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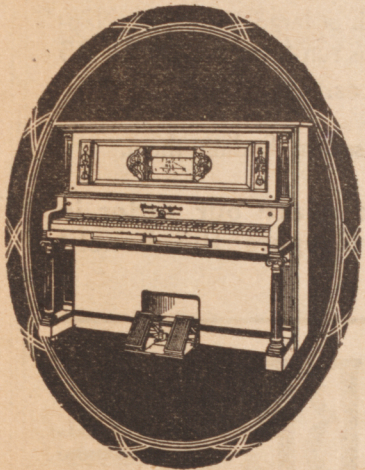

THE MISSES YOUNG

WELL DESERVED TRIBUTE TO PREMIER MURRAY

(Halifax Recorder.)

Our Tory contemporary, with all the exquisite taste and breadth of view which do not characterize it, has essayed to belittle the significance of the banquet to be given in honor of Premier Murray by attempting to belittle that gentleman and his record. Probably silent contempt would be the most fitting answer to the putrescence of such an attack, but nevertheless we may be pardoned for so far noticing the article as to recall a few facts in connection with Mr. Murray's political history. When as a young man, or mere youth in fact, he entered the political field in a modest way, the Tory party was in full control everywhere. The passing resourcefulness of Sir John A. Macdonald, the glamour of the National Policy, the "Black Hand" methods of the "jerry-mander," the skilful and thoroughly unscrupulous use of the patronage list, the wholesale and cleverly organized system of graft, the boundless and unblushing bribery, and all the crafty manipulation of the most corrupt methods by the most corrupt gang which ever dominated the politics of any country, all combined to keep the country in the iron grip of a party which looked upon that country as existing chiefly to be misruled and plundered. No Liberal could hold any office, even the meanest, under this political regime. In fact, in many parts of the country, to be a Liberal was to be treated as a pariah and have every obstacle thrown in the way of advancement or even the making of a living. From Federal ward heeler down to County Councillor, or pound-keeper, everything was Tory in person and in essence. Especially was all this the case in an intensified degree in Cape Breton County. Into such an unpromising field and amid such apparently hopeless conditions, young Murray appeared. He was forced to begin at the beginning, and had to fight his way upward, contesting every inch of the way. The odds were tremendous, and all were against him, but he had youth, courage and brains on his side. Under such circumstances it is not surprising that he was baffled at first, the wonder being that he could make any headway or even dare the

event at all. But he never failed to stand up to his opponents, and to "come back" after each repulse with ardor undimmed and with courage unabated. Gradually his persistence began to tell. One after another of his opponents, though backed by such overwhelming advantages, began to give ground before his attack. No pluckier fight was ever put up in Nova Scotia by the Young Murray against the veteran of many battles, the greatest campaigner of which Toryism has ever boasted, Sir Charles Tupper. The youthful gladiator was defeated, but at a cost which staggered the party of the victor. Appointed to the Council, Mr. Murray was chosen leader on Mr. Fielding's entrance into Federal affairs. As head of his party he has appealed to the electorates four times, and four times has his party been returned to power and himself personally elected by overwhelming majorities. Where are Mr. Murray's old opponents now? The youth who fought Toryism at the outset under such apparently hopeless circumstances has been for fifteen years the honored leader of a Government against which no charge of corruption has ever been made, no accusation of graft proven; a Government whose legislative record has been one of wonderful accomplishment, and under the auspices of which Nova Scotia has prospered as never before. Such is the man and such is his record whom the Liberals of Halifax are to honor with a banquet in a short time. Are any of his opponents worthy of being mentioned in the same breath with him? If personal defeat at the beginning of a career is to be looked upon as cancelling all claims to honor and regard, what must we say of a man who like Mr. Tanner, has met with smashing defeats after years of experience and years of playing at party leadership, and for whom even at this late hour there is no hope of success in sight, and of whom it may be said, "the older he grows the more numerous and irreparable become his failures." Of Mr. Murray it may be said, "The battle fought in youth is over; The guerdon gained, the fame secure. From envious tongues."

London, Feb. 14.—The London morning papers are much excited over the reported intention of the union of South Africa to propose at the Imperial conference that contributions toward local and imperial defence should be substituted for a preferential tariff.

Premier Botha had Dr. Jameson, the Unionist leader and ex-premier of Cape Colony, in response to telegraphic inquiries, both wired stating that there was no intention to raise the question of the abolition of preference on British manufactures at the conference.

THINK DR. NESBITT IS NEAR TORONTO

Toronto, Feb. 14.—Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, first president of the Farmers' Bank, is probably within 150 miles of Toronto. It is probable that he is more or less in regular communication with at least four people in this city by telegraph, mail and telephone.

The charges against Dr. Nesbitt not extraditable. The authorities declare that there is no charge that can be laid against him that could be sustained in contested extradition proceedings. Therefore no police circulars are dogging the footsteps of the fat and jovial doctor, and banking facilities are sufficiently convenient to make life close to the border worth living. The police have every reason to believe that he is beyond Canadian jurisdiction and they do not doubt that he is in a comfortable room in a high class hotel far beyond the border.

JUSTICE TO THE FARMERS

(Huntingdon "Gleaner.") If Mr. Foster himself had negotiated the terms the manufacturers could not have fared better. Why then do they oppose it? On the general principle that they look upon the farmers as their special prey and are afraid the agreement may lead to their getting out of their control. The agreement restores to the farmers part of their rights—that of selling their products where they see fit. The rails of the fence which have prevented them from dickering with their neighbors have been lifted, and the manufacturers don't like it; they desire a Chinese wall that would compel the farmers not only to buy, but to sell where they dictate. The agreement is an instalment of the justice which our farmers asked, and is to be welcomed and supported by them as such. We give Mr. Fielding the credit of having rendered the farmers a great service, and should a clamor be raised that is likely to impede the carrying out of what he has arranged to get for them, it will be their duty to bring pressure on their representatives.

SHOOTING FRACAS

Colt, Ont., Feb. 14.—Meagre news was received here yesterday of a shooting fracas at Porcupine. James Paget, a railway man, went to the gold camp after an absence on work on the road, and it is alleged, found another man at his home. Paget shot the intruder, the bullet entering his mouth and coming out below the left ear. Paget was arrested.
