For instance, he might solicit candidates for the Truro Agricultural College. It was a little short of disgraceful that only eighteen students from New Brunswick attended last year.

Prof. Cumming concurred in Mr. Schofield's idea that milk-testing was the proper means of putting dairying on a paying basis. That fact had al ready been established in many countries. While he approved of much that Mr. Schofield said, he did not think that at the present time the bonus scheme would be practical. Mr. A. J. Jensen did not think
