FREDERICTON OUTPLAYED SUSSEX IN FIRST HALF AND THEN LET UP

Local Team Won 5 to 3--Sussex not Used to Big Rink--Duncan made Spectacular Play--All Fredericton Forwards Scored--Sussex will play Marysville Tonight

Fredericton won from Sussex, 5 to 3, last night. The score was 5 to 1 early in the second half and would have been more one-sided if the local team had not got careless. The heavy penalizing of Referee Staples was also responsible to some extent for the poor showing of Fredericton in the second half.

The visitors were lost on the big ice surface of the Arctic Rink, and had hardly got acquainted with it when the game ended. They should do better tonight when they go up against Marysville. Sussex forward played a fair combination. The defence has a good man in Smiley at goal, who put up one of the best games seen here this year. Fenwick and Eveleigh interchanged places at cover and point. Eveleigh did nothing out of the ordinary, but Fenwick had a fine assortment of slashes, etc., that he used continually. Leclair and White were the pick of the forward line.

The Fredericton team was not that which had been expected to line up. Jack Peeney was still too sick to play and Archie Babbitt also stayed out of the game on account of illness. He was present at the rink, however. George Walker, although suffering from a bruised shoulder, went on and put up a good game at cover point, although not used to the position. "Tart" Titus in the net, put up his usual good game, although placed at a disadvantage by the shifts that had been made in the line-up. Sterling at point, played a steady game marked by numerous dashes up the ice. His old tendency to scrap kept him off the ice however, when he was needed on the ice.

The local forwards played in first-class style the first half. Bill Duncan pulled off the play of the season when he made a spectacular dash from his own end, through the Sussex team, and scored. Rowan electrified the crowd by scoring and also by being penalized twice. It was the first time he fell from grace this year. The game was unique in the fact that every Fredericton forward scored. Duncan tallied two goals and McLean did the same, although the goal-judge did not see the second.

THE GAME

Play went to the Sussex end at once and Duncan slapped the disc in from a mix-up.

From the face-off Sussex rushed matters but Titus saved. Walker ran the length of the ice but Smiley spoiled his shot. Sussex brightened up. Sterling got away on a long rush, Galloway missed a chance to score and Smiley saved in good style when Sterling shot. Mace got away on a rush but Walker stopped him. Fredericton's forwards were playing together well but over-ran the puck and were off on shooting. Duncan was playing a good game. Sussex got away and finally hit score.

PLAY GETS LIVELY

Fredericton then got busy and Galloway scored when Duncan passed to him from behind the Sussex net.

Sussex put Fredericton on the defensive and kept them busy. Sterling got 2 minutes for slashing. A man short, Fredericton kept play at Sussex's end. Duncan tripped Mace and went off just as Sterling went off. Play stayed at the visitors end. Walker ran down, but Smiley made a corking stop.

THE PLAY OF THE GAME

Duncan finally got the rubber behind his own net and rushing down on Rowan's side of the rink scored dodging through forwards and defence. Everleigh tripped and got a rest for 5 minutes.

Rowan bored in on the net and scored in half a minute. Immediately afterward Rowan was penalized for tripping, earning his first penalty of the season.

SECOND HALF

Fredericton rushed the play to the Sussex goal and in the mix-up the net was displaced. McLean tried a shot but was too far out. Galloway tried to score when the puck rebounded from Smiley's pads, but failed. Play stayed at the Sussex end. There was a mix-up. Smiley kicked the disc out again and again, but McLean finally tallied. That ended Fredericton's scoring.

During the rest of the game Sussex kept the locals on the "anxious seat" and the Fredericton team went to pieces to a large extent. Heavy penalties were one cause of this. Sandy Staples having Fredericton playing with only five men more than once.

ROWAN HURT

Sterling hooked Fenwick's feet from beneath him and went off for three minutes. Rowan got mixed up with Mace behind the Sussex net and cut his face on the boards, but was able to continue playing. White rushed and Leclair scored the Sussex goal on his pass in front of the net.

McLean was put off for an illegal check. A man short Fredericton was kept on the defensive. Walker broke a skate and there was a halt in the proceedings.

Walker banged Fenwick into the boards hard, Fredericton although with a man off kept Sussex busy. McLean got back on the ice.

Smiley got lots of work to do. Fredericton's forwards failed to run in on the net and their long shots were useless. Sussex went down the ice and Leclair scored on White's pass. Sterling got another rest. With the score 5 to 3 Sussex dug in. Titus had shot after shot to stop.

Fenwick used a knee-check on several occasions and got away with it. Galloway went off for tripping. Fenwick was finally caught at his questionable work and was given a rest. Immediately afterward Eveleigh and Walker mixed things up and both went off. Rowan felt lonely and joined them for tripping. Fredericton then woke up and took the play to the Sussex end. Fred McLean got the rubber and slammed it right through the net. The goal judge did not see it however and no goal was counted. The game ended with Fredericton pressing Sussex hard.

CRICKET GROWING IN POPULARITY

Toronto, Ont., Mar. 1.—Striking testimony to the growing popularity of Cricket was evidenced at the annual meeting of the Canadian Cricket Association last night. In addition to many members from Ontario clubs, Mr. Morrison, Winnipeg, was present, as a special representative of the Western Canada Cricket Association. The outstanding feature was the discussion evoked by the resolution adopted by the Ontario Association asking for the abandonment of the international match between Canada and the United States.
