## NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D.C., July 29.—A busy week is in prospect for both Houses of Congress and it is likely that before the week ends the calendar will be cleared of several of the important matters now pending and the date fixed for the final adjournment. The president has canceled all of his out-of-town engagements for the near future and will probably remain in the capital until the session closes.

A Democratic state primary will be held in Mississippi Tuesday for the indorsement of a candidate for United States senator and the selection of nominees for all important state officers from governor down. Chief interest centers in the senatorial contest. Senator Leroy Percy is a candidate for re-election and his principal opponent is former Governor James K. Vardaman. A third aspirant for the senatorship is C. H. Alexander.

A special election takes place in Missouri Tuesday to decide on the proposed issue of \$3,500,000 in bonds to build a state capitol to replace the structure destroyed by fire last winter.

In accordance with the proclamation of Governor Colquitt, the Texas legislature will begin a special session Monday to consider and act upon appropriation measures and the redistricting of the senatorial and representative districts of the state.

Attorneys general from ten states are to meet in St. Louis Friday for the discussion of pending railroad rate litigation. The states to be represented are Oklahoma, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Kentucky, South Dakota, Arkansas, Oregon, Iowa and Nebraska.

The Board of Food and Drug Inspection of the Department of Agriculture will begin a series of hearings in Washington Monday in regard to the ingredients used in the manufacture of beer, ale, porter and stout. The hearings will mark the beginning of a searching inquiry that the department proposes to make into the entire brewery industry of the United States.

An important report will be issued by the Department of Agriculture at noon Wednesday showing the condition of the cotton crop on July 25.

Among the most notable conventions of the week will be the annual meeting of the Association of Advertising Clubs of America, in Boston; the annual convention of the United States League of Local Building and Loan Associations, in Grand Rapids; the annual convention of the Knights of Columbus, in Detroit, and the international convention of the Catholic Order of Foresters, in Cleveland.

The week promises to be one of interest and activity in many branches of sport and athletics. Followers of the turf will center their attention on the Blue Ribbon meeting at Detroit. For devotees of tennis there will be the preliminaries for the doubles championship at Chicago and the opening of the National Clay Court Tennis tourney at Omaha. The aviation meet at Toronto promises an interesting event in the field of aeronautics. Another sporting event, and one of a somewhat unusual character for mid-summer, is also scheduled for Toronto, namely, the opening game in the American tour of the famous Corinthian soccer team of England. On the week's calendar of aquatic sports appear the annual regatta of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen at St. Catharines, the annual regatta of the Great Lakes Power Boat League at Detroit, and the start of the annual cruise of the New York Yacht Club.

July 27—A quiet wedding was solemnized in St. Mary's church, Kingsclear on July 11th when Martha M. Cliff was united in the bonds of matrimony to Mr. James Gilman of Orillia, Ont.

The ceremony was performed in the presence of the many friends of the contracting parties by Rev. Mansel Shewen, rector of Kingsclear. Suitable music was furnished by Mrs. Lelia Holyoke.

Luncheon was served at the bride's home to a few intimate friends before the departure of the happy couple for St. John, N.B. on their wedding tour.

A spice of romance is attached to this marriage from the fact that the principals met over twenty-five years ago, in Woodstock N. B. Mr. Gilman who is a music teacher by profession married and settled in Ontario while the lady became the wife of the late Squire Cliff of Kingsclear. They met again last winter while Mrs. Cliff was visiting in Maine and they revived their early friendship with the result of their marriage of July 11th.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry, (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
