

# CLERGYMAN TELLS WHY HE SUPPORTED RECIPROCITY

(Montreal Herald.)

An interesting visitor to Montreal this week is Rev. J. J. McCaskill, the Presbyterian clergyman of St. John, N.B., whose action in taking the stump for reciprocity during the recent campaign brought strong criticism from his Presbytery and a request for his resignation from the trustees of his church.

Rev. Mr. McCaskill, who is a young man of marked ability with a Scottish firmness of conviction and determination to say what he thinks, is not taking his church difficulties seriously.

"Mostly politics," he said. "I was cheerfully ready to resign if my church desired it, but the large majority of the members wouldn't hear of it."

"But what was it moved you to this possible breach with your church and associates?" Mr. McCaskill was asked.

"Simply," he said, "because the importance to the country of the issue of free trade in natural products dwarfs any question of the personal relation of a clergyman to the ecclesiastical organization or of a pastor to his congregation."

"When Lloyd George was attempting to pass his budget he received the effective assistance of the leading non-conformist clergymen of England. The question was similar in both cases. There it was a question of imposing a tax upon a privileged class, here one of remitting the tax upon the food of the people."

CLASSES AND MASSES.

"The special interests were lined

up against the people here and there. In England the people triumphed, in Canada their interests are in temporary eclipse. No one regarded the decision of this election as final. It is not the voice of God, but the voice of Jacob, and the hand of Esau is everywhere in evidence.

"This defeat is a passing incident in the onward march of democracy. It is impossible to take it seriously.

"The Conservatives claimed that a duty on natural products is essential to the integrity of the empire. These duties are haphazard and unscientific and were confessed to be foolish by those who imposed them. All Canadians have in the past felt like apologizing for them; they were a disagreeable necessity because our neighbors were churlish. To hold them now as sacred and essential will make us all ashamed, when we have recovered from political and sectarian passion.

"The Presbytery have criticized me for my action in the matter. Their criticism might be just if the issue were not so serious. It meant new life to the Maritime Provinces. Had we secured it, the moral and social results even, would be greater than those secured by the preaching of all our Presbytery for a generation. The critics, as they have been offered show that they failed to appreciate the situation even as the brethren of Moss failed to see the issue that confronted them in Egypt. The Liberals were not playing politics this time, but were seriously fighting the battle of the people. It is an issue from which they will find it easy to make a splendid and speedy recovery."

## COLLECTING DUTY ON TORONTO PLANS

Toronto, Oct. 6.—Duty is being charged by the United States government on the plans for the proposed subways in Toronto which are being sent across the line to prospective tenderers on the construction of the railway. The duty is about \$6 in each case.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem.

Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.
