SCOTTISH CURLING TEAM FORMED OF NEW PLAYERS

Fredericton Club will Send Two Rinks to St. John to Compete Against them--Visitors form a Very Representative Team--Sail from Glasgow Dec. 23

A Glasgow correspondent says of the Scottish Curlers: "The final arrangements in the organization of the new Scottish-Canadian Curling Team have now been made, and the composition of the team as well as the general programme for the tour were approved at Edinburgh by the Committee of Management of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club. The team, which sails for Halifax, N. S., by the Allan Liner Ionian from Glasgow on December 23, was selected by the Committee of Management of the Royal Caledonian Club, and its Secretary, Mr. A. Davidson Smith, Edinburgh, with Mr. Andrew Blair, of Glasgow, acting as team secretary, and assisting him in the selection of the players and in making the arrangements necessary for the tour. Col. Robertson Aikman (Lanarkshire) will act as captain, and Mr. Blair will discharge the duties of team secretary throughout the visit to the Dominion.

FROM VARIOUS CLUBS

"The team has been chosen from various clubs, entirely irrespective of districts or of any consideration other than the ability of the members as curlers. It was felt that, while the 1902 team made a very creditable appearance in Canada, considering that they were new to Canadian ice and Canadian conditions of play, and also that while they were eminently successful as social visitors from the Home Land to a dominion which is so largely Scottish, at attempt should be made this year to sink the social side of the tour somewhat, and to make it almost wholly a curling visit.

ENTIRELY NEW

"This explains, to some extent, the fact that an entirely new team is to be sent. It is, however, no reflection in any way on the 1902 team to say that there are now better curlers in Scotland, and that only one of its members--ex-President David Gordon, of Bathgate--is included in this season's team. The previous team felt that it would be only fair that new men should have an opportunity of meeting the Canadian players, and besides, it was, in the great majority of cases, impossible for the members of the old team to again find both the time and the money represented by a tour in the Dominion. After some discussion and negotiations it was decided, therefore, to select an almost wholly fresh team, and to restrict it absolutely to men with the best possible records as curlers. It is likely that the after-dinner speaking will suffer because of this and will not be up to the high standard of the previous visit, as the best curlers are usually those who have little or nothing of the gift of oratory. It is certain, however, that the play will not suffer, but will be of such a class as will try severely the skill of Canadian curlers.

AT ST. JOHN

While the plans are not yet com-

plete for the visiting curlers' stay at St. John, it is likely that the visit will be made the occasion of a regular provincial bonspiel which will be held in that city. St. John will be the only point touched in this Province to the outside clubs will go there for the occasion. It is likely that Moncton, Fredericton, Sussex, Hampton, Woodstock, Campbellton, Chatham and Newcastle will send one or two rinks each when the Scottish visitors are in the city.

ROLLIE NORMAN

New York, Dec. 14.--With the announcement today that the Providence Club of the International League had been sold to Frank J. Navin for \$70,000, Samuel Lichtenheim principal owner of the Montreal Club, declared that he had declined two offers for his interest. His refusal to part with his holdings was due to sentimental rather than business reasons, he said.

IN DRAW AT TORONTO

Toronto, Dec. 14.--The main bout between "Kid" Alberts or New York and Joe Phillips of Providence at Personal A. C. tonight was a battle royal from start to finish and the 10 rounds were replete with give and take. Both men were on their feet at the end of the 10th round and effected only fair decision would be a draw.

Alberts had the better of the opening rounds, his wicked right going much damage but Phillips seemed to grow much better as the fight progressed and finished much stronger, his great blocking in the closing rounds preventing Alberts from doing damage.

AT NEW HAVEN

Canadian Boxer was Able to Box Fifteen Rounds in Spite of Severe Punishment Received

New Haven, Dec. 14.--The Amazon A. C. of this city this evening put on one of the most successful boxing exhibitions of the year in this city before a big crowd at the Casino. Joe Shea of Waterbury defeated Alf Lynch, bantamweight champion of Canada, in a 15-round bout at 122 pounds ringside. Lynch three times saved himself from a knockout by clinching.

In the seventh round Shea had Lynch going when the latter grabbed Shea around the neck and held on until the gong sounded. Lynch repeated this trick in the 13th and from that time on saved himself by these tactics.

Shea's jabs and his interfighting were particularly good and his victory a decisive one and left no doubt of his superiority.

Alfie Lynch lived in St. John some years ago and hailed from Quebec. On this side of the line he made a good record for himself and since boxing in the States has made a fair showing. His friends in New Brunswick hope that the set-back he has received at New Haven will be only temporary.

Two years ago he was stricken with rheumatism while pitching for the Brockton team, and while being treated for that ailment it is said the muscles became more and more strained, the result being Dr. Daniels states that they will never reach their normal shape although he does not expect they will hinder O'Toole from pitching next season.

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ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties--Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
