## INSPECTION BOARD COMPLETES LABORS

Havana, Nov. 27.—The Maine inspection board will start for home some day this week. It has already been amply demonstrated to them that the Maine was destroyed by an explosion which occurred under the ship a little to the port of the keel between 28 and 30 feet from where the outside skin was blown up and doubled over towards the starboard by the first explosion. After this the transverse armor bulkhead was blown off from the frame 25 feet by the second explosion and buried itself in the mud through the hole left by the first explosion, which removed that part of the bottom of the vessel.

## VICTORIA RIFLES PLAN BIG CELEBRATION

Montreal, Nov. 27.—An event unique in the annals of the Canadian militia is being planned by the officers and ex-commanding officers of the 3rd Victoria Rifles for next January, when they propose to celebrate with a big banquet, the fiftieth anniversary of the formation of the regiment. The regiment at present numbers 400 while there are thousands of its old members scattered through the Dominion and all over the world. A thousand will be present at the banquet.

When the Majestic went down earlier in the week she was obliged to cut her way through ice down as far as Hamstead from Fredericton and the cold snap on Saturday resulted in the lower reaches being bridged over.

## ITALIAN MURDERS MAN AT SYDNEY

Sydney, N. S., Nov. 25.—Lewis McLarren, a native of Prince Edward Island, was shot and instantly killed at Reserve this afternoon by an Italian miner named Dominick Baptisto. The men had been drinking and McLarren had struck Baptisto who left the room where they were talking and coming back in a few minutes with a revolver fired two shots at McLarren both entering the head.

## AMATEUR BILLIARD TOURNAMENT

New York, Nov. 25.—With an entry list which comprises a number of the leading amateur billiard players of the United States, the eleventh annual tournament to decide the national amateur 18.2 ball line championship opens tonight at Maurice Daly's Academy in this city. The tournament is the first of five big championship affairs which the National Association of Amateur Billiard Players has mapped out for the present winter. The entry list is headed by Charles E. White, the present holder of the championship title. Other entrants who are well known because of their participation in former tournaments are George Clarke, Mark Muldaur, Dr. Eric C. Beck, C. L. Conway, J. M. Millette and Claude Lewis. Two newcomers this year are Charles Heddon of Dowagiac Mich., and Walton Leonard of Scranton, Pa.

sixty prisoners, some of whom are the sons of aristocrats. Afterwards they held an orgy cutting out the hearts of victims some of which they roasted and ate. Some of the missionaries from upriver stations have sought refuge at Hong Kong. Companies of troops patrolled the streets of Hong Kong and Kowloon on Sunday with fixed bayonets. This was done with a view to prevent the recurrence of recent disturbances. Some rioting and stone throwing occurred and two persons were injured slightly.

### DISORDER NEAR PEKIN

Shanghai, Nov. 27.—Reports of murders of foreigners in the provinces of Shen-Si and Shan-Si have been received here with the greatest apprehension. It is quite evident that a strong element of Boxerism remains within the sphere of Peking where the government might be expected to be in control. Throughout the south which is held by the revolutionaries not a single case even of injury to foreign interests except what might be attributed to accident has occurred. Trade has been prostrated and there is a growing feeling among the merchants that some definite action should be taken to prevent further murders by the Boxers who are in no way connected with the revolutionaries, while on the other hand the revolutionaries are defeating the missionaries and punishing with death, offenders throughout the vast trading districts in South and Central China. The commercial houses of all nationalities are losing heavily.

### IMPERIAL GENERAL CONFIDENT

Peking, Nov. 27.—Lieutenant General Fenz Kwo Chang, in command of the imperial force at Hankow reports that he expects to recapture the town of Han Yang. His troops drove the revolutionists out of Heizun and Metzush in force last evening and captured Tortoise Hill this morning.

## STOLEN MONEY RETURNED

St. John, Nov. 27.—A pocket book containing the sum of four hundred dollars was stolen from the pocket of a coat belonging to Mr. H. C. Olive at Black's Bowling Alleys on Saturday afternoon. Last evening Mrs. Olive heard her door bell ring and on going to the door found the pocket book containing all the money lying on the step, where someone had placed it, and immediately run away.

## DEATH AT HOPEWELL HILL

Hopewell, Hill, Nov. 27.—Mrs. R. Chesley (Smith) died suddenly after undergoing an operation yesterday. The deceased is fifty-three years old and is survived by her husband and ten children.

### GREY MAKES STATEMENT.

London, Nov. 27.—Sir Edward Grey, foreign secretary, delivered his long awaited speech on the international political situation in the House of Commons this afternoon. He declared that the statement of Herr Von Kiderlin-Wascheter, the German foreign secretary, was incomplete and therefore it was not necessary for him to make a fuller statement of the position by the British foreign office before the House of Commons.

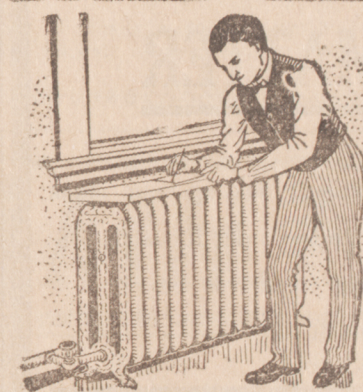
