the crowd but all got safely. The
frame construction caused the build-
ing to burn quickly. It was insured
for \$10,000 which will almost cover
the loss.

RECIPROCITY DEBATE CONTINUED AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—Commercial union
followed by annexation to the United
States is all that the Conservative
opposition in the Canadian parlia-
ment can see in the reciprocity agree-
ment. This sentiment dominated a
three hours' speech by Hon. George
E. Foster today.

In the days of the Conservative
government Mr. Foster was finance
minister and tariff maker for his ad-
ministration and, therefore, speaks
with authority for his own side.

The debate at Ottawa will be a very
long one. Almost every member is
preparing a speech and it is expected
that it will be three weeks before a
vote is reached.

This afternoon Mr. Foster opened a
declaration that the result of the re-
ciprocity agreement "Yankee trusts
and money interests would own or
control Canada's natural resources."

It was the thin end of the wedge
which would be driven home until
there was absolute free trade be-
tween Canada and the United States
with a tariff wall against the rest
of the world. The agreement had
"forever dished Canada's chance of
obtaining a preference from Britain.
There is now no chance for preference
being established within the British
empire. The project of the Hon. Jos.
Chamberlain has been given its
death blow."

Mr. Foster said "Canadians would
become hewers of wood and drawers
of water for the United States. The
mines, forests and fields of Canada
would be exploited by American manu-
facturers and there was an end to
the movements of American indus-
trial concerns across the interna-
tional boundary line."

He said "the sentiment in the United
States, which is pushing recipro-
city on is not based on economic, but
on political grounds, and has for its
object the conquest of Canada by
peaceful means. From the bottom of
my heart I believe that there is dan-
ger ahead and this path will lead us
away from Britain."

LIBERALS CHEER CONGRESS AC- TION

On the reassembling of the House
tonight the announcement of the tele-
graphic message recording the pass-
ing of the reciprocity agreement by
the United States House of representa-
tives was greeted by prolonged
cheering.

"Are you sure it's right?" queried
Mr. Lennox cynically, while the
House laughed.

MR. NEELY

Mr. Neely, who followed Mr. Fos-
ter, directed attention to the fact that
the question of obtaining better trade
relations with the United States was
not a very new one. He reminded
the House, amid Liberal applause,
that the present negotiations were
opened with a pilgrimage from Wash-
ington to Ottawa.

Touching upon the immediate bene-
fits of the agreement, the Westerner
predicted the establishment of a sam-
ple market at Winnipeg. The millers
of the West and Ontario would then
be compelled to compete with those
of the United States and the farmer
would get the full value of his grain.

Referring to the cattle trade of Al-
berta, he quoted the president of the
United Farmers of that province, who
declared that the agreement would
"revolutionize the cattle trade of the
province and solve the rate question
by forcing down the freight rates and
benefitting every cattle raiser."

Continuing, Mr. Neely exposed the
inconsistency of the Western Conser-
vative member in advocating the re-
duction of the tariff on agricultural
implements, while the opposition as
a whole, was pledged to the protec-
tion of the manufacturer.

The fiscal position of the Conserva-
tive members was "A piece of mental
gymnastics," which he could not un-
derstand. In this connection, he re-
ferred to the appeal to Sir Wilfrid
Laurier being circulated in various
newspapers and wanted to know what
organization was paying for the ad-
vertisement.

He ridiculed the argument that the
agreement would injure the transpor-
tation lines in Canada and declared
its effect would be rather to multiply
them, not only north and south, but
east and west.

Dealing with the British preference,
he pointed out that Mr. Foster
should be the last man to combat it
upon that ground, since when the
British preference proposal was sub-
mitted by the government the mem-
ber for North Toronto assumed a po-
sition of absolute opposition to it.

MR. BURRELL

Mr. Burrell (Yale-Cariboo) declared
the government's proposals to be re-
volutionary. It was idle, he said, to
suggest that the Conservative party
had stood for reciprocity up to the
present. There was no lessening of
the desire to maintain friendly rela-
tions with the nation to the south,
but for years there had been a hard-
ening of the conviction that Canada
was able to work out her own salva-
tion, economic and otherwise.

OTTAWA FACES A SMALLPOX OUTBREAK

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—The typhoid epi-
demic total today is 564 cases, an
increase of about 20 since yesterday
and a half dozen deaths have occur-
ed within the past 24 hours.

The fact that the disease is not
abating, though the water is now
supposed to be pure, is explained by
the medical health officer as due to
the reason that in some cases, the
typhus germ when taken into the
system, does not incubate for four
weeks or more.

There are also fears of a smallpox
outbreak of serious proportions and
the health department is advising
general vaccination. There are five
cases of this disease.
