The value of the registered mail stolen is not known, but the letters are said to contain several thousand dollars.

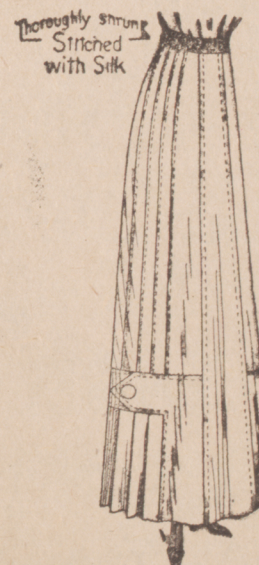
