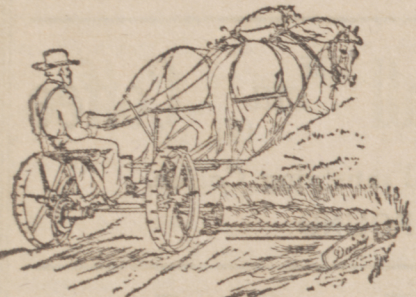

St. John, July 24.—In a well played game, part of which was played in the rain and was called in the first part of the eighth inning, the Marathons defeated St. Stephen on Saturday afternoon by a score of 5 to 1. For seven innings Sweet twirled, practically unhit ball, two safe ones only coming off his delivery, but in the eighth he showed the first signs of weakening and walked two men and was hit safely by Crowley for the second time. This inning however went for nothing and Sweet gets credit for a two hit game for seven innings. Crowley the Thistles southpaw was on the mound for the visitors and while he was not hit to any extent, yet he was wild and walked four men and hit two more, with the bases full he forced Williams in the third inning by giving Lynch four wide ones, and his wild throw to second in the first session was responsible for another of the Greeks runs. The game was put on ice in the third when Joe Tarbell was sent in to bat in Clawson's place. The Fredericton Baseball Club's squad was worked out in a seven-inning practice game at Scully's Grove Saturday afternoon. Bates twirled for the regulars and Crosby and Warwick for the Ynnigans. A good sized bunch of fans watched the game between showers, the rain interrupting the play to some extent. The teams lined up as follows:

On Thursday the Marathons will be here for a league game. This will be an evening game, beginning at 6.30, on account of the horse-racing in the afternoon. On Friday Fredericton will go to Calais.
