WHERE THE SHOE PINCHED

Sometimes mail order houses offer a leader, that is, they sell some article at less than cost, in order to induce buyers to make up an order which will include many things at a great deal more than cost. The big firm comes out ahead on the whole transaction, all right—that is what they are there for.

We heard of an experience of a certain lady the other day who thought it would be a good scheme to simply order the leader, the article sold at less than cost. The particular bargain offered was a pair of shoes, at \$1.69. When the shoes arrived there was a charge of twenty-five cents for express, which she paid. After she got the shoes home, she discovered that they did not fit, so she packed them up again and returned them by express. The firm said she could return the goods if not satisfactory, at least that was in the advertisement. She paid another twenty-five cents to return them. After waiting about a week the new shoes arrived, and she had to pay another quarter for express. Unfortunately, they were no better than the first ones, as far as fit was concerned. She had now paid \$2.44 for a pair of \$2.00 shoes, with more to follow. She tried to exchange them with a local dealer, but, of course, that would not work, but while in the local store she saw as good a pair, in every respect which the dealer sold for \$1.65 regularly. She may find a lady friend to fit the shoes. If so she may not lose more than a dollar. If not, she is out \$2.44.

When a woman thinks she has obtained a bargain, she tells her friends about it; but when the experience is not so favorable she is apt to say nothing about it. Most people would rather say nothing when they get the worst of a deal, although they say a great deal when they think they have got the best of it. That is human nature, but that is why we do not hear more about the experiences of those who deal with mail order houses.

When you come to think of it, is it not rather foolish to buy things just from seeing a picture of them? A farmer would not buy a cow from a catalogue, because he knows something about cows. How much more important is it to see what you buy and know with whom you are dealing when you are getting something about the quality of which you are not able to judge. The Fredericton merchant wants your trade and he knows that the best way to secure it is to be perfectly candid about the quality of the goods he sells. He knows more about quality than you will ever learn unless you go into business for yourself. If an article is not the best he will tell you so, and charge you fairly for what you get. We cannot all afford to buy the highest quality of goods, but we are at least entitled to get fair value for the money we spend and to know just what we are getting. The only way we know of to accomplish this is to buy at home, from a merchant in whom you have confidence. In the long run you are money in pocket by doing so and in addition you are helping Fredericton instead of injuring it.

SIKHS ASK TO HAVE IMMIGRATION LAWS ALTERED

A Strong Deputation of Them now at Ottawa to Wait upon Government—Wish to have Sikh Women Allowed to Enter Canada

STRONG CASE EXPECTED TO BE PRESENTED

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 27.—A strong case will be presented to the government by the deputation of Sikhs from Vancouver, which is here to see the government in regard to the letting down of the immigration bars, which forbid their bringing their wives to Canada. The present Hindu population in Canada numbers about 4,000 for by an arrangement between the Canadian and Indian governments no women are allowed to accompany men to Canada or to follow them after they are arrived and settled. These are resident entirely in British Columbia, and chiefly in the cities of Vancouver and Victoria, and on the farms in the immediate neighborhood.

THE STOCK MARKET

New York, N. Y., Nov. 27.—While it is generally admitted that the broad causes of the recent upward movement of prices still exists, the market has nevertheless largely discounted such specific developments of a constructive nature as have been thus far unfolded and until there is some new and striking manifestation of fundamental improvement a period of comparative rest and quiet is not unlikely. The broad fluctuation of the rise in prices has been a revision of financial sentiment based upon a genuine improvement in conditions at large. Thus far this improvement has not been pronounced but the prospect of a gradual betterment of the business conditions is bright, the more so for the fact that such betterment will be of the most gradual character. The many railroads are in a position to furnish inspiration for a further rise in prices in the shape of extra dividends and bonuses and these are likely to materialize before the end of the year in at least one or two instances.

Some observers are predicting a period of unprecedented ease in money rates, which of itself would be sufficient to advance the prices of securities.

creation of the cardinals and the confirmation by His Holiness of the archbishop and bishops already appointed by brief followed.

ONE SECRET APPOINTMENT.

Besides the new cardinals who received the red hat today the Pope created another whom he reserved, "in pectore," namely, "kept secret," and whose name will be published in a later consistory when the Pope wishes that to be done. In some cases the name of the prelate only becomes known after the death of the Pope.

It is supposed that the unnamed cardinal is Mgr. Filippo Giusini, secretary of the congregation of Sacraments. The name, however, will not be revealed until a later consistory, at the option of the Pope and it is possible that this may not be until after the death of the reigning pontiff.

THOSE CONFIRMED.

Among the archbishops and bishops confirmed in their offices were Fergus P. McAvoy, Archbishop of Toronto; Neil McNeil, Archbishop of Vancouver; Charles P. Gauthier, Archbishop of Ottawa; Paul E. Roy, titular bishop of Edenthoropolis and auxiliary bishop of Quebec; Alexander MacDonald, Bishop of Victoria, (Canada); Michael F. Fallon, Bishop of London, Canada; Ovide Charlebois, apostolic vicar of Keewatin; Michael F. Power, Bishop of St. George, Newfoundland.

LARGE AUDIENCE HEARD MRS. DICKENSON'S LECTURE

The lecture by Mrs. C. D. Dickenson of Woodstock, in the Opera House last evening under the auspices of the W.C.T.U., on The March of the Feast, was listened to with deep interest by a large audience. Her grasp of the subject was broad and her thoughts were eloquently expressed. Her illustrations were for the most part Biblical, going back over four thousand years to the day when an entire people was cursed through a single disobedience.

The principal topic of her address, however, referred to the memorable occurrence when Vashti, the beautiful and modest, if somewhat wilful wife of the Persian king, refused to show herself to her husband and his invited nobles. She also referred to the Feast in Babylon, which occurred in the same century, when Belshazzar and a thousand of his nobles, while at their drunken orgies, beheld a ghastly hand writing; mysterious characters on the wall beside them, which none save Daniel, the Hebrew captive, could translate. "Weighed in the balance and found wanting," was their written doom. In convincing words the speaker proved that the history of alcohol is still repeating itself from that remote period until the present hour.

REVENUE STATEMENT.

The total territorial revenue for the year ending October 31st, is \$529,823.82. Stampage, \$367,641.02. Balance of stumpage, still uncollected, \$5,979.85. This shows that if all the stumpage accounts were collected the receipts for this year would be \$535,000.00. Last year the total territorial revenue was \$459,000.00.

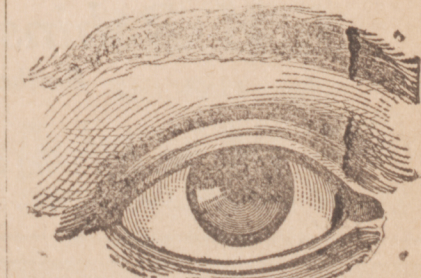
