SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

"WHAT IS WOMANLY?"

This was the subject of an address given at the New Reform Club, London, by Mr. Laurence Housman, the writer. The Countess de Labelle presided.

Mr. Hourman said he was there rather to ask the question than to lay down any litigation or rules. They could not judge what was womanly merely on the lines of past convention produced under circumstances very different to those of our own day, but they must give to woman the right to make their own successes and their own failures. What was thought womanly three hundred years ago, in the time of Queen Elizabeth, or even sixty years ago, in the time of Queen Victoria, would not be regarded as typical of womanhood today.

Many people would tell them it was womanly to be self-sacrificing and unselfish, but he contended that it was not womanly for a woman to deny herself any comfort in order that someone else might over-indulge. Dealing with the efforts which had been made by women in the past, he referred to the case of Florence Nightingale, who had succeeded in a department which was at the time regarded as opposed to all the conventions of what was womanly. It was said that to devote to public use the experience which had been gained in the home was incompatible with womanly modesty, but she was prepared to let her womanly modesty look after itself, and she lived down her critics. She became one of the most conspicuously successful generals in that disastrous campaign, and the results of her work had elevated nursing to an honored profession.

MONCTON CLINCHED PRO CHAMPIONSHIP LAST NIGHT

Defeated Halifax 6 to 3 at Moncton in Fast Game—Series Will be Played for Starr Trophy—Moncton Will Challenge for Stanley Cup.

Moncton, N.B., Feb. 14.—Before 2,000 excited hockey enthusiasts, the Moncton professionals tonight defeated the Halifax Crescents by a score of 6 to 3 and clinched the Maritime Provinces professional championship. As anticipated, the game was the fastest seen in Moncton rink, and the teams were very evenly matched. Moncton's fast combination play, combined with the star game played by Wortman, in goal, carried them to victory.

It was a great spectators' game, being remarkably free of penalties and abounding in sensational fast runs. Halifax played a strenuous game and their failure to score several times when only the goal keeper was between the nets and the man with the puck was due to over-anxiety. Moncton, on the other hand, when opportunity presented itself to score, took advantage of the opening, shooting with greater accuracy and using better judgment in passing.

MONCTON SCORES.

The game had hardly got under way when Moncton scored the first goal amid great excitement. The struggle was characterized by numerous offside plays, Halifax being the chief offenders in this respect and losing their advantage on many occasions. The game was so fast that the visitors paid little attention to offside, with the result that there were more face-offs than has been seen in any of the contests.

HALIFAX PULLS UP.

In the first half Moncton scored three goals to Halifax's none, but in the second half, after the home team added one more goal, Halifax netted the rubber three times in quick succession. If possible, the game then became faster, Moncton acting more on the aggressive and while the defence played strong the forwards kept the Halifax goal tender busy stopping shots.

With the score 4 to 3 in Moncton's favor the excitement was intense, but Moncton added two more, doubling the score and preventing Halifax from tallying. Wortman however, was kept busy stopping shots which looked good.

GAME IN DETAIL.

Scott, on a pass from Norman, first lound the net for Moncton and a minute or two later Bishop made a great stop off Crockett's shot. After the face-off in the Halifax end, the visitors carried the rubber to Moncton's end and Doran cleared, making a sensational run, passing to Nicholls, who scored Moncton's number two. An offside in Moncton's end gave Wortman a chance to stop a hot one. The puck went to the Halifax end and Scott was sent to the boards for tripping on face-off near the Halifax goal. Nicholls from the side netted the puck, a very difficult shot.

SECOND HALF.

The first half ended, Moncton 3, Halifax 0. Within a minute or so after play was resumed Moncton scored goal four. On the face-off Weaver took the puck up but Doran, with a fast combination run, carried the puck to Halifax goal, but the shot was blocked. Play then went to the Moncton end and the defence were kept busy. Halifax made a determined effort to score and with a little more coolness must have succeeded. The second goal for Halifax was made by Weaver on a long shot. At the face-off the puck travelled back and forth with lightning rapidity, Norman starting with a good run. Halifax missed an easy chance to score. Condon shortly after missed another opening and Nicholls, with an end-to-end run relieved, but Weaver brought it back and on the pass Halifax found the nets for their second goal. A minute later Condon registered Halifax's third goal. Moncton backed up and the game became faster, Crockett had a good run and a little later Nicholls starred in a run, resulting in Moncton making the score 5-3. Weaver, Wilkie, Crockett and Doran had long runs. Weaver carried the puck to the Moncton end, but the shot was wide. Norman caught the puck and carried it the whole length of the ice and scored in sensational style.

Territory play from this out was fairly even, but neither side was able to score, the game ending, Moncton 6, Halifax 3.

Play was as fast as the finish as

when it started and the large crowd left the rink realizing they had witnessed star hockey, marked by clean, hard play, by thoroughly trained teams between which there seemed little to choose. Geo. Trites and Fred Delahunt refereed with entire satisfaction and it was a case of the best team won.

Notice of Legislation

The City of Fredericton will present at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, of New Brunswick Bills for enactment as follows:

(1) A Bill to extend the Water, Fire and Light limits of the City of Fredericton from O'Dell Avenue to the Hermitage (so called) and for authority to issue debentures in aid of such extension.

(2) A Bill in aid of John Palmer Company, Limited, authorizing the City to enter into an agreement with the Company to guarantee and pay interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on ten thousand dollars of the Company's debentures for the space of ten years, upon the erection by the Company of a new Factory and Warehouse in this city at a cost of not less than twenty-five thousand dollars, to provide a free site for such Factory and Warehouse by paying ground rent for the period of twenty-one years, and to grant exemption from taxes on such buildings of the company and free water from the city system for the period of ten years.

(3) A Bill revising and amending the Civic Election Laws of the City of Fredericton, and to provide for a secret ballot thereat, and the election of the Mayor and Aldermen for two years, one Alderman for each ward being elected annually.

(4) A Bill to confirm the issue of Street Debentures.
