MATRICULATION RESULTS ARE ANNOUNCED

Fred C. Manning of St. John Heads the List—Hanford K. Booker of Fredericton Second

The results of the University of New Brunswick matriculation examinations are announced by the Education Department. A student of the St. John Grammar School, Fred C. Manning, leads the province and first division. Hanford K. Booker of Fredericton is second. Candidates who passed in first division are very evenly distributed throughout the province, two each coming from St. John and Moncton, and one each from Fredericton, Campbellton and St. Stephen.

There were 131 candidates for matriculation and 12 for leaving. Of the candidates for matriculation 7 passed in the first division, 58 in the second division, 27 in the third division, 28 in the third division conditionally, while 11 failed. Of the candidates for leaving, 3 passed in the second division, 1 passed in the third division, 4 in the third division conditionally, while 4 failed. SCHOOL BOARD MAKES TRANSFERS AMONG TEACHERS

Miss Gwendoline McAdam Appointed to Teaching Staff in Place of Miss Ethel Smith

The monthly meeting of the Board of School Trustees was held yesterday with Dr. Atherton the chairman presiding. The other members present were Mrs. ClarrtBnt BtrN tNByNtNt Weddall, Dr. VanWart and Secretary Sampson. Several matters of importance engaged the attention of the members and plans were completed for filling vacancies on the teaching staff.

ANNUAL REPORT

The secretary presented a draft of the annual report to the Chief Supt. of Education. It is shown that satisfactory work is being accomplished in the schools and yet the attendance of pupils is no greater than that of fifteen or twenty years ago. With Mr. James Roberts as truant officer it is expected that a much better attendance of pupils will be secured.

In readjusting the staff of teachers Miss Sherman was transferred from York Street to the Morrison Mill School and Miss Cadwallader of the latter school will take the department in York Street vacated by the resignation of Miss Ethel Smith. Miss Coburn will take charge of the second department in the Mill School while Miss Sherman will be in charge of her former grades. Miss Gwendoline McAdam was appointed to Grades VII and VIII in York Street School. Miss Kinghorn who has been on leave of absence will resume her work in Charlotte Street School after vacation. Several additional applications for positions on the staff were considered before changes were completed.

A letter was read from the secretary of the N. B. Medical Society, relating to medical inspection in the schools. After consideration it was placed on file.

HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE.

The report of the High School entrance examiners was presented and considered. Ninety-three pupils underwent the examination and of these twenty-six passed in first division, twenty-four in second division, twenty-eight in third division and five failed to secure any classification. In the two divisions there are sixty pupils who will be admitted to the High School. Those who only succeeded in making the third division are referred to a committee composed

SAYS THE LIBERALS WILL CARRY ALL BEFORE THEM IN N.S.

Prominent Amherst Visitor in the City --Sees Victory in the Air for Sir Wilfrid and Reciprocity

Dr. C. W. Hewson and Mr. Charles R. Smith, K.C., prominent citizens of Amherst, N. S., arrived here on Wednesday evening with members of their families, by automobile and registered at the Queen. They left this morning for St. Andrews where they will spend a few days and it is their intention to return home by way of St. John.

Mr. Smith the well known Conservative politician and unsuccessfully contested Cumberland for his party at the recent local election. Talking with a Mail representative he expressed himself as being greatly delighted with Fredericton. He had spent the day sight-seeing and had been greatly impressed with the beauty of the city.

Dr. Hewson who is a retired physician and a man of considerable means has long been one of the bulwarks of the Liberal party in Nova Scotia. Asked by The Mail for his views on the political situation he said: "The Liberals are going to sweep the country on the reciprocity issue from Atlantic to Pacific. As for Nova Scotia I feel confident that the Liberals will make a general clean up. Of course there are one or two counties in which we will have a hard fight but the masses of the people are with us and we are going to win. Victory is already in the air and the call to battle cannot come too soon for us. You can take it from me that Mr. Borden and his Tory colleague will be overwhelmingly defeated in Halifax. The result of the recent local elections showed quite plainly how the political wind is blowing in that constituency."

Referring to the question of reciprocity the doctor declared that the people of the Maritime Provinces had all to gain and nothing to lose by the agreement. He felt confident that it would stimulate all lines of trade and prosperity will be the result."

Dr. Hewson while here met Mr. J. Howe Dickson, K.C., an old acquaintance whom he had not seen for forty years. They spent a very pleasant hour together talking over old times.
