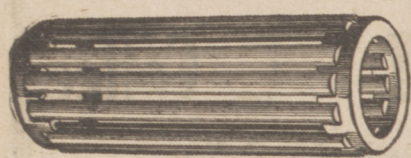

## Base Ball Turf

### CHATTY DIRECT AND BRANHAM BRAUGHMAN WON

Braughman Horse Made Season's Record in Second Heat of 2.12 Pace Comstock Park Race

Grand Rapids, Mich., July 28.—New England horses won first money in two of the events of the Grand Circuit races here yesterday. Chatty Direct took the 2.14 trot in three straight heats, and Branham Baughman turned the trick in the 2.12 pace.

Branham Baughman was the favorite for the \$5000 Comstock Park purse, but in the first heat Vernon McKinney took the lead at the start and held it to the finish. At the half-mile and up to the stretch Sir R. was second, with Branham Baughman third, but the favorite scored second at the wire.

The second heat was the fastest of the day and set a record for this season.

When the third heat started Vernon McKinney was the favorite and took the lead, with Branham Baughman second, and held it to within a few yards of victory. Then he broke and Branham Baughman passed the stand a winner, with Peter Preston second and Nellie Temple third, Vernon McKinney finishing last.

The fourth heat saw the leaders bunched to the stretch, where they thinned out with Branham Baughman in the lead, Sir R. second and Vernon McKinney third, McKinney again breaking at the wire.

In the fifth heat, they were strung out to the stretch, at the head of which Vernon McKinney broke and failing to find his stride again finished last, while Branham Baughman nipped first place, Sir R. second and Peter Preston third. The time of the fifth heat was 2:06, or 1/2 of a second less than the world's record for the fifth heat in the 2.12 pace.

**HUGUENOT ACTED BAD.**  
In the 2.14 trot The Huguenot, owned in Massachusetts and driven by John Benyon, was a big favorite on account of his winnings in Kalamazoo and Indianapolis. He was in bad temper, however, and although he got off well in all the starts, he broke three times in the first heat and once each in the second and third.

## DRIVERS FINED.

Kirby Star, the favorite with the bookmakers in the 2.17 pace, was drawn on account of lameness, as also were Albert R., Little Vera and Blue Line. Dora J. took the first heat and Eddie Dillard took the next three. Snow, Murphy and Hogan, driving Eddie Dillard, Longworth B. and Rose C., were each fined \$1000 by the judges for not driving to win the first heat.

Hailworthy, driven by Ed. Geers, won the 2:05 trot, or the Grand Rapids handicap, by taking the first two heats.

The track and the weather were ideal, and the attendance came close to making a record for Comstock park.

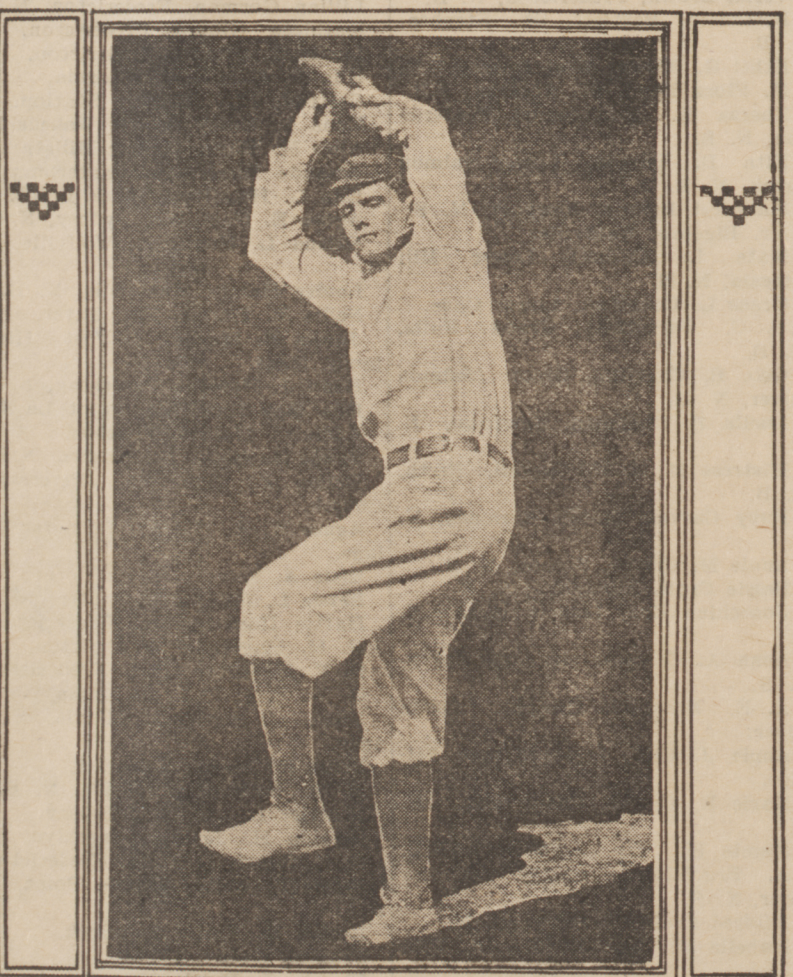
For the St. Stephen team Crowley started to pitch but was replaced by Butler in the second inning after five runs had been made by St. Johns.
