and with some new blood acquired at small expense, he boosted the Browns out of last place and had them playing better ball at the end of the campaign than they had shown for three or four years. In his Cleveland and St. Louis careers, Stovall created the impression that he started those two teams to winning by his own ability as a field director and handler of men. Considering the stock he had on hand we stoutly maintain that Stovall ranks away up with the very best managers extant, and Col. Hedges was lucky not to have been able to create an awkward situation by getting Bresnahan.

**DOUBLE DECKED RINK  
BUILT AT BRANTFORD**

Brantford, Nov. 30--The building of a new rink here with two floors exclusively given to hockey and skating will furnish a great impetus to Brantford's O.H.A. teams this year. Brantford is regarded as a strong contender in the series with London, Woodstock, Paris and Ingersoll.  
With one floor of the new arena devoted exclusively to O.H.A. and City League hockey, it is anticipated that this city is due for the development of real strength. The new rink is being built by John Tench, formerly of Teeswater. It is of concrete and reinforced steel construction. The entrance will lead into the hockey arena, where seating arrangements will be provided for 1,500 people. Below will be the skating arena, this being made possible by the location of the arena on the steep bank overlooking the canal basin.  
It is not expected that the rink will be finished until well on in January, owing to an accident in the construction, when four large wooden arches in the interior slipped from the cables with which they were fastened and fell.

**CHARGE OF FRAUD  
MADE AGAINST KILBANE**

Johnston, Pa., Dec. 3--Information charging conspiracy and fraud was made here tonight against Johnny Kilbane, champion featherweight boxer of the world; his manager, Jimmy Dunn; Tommy McGinty, sparring partner, and M. J. Barry, a promoter. It is alleged that at a boxing bout here October 29 Kilbane fought McGinty, when it was believed that he was fighting Tommy Dugan of San Francisco.

Buffalo, N.Y., Dec. 3--Jess Willard, the Kansas cowboy boxer, who recently won over Luther McCarthy in New York, knocked out Sailor White of Brooklyn, in one round here tonight. White was out for five minutes.

TODD FROM SALE**

Brown Trotting Stallion Bred by S. W. Parklin of Boston--210 Mark Prophesied for Him

Hammond Kelly, the well known Charlottetown horseman purchased at the New York horse sale the brown stallion Mayor Todd, 47893, trial at four years old 2.18, last half 1.07 by Todd 2.14½ out of Alcayetta, 2.26½, trotter foaled 1908, bred by W. S. Parklin, Boston, Mass.  
Mayor Todd is a handsome brown stallion and was trained this season on the Johnson Farm track and has worked a mile in 2.18, last half in 1.08. It is believed by his former owner that Mayor Todd will make a 2.10 trotter and is sure to be an excellent stock horse.

New York, Nov. 30--A number of race horses brought high prices at the continuation of the eighteenth annual Old Glory sale. Dave Hallie, a 2.06½ champion four-year-old trotter of 1912 was sold by Abe H. Frank of Memphis, Tenn., to J. W. Armstrong of this city for \$6,000. Mundry C., 2.23½ was sold by S. J. Fleming & Son, Terre Haute, Ind., to T. W. Murphy, Poughkeepsie, N.Y., for \$4,400. Gay Audubon, stallion trotter, 2.06½ was sold by J. Y. Latcomb, Concord, N.H., to Walter N. Cox, Dover, N.H., \$7,000. The sales totalled \$107,400 for 121 horses.

## CHURCHES IN LOCAL POLITICS

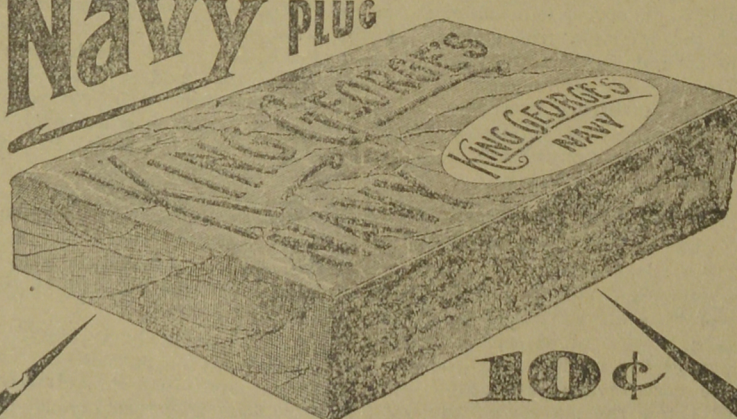
