Rodolphe Forget against the proposal to have as the Quebec delegation only Judge Doherty, George Perley, L. P. Pelletier and F. D. Monk. They demanded that there should be at least three substantial portfolios given to French-speaking ministers, and that there should be no Protestants holding a Quebec portfolio. Mr. Borden had finally to yield to these demands, and as the government now stands the French have the important portfolios of public works, post office and inland revenue, while the other portfolio is held by Judge Doherty, as the Irish-Catholic representative. It is claimed by some that Mr. Borden has made good in his first effort to distribute the new administration.

GREAT DISAPPOINTMENT OVER BORDEN'S CABINET

Nearly all the ministers are successful and wealthy business or professional men. There are eight lawyers. There is no real representative of the farmer or of the average consumer or toiler. There are seven members of the Church of England in the new cabinet, six Methodists, four Roman Catholics and one Baptist. The Church of England men are Hon. Messrs. Borden, Hazen, Perley, Rogers, Roche, Burrell and Leaned.

The Methodists are Hon. Messrs. Cochrane, Crothers, Kemp, White, Hughes and Reid.

The Roman Catholics are Hon. Messrs. Monk, Pelletier, Nantel and Doherty, while Mr. Foster is the Baptist.

One of the first acts of the new premier was to extend a governmental invitation to Sir Wilfrid and Lady Laurier to be present at the Quebec function and the premier's car was placed at Sir Wilfrid's disposal for the occasion. Whether or not Sir Wilfrid will go to Quebec will not be known until his return to the capital from Montreal tomorrow.

ELECTION WRITS ISSUED.

The writs of the necessary by-elections consequent upon the acceptance of portfolios by the new ministers were issued this afternoon, but the dates have not yet been fixed. It is understood that Hon. Mr. Hazen will run for Dr. Daniel's seat in St. John County, the latter being compensated by a seat in the Senate. Hon. J. K. Flemming will succeed Mr. Hazen as premier.

Hon. Robert Rogers will, it is expected, secure a seat in Saskatchewan through the retirement of Mr. McEwen in Prince Albert.

It is hardly likely that any of the ministers will be opposed. In return, Hon. W. S. Fielding will, in all

probability, be returned unopposed in Yarmouth, where Mr. Law has offered to retire in his favor. Premier Borden has intimated that he would, personally at any rate, not wish to have Mr. Fielding's return to parliament opposed. The same courtesy will also probably be extended to Hon. George P. Graham for an Ontario seat will be opened.

MONTREAL STAR'S CRITICISM.

Montreal, Oct. 10.—The Star (Conservative) says:

"Hon. Mr. Borden has now taken his first step as premier minister by selecting his cabinet. There was the highest hope throughout the country that with his huge majority, largely composed of 'new blood' he would feel free to give us a government wholly unshadowed by even a question as to the character or reputation of any of the ministers. It would be pure hypocrisy for The Montreal Star to pretend that this has been done. People's memories are not short enough to have forgotten our public opinion of some of the men who have been called to office."

"What the net result of the selection will be, is impossible yet to foretell. Minister forces have been granted admission to the privy council chamber at a time when they might easily have been rigidly excluded and this fact alone does not make for reassurance. But the ministers with clean records are easily in a majority and a majority—if its backbone be stiff and strong—can rule."

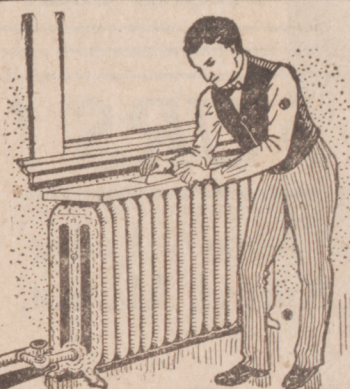
