THE FIRST REPORT ON CANADIAN NAVAL SERVICE

Ottawa, Dec. 15.—The first annual report of the department of naval service, covering the operation of the department since its inauguration on May 4, 1910, up to the end of the last fiscal year, was issued today. It embraces the naval, fishery protection, tidal and hydrographic survey and wireless telegraph branches.

In regard to the first branch, a summary is given of the inauguration and organization of the staff, the establishment of the naval college at Halifax, the operations of the Rainbow and Niobe, and various details as to recruiting, cadets in training, etc.

The total expenditure on the naval service during the year was \$1,790,017.

The number of recruits received up to the end of the year, in addition to the twenty-one naval cadets now in training, totalled 223, of whom 185 went to the Niobe and 28 to the Rainbow. Nova Scotia contributed 97 men to the Niobe, Ontario 46, Quebec, 28, P. E. Island 11, and New Brunswick 3. The recruits for the Rainbow were, with the exception of two from Ontario, and one from Alberta, all obtained in British Columbia. Neither Manitoba nor Saskatchewan have as yet sent a single man to the naval service.

HUDSON BAY ROUTE DANGEROUS

The most interesting part of the report is that dealing with the hydrographic survey of Hudson Bay last year by the ice-breaking steamer Stanley with a view to gathering information as to conditions of navigation in the bay and straits.

The result does not seem to be very reassuring as to the safety of desirability of the Hudson Bay route for other than specially constructed craft suitable for encountering ice floes. It is stated that as late in the year as July 20-22 the Stanley encountered at the north entrance to the bay an ice field extending for 200 miles, requiring

great skill on the part of the pilot in finding leads.

Hydrographer William J. Stewart concludes that any vessel navigating the bay must be prepared to meet ice. He says:

"Whilst none of that met with on this voyage could have been dangerous to the Stanley or sealers and other specially constructed vessels now trading with this district. I am of the opinion it might be dangerous to a ship not so built. I certainly do not think any cargo vessel of ordinary construction would have been able to find or force her way through the large field met with at Fort Churchill, but would have been obliged to remain in the ice until it was loosened by wind or currents."

Apart from the ice question the report indicates that dangers and difficulties in the navigation of Hudson straits and the bay are by no means insurmountable but arise chiefly from present inaccurate or inadequate charting, and from the proximity of the magnetic pole with the consequent effect upon compasses.

WIRELESS ON THE GREAT LAKES

The report of the government wireless telegraph branch states that a scheme has been drawn up for the establishment of a wireless telegraph system on the great lakes which will include a chain of stations approximately 180 miles apart from Port Arthur to Kingston with a station at Kingston of sufficient range to communicate with Montreal, thus linking up the proposed system with the east coast system, and giving through communication between Belle Isle or Cape Race and Port Arthur.

The scheme as drafted will include stations at or near Kingston, Toronto, Port Colborne, Port Stanley, Sarnia, Tobermory, Midland, Sault Ste. Marie and Port Arthur.

RICHELIEU AND ONTARIO TAKES ON SHARP SPURT

New York, N.Y., Dec. 16.—The further strength which prevailed in yesterday's stock market was not inspired by specific news worthy of the name. Nearly every rumor or explanation of the advance of professional groups had been heard before. The rise seemed the result of further cumulative evidences of improvement in business at large and of a growing conviction that no legislation of a seriously destructive character would be enacted by the present Congress. As a matter of fact the public utterances of the democratic leaders encourage the belief that the party now in control will centre its efforts upon gaining the confidence of the business interests of the country.

Much uncertainty and distrust still prevails as to just what will be attempted at the present session, but the consensus in the financial community is that there will be no fresh agitation of a serious character. The strength of the United States Steel and Copper shares is explained by the increasing evidences of improvement in those particulars of industrial. The anthracite group reflects a belief that the forthcoming Supreme Court decision will be favorable to those roads.

FRENZIED FINANCIER

FACES TRIAL

Jackson, Miss., Dec. 16.—The many persons who suffered financial loss through the failure several years ago of the Central Bank of Mississippi are looking forward with much interest to the trial of W. J. Rice, which is scheduled to begin here Monday. Rice was the promoter of the bank and in entire control of the institution. The bank was capitalized at half a million dollars, but when it closed its doors, during the financial panic of 1907, it had less than ten dollars in vaults.

Revelations following the bank's failure tended to show, according to the authorities who conducted the investigation, that Rice was a typical "Get-Rich-Quick" Wallingford, "the is alleged to have started "wind-cat" banks and inaugurated other schemes of finance in Kentucky, Missouri, Illinois and several other States. Efforts to learn his whereabouts after the failure of the Capital Central Bank of Mississippi were for a long time futile. Recently the Mississippi authorities located the former banker at his home in Morehead, Ky., after successfully fighting a habeas corpus proceeding brought to resist the requisition, returned him in Jackson to await trial on charges of embezzlement and violations of the States banking laws.
