I., on June 10th and made their trip of approximately 3,300 miles in 35 sailing days.

BIG FUTURE PREDICTED FOR SIR W. M. AITKEN

London, July 5.—The surprise expressed in many Canadian papers over the knighting of Mr. W. M. Aitken, and the speculations indulged in as to the source through which the honor was received, find no counterpart in the English journals, by whom the special circumstances in connection with this matter are probably well known, and the general conditions governing the granting of honors by the Sovereign are certainly better understood.

Some Canadian papers just received on this side of the water, contain speculations as to how it was possible for a Canadian Liberal Government, or a British one, to recommend to the Sovereign the honoring of a gentleman whose participation in politics has been as a Conservative. The answer is simple. Neither of these Governments had anything to say in the matter. Mr. Aitken's nomination was one of a few made by the leaders of the Unionist party, to whom this privilege was extended in view of the exceptional importance of the occasion.

A UNIONIST HONOR

Equally simple is the explanation as understood here, of the reasons which prompted the Unionist leaders to submit Mr. Aitken's name to the King. That gentleman had spent about a year in cultivating a Lancashire constituency and in assisting in the Unionist campaign in other parts of the country. As a result of his work, he captured a strong Liberal seat, and drew upon himself much public attention by this success, which was one of the most notable won by the Unionists in the last General Election. It was generally conceded that Mr. Aitken had shown great organizing ability in that campaign, and the party leaders came to look on him as a most promising addition to their fighting line. It was understood in Canadian circles here, some few months ago that

Mr. Aitken was about to return to Canada and take an active part in Canadian politics as one of Mr. Borden's lieutenants.

MORE PRIZES AWAIT HIM

The announcement has been lately made, however, that if he had that intention it has been abandoned, and that Mr. Aitken has decided to cast in his lot definitely and permanently with the British Unionist party. That he is to be one of the party's chief whips is common gossip around the Constitutional and National Liberal Clubs and there is general acknowledgment that his organizing ability and force of character will make him a most valuable manager as soon as he becomes acquainted with the minutiae of the work and possesses a wider knowledge of the personnel of the party.

A STRONG ALLY

It is obvious, therefore, that Mr. Aitken's knighthood comes to him through his Unionist friends, and is an acknowledgement of work done in Lancashire prior to the last general election and probably also of the personal sacrifices he will be forced to make by virtually forsaking business for politics. The Unionists have certainly secured a strong ally, for Sir W. M. Aitken's meteoric career is proof that he possesses in a large measure those qualities that are as necessary in the conduct of the affairs of a party as in those of a large business institution. That he is prepared to devote these qualities to public work, and to largely abandon the business occupations in which he has achieved very remarkable success is taken by the Canadian colony here as, evidence of an interest in public affairs for which his critics in Canada have not given him credit. On this side of the Atlantic there he many to prophesy that Sir W. M. Aitken, in public life, will be as forceful and successful as Mr. W. M. Aitken has been in business.
