

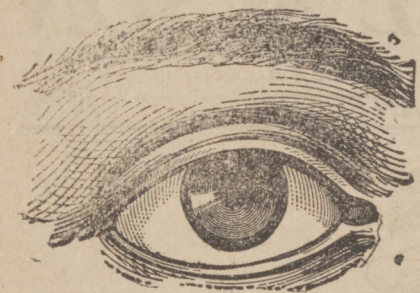

ARGUMENT IN
NE TEMERE CASE
NEARING A CLOSE

**Mrs. Hebert's Attorney
 Will Continue His Argument—If Marriage is
 Illegal the Third Party
 Should be Punished**

Montreal, Q., Dec. 15.—The suit opposing the famous marriage annulment which separated Eugene Hebert from his wife, Emma Marie Cloutiere, under the Ne Temere decree, will enter a final stage today, when Mrs. Hebert's attorney, Arnold Wainwright, will continue the argument. Mr. Wainwright will take up the thread of historical argument at the session, and will proceed thence to the year 1866, when the present code was brought into effect. His contention will be the same as in his previous address, namely, that in the interval between 1760 and 1866, there was nothing in law then existing to oblige Catholics to go before their parish priests or bishops in order to be married, and that consequently ministers of a faith other than the Catholic, were not restrained from officiating at such marriages.

If it is legal, the marriage stands as valid; if it is illegal, the minister and not third parties should be punished. This will be the core of Mr. Wainwright's argument.

THE TORONTO GLOBE ON
THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS

(Toronto Globe)

The Liberals of Ontario have every reason to be pleased with the result of yesterday's election. They entered the contest with as many handicaps against them as any party ever had to face. The rout of September 21 was taken advantage of by the Conservative members of the Legislature to urge upon Sir James Whitney the advisability of springing a general election and "wiping out the Grits." The Premier did not yield at once. He has a little chivalry in his disposition, and did not take kindly to the idea of kicking a prostrate foe. But the rank and file persisted, and an election was decided upon. The Conservative managers expected forty acclamations and a material reduction in the gallant little band of Liberals to the left of the Speaker.

The result must be a keen disappointment. Under a new leader, who went into the contest with the smallest campaign fund that has been known in Ontario politics and encountered the resources of two entrenched Governments, the Liberals, instead of being wiped out, have materially improved their standing in the House, and have greatly reduced the popular majority of the Whitney Government.

There have been regrettable losses. The Liberal contingent in the Legislature will be the poorer of the absence of Messrs. McEwing, Dan Reed, and Valentin Stock, but it gains materially by the addition of Mr. Rowell, Mr. Sutherland of East Middlesex, Col. Atkinson of North

Norfolk, Mr. Hugh Munro of Glengarry, Mr. Sinclair of South Ontario, Mr. McDonald of Centre Bruce, Dr. McQueen of North Wentworth, Mr. Richardson of East Wellington, and other prominent Liberals who will take their places on the opposition side when the House opens. The Liberals will have a far better position in the Legislature than the totals of the two parties indicate. Eighty-three to twenty-three—Mr. Studholme may well be counted as an Oppositionist since Sir James Whitney's attack on him—seems long odds, but an opposition consisting of Mr. Rowell and Hon. A. G. MacKay alone would be able to wake the Seven Sleepers. There are four years of hard fighting before the Whitney Government.

The Liberal party in Ontario makes a special appeal in its policies to the young men of the Province. Two young men, Mr. Rowell and Hon. W. L. M. King, have born the chief part in this contest, and they have had the active support of the younger element in the party to a far greater degree than in any recent election. To the Secretary of the Ontario Reform Association, Mr. Inwood, is due in no small measure the failure of the Conservative plan of "wiping out the Grits." It was uphill work getting candidates in not a few ridings, but the work was well done. The election proves that there is life in Liberalism in Ontario. After four years of Mr. Rowell's leadership it will tackle the Whitney Government again, confident of the result.

BAPTIST PASTOR
IS UNDER ARREST

Junction City, Kas., Dec. 13.—Rev. Charles Brewer, formerly a chaplain in the United States Army, now a pastor of a Baptist Church in Olustee, Okla., has been accused in a confession by Private Michael Quirk, of implication in a mysterious series of explosions which have puzzled the military authorities at Fort Riley for six months. United States Commissioner Chase today stated that Brewer had been arrested at Olustee, and was being held for the United States marshals. Mrs. Anna Jordan, of Kansas City, also implicated in Quirk's confession, was arrested today in Kansas City from information given to the police.

Quirk declared he committed these crimes at the instigation of Brewer, who sought revenge because he had been court-martialed and dismissed from the service for conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman. He was found guilty of appearing in an intoxicated condition at a hall given by the enlisted men, and using language unbecoming a gentleman and officer to the men and women present.

Quirk in his confession, said he blew up the bridge across the Kaw River June 21st last, and the Cavalry Stable, June 30th, when twenty-five cavalry horses were burned to death.

He said also that he blew up the water main, which supplied the post with water.

Mrs. Anna Jordan, implicated by Quirk, is the wife of a convict in the Federal Prison at Fort Leavenworth. She was arrested here several months ago for aiding her husband to escape from the guard house, where he was confined on a charge of stealing. He was recaptured and sent to the Federal Penitentiary. Mrs. Jordan was released.
