Detroit, Mich., July 29.—All the known horses following the Grand Circuit and the Great Western Circuit this year are now quartered at the state fair grounds in readiness to compete for the big stakes at the twenty-seventh annual Blue Ribbon meeting, which will open Monday and continue five days. The \$5,000 Chamber of Commerce pacing stake will be the big event of the opening day. The Chicago Horseman Futurity, \$10,000 guaranteed, will be the feature event of Tuesday's card and will be followed on Wednesday by the classic Mercantile and Manufacturers' Stake, \$10,000, for 2:24 class trotters. The track is in excellent condition and with fair weather conditions during the week the meeting is expected to be one of the most successful of recent years.

The aid will probably be given toward the larger bridges only and may amount to as much as twenty-five per cent of the cost.

Galveston, Texas, July 29.—Hotels and boarding houses are rapidly filling with visitors for the annual Cotton Carnival, which was formally opened today and will continue for two weeks. The list of attractions is more varied and of a higher class than in any previous year and the management is looking forward to the largest crowds ever entertained in Galveston.

London, July 28.—It is reported that Lord St. Aldwin has pledged himself to lead fifty Unionist peers into the government lobby in support of the Veto Bill. This plan while relieving Lord Lansdowne of the onus of voting against his own amendments to the bill, would insure its passage without resort to the creation of peers as the government can rely upon fifty votes in the House of Lords from the Liberal peers, and it is doubtful whether Lord Halsbury will succeed in taking fifty into the opposition lobby.

WHAT RECIPROCITY MEANS
TO THE CANADIAN PEOPLE

(Toronto Globe)

Reciprocity has now passed at Washington. Whether it becomes law or not rests with the Canadian Parliament and people. It is worth recalling the terms of the agreement and pointing out in a general way its meeting to the two countries affected. The bill is a tariff amendment, divided into three scheduled, embodying a large free list on natural products, and reduced duties on food products and certain manufactures.

For farmers there will be distinct advantage in free access to the United States market for the following, among other articles, upon which duty is now levied:—

Cattle	Onions
Horses and Mules	Apples
Swine	Pears
Sheep and Lambs	Peaches
Poultry	Grapes
Wheat	Butter
Rye	Cheese
Oats	Fresh Milk
Barley	Fresh Cream
Beans	Eggs
Potatoes	Hay
Corn	Straw

Canadian fishermen will be rewarded by free access to the United States market for the following products of the rich waters of the Dominion:—

Mackerel	Herrings
Halibut	Salmon
Cod	Oysters

Lobsters

Canadian lumbermen will gain by the free admission to the United States of the following standard products:—

Timber, hewn, sided or squared
Sawed boards, planks, deals
Paving posts, railroad ties and poles
Wooden staves
Pickets and palings

The mining man will find better sale for his goods by free access to United States markets for:—

Feldspar, Mica, Talc, Salt, Asbestos

Consumers on both sides will thank the negotiators of this agreement for reduced duties on many articles now bearing varying taxes, and among them:—

Meats, fresh or refrigerated; bacon and hams; beef and pork, salted; canned meats and poultry; lard, tomatoes and other vegetables, wheat flour and oatmeal; prepared cereal food; bran, middlings and other offals of grain; macaroni and vermicelli; biscuits, wafers and cakes; canned fruits; agricultural implements; cutlery; paving stones; clocks and watches; canoes; motor vehicles.

Canada is now the third best customer of the United States. Under reciprocity we will sell more to the United States of the things we do not need and which the United States does need; we will buy more of what they have to sell and what we want to buy. We will continue to buy from Great Britain the fabrics and other articles with which she can best supply us. But instead of free access only to the British market for natural products we will have also the increasing demands of the United States.

Laurier and the larger markets is the policy for Canada.

CANADIAN ATHLETES IN FRANCE

Nancy, France, July 29.—A number of well trained and finely developed young Canadians, representing the National Gymnastic Society of Montreal, have arrived here for the international gymnastic tournament, in which they will compete against some of the best muscle in the world in feats of skill, speed and endurance. The tournament is to have its formal opening tomorrow and will continue for several days.

NASHVILLE PRELATE 70 YEARS OLD

Nashville, Tenn., July 29.—Rt. Rev. Thomas Sebastian Byrne, Roman Catholic bishop of this city, attained his seventieth year today and was the recipient of many congratulations. Bishop Byrne was born in Hamilton, Ohio, and was connected with the Cincinnati diocese from the time of his ordination in 1869 until his appointment as Bishop of Nashville in 1894.
