COL. SAM HUGHES AND PLANET MARS

(Toronto Star)

We do not believe that the fierce red god Mars was ever quite as busy as Colonel and Honorable Sam Hughes. He strides from sea to sea. He makes no account of oceans. Having returned from Vancouver, where he made a speech that ruffled even the Pacific, he packs his bag for England and the Continent. The hero never rests. His life is continual forced marches.

Colonel the Honorable Sam got home to Ottawa last Thursday. Using Friday and Saturday—short enough time, goodness knows—to shake hands with the generals, admirals, and brigadiers at the Rideau Club, and taking Sunday for his devotions, Colonel the Honorable Sam speeds by this Monday morning's train to Brockville, where he unveils a monument to Sir Isaac Brock. On Tuesday he is at Quebec reviewing a Yankee regiment on the Plains of Abraham. On Wednesday he is on the Atlantic bidding the waves be still, because he has a soul that no tumult can make seasick. Typo brass is that stout heart of his which now crosses the boundless deep.

Colonel the Honorable Sam will attend the army manoeuvres in England, where he hopes to cast a pitying glance on Major-General Hutton, a fat man on a fat horse, sniffling dust, toiling past him, grand and at ease with field marshals at the reviewing point. He will visit France, where, being of Huguenot descent, like Premier Bourgeois, he will be a great encouragement to the entente cordiale to behave itself. Alone and single-handed, he will invade Germany and tackle the war scare on its native heath, tweaking its nose, lashing its eyes, and walloping it on the point of the jaw, but in a diplomatic way. If anything can throw panic into the German army put the fear of the Lord in the Minister of War, and take the curl out of the Kaiser's moustache it will be the knowledge that Colonel the Honorable Sam Hughes, vanquisher of the Boers, and hero of the Hutton correspondence is in their midst.

Colonel the Honorable Sam will visit France and Germany on a peace footing, so to speak. That is to say, he will not take his staff of six colonels with him. He will throw behind in England to study hydroplanes, high balls, and other tactics.

These colonels which are part of Colonel the Honorable Sam's pride of stat when he honors Great Britain with his presence, correspond to the Saki, or priests in full armor, who danced in front of Mars' image whenever it moved abroad. But inaccurate people must not pursue this analogy too far. It is quite true that Mars, like Colonel the Honorable Sam, is the god of war and wind and storm and hot language, but he had many things in the course of his life which our Minister of Militia as a church member could not approve of. Mars, it is true, was the patron of war horses, but Colonel Sam has had more official experience buying automobiles. Mars was very active in summer, just as Colonel Sam is, and quiet in winter, just as Colonel Sam is in the House of Commons, but here the likeness ends. Colonel the Honorable Sam is greater and better than Mars, for Colonel the Honorable Sam is elected by the people, and in our democracy a person of Mars' scented record never could be. —Toronto Star.

MR BONAR LAW IN AUTO COLLISION

Margate, Ang., Aug. 27—Andrew Bonar Law, the leader of the Unionist party suffered a shock in a motor car collision near the seaside resort, late last night.

Mr. Law had been playing golf and was returning in his car with a companion, along the route from Ramsgate, when another automobile containing two men and two women travelling in the opposite direction, dashed into them. Both cars were irreparably damaged, and their occupants were extremely fortunate in escaping with a few bruises and a bad jolting.

LAWYERS BEGIN MEETING

Gregory of Chicago called the gathering to order and delivered his annual address before several hundred eminent representatives of the bench and bar of the United States and Canada.

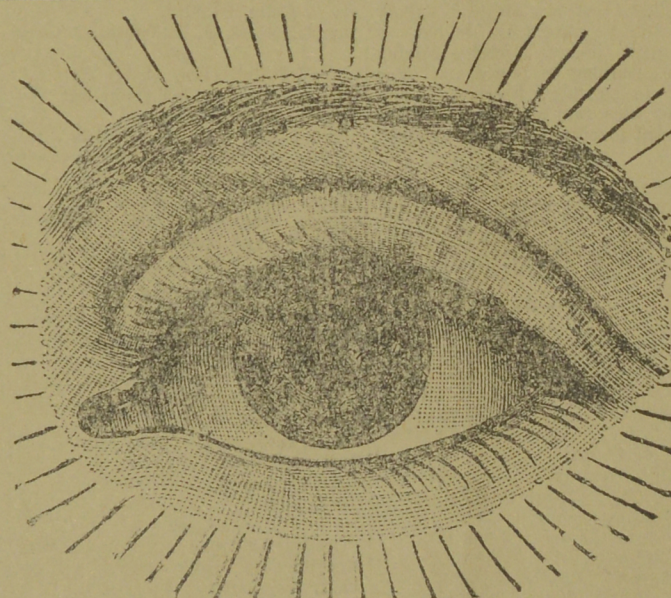

AMBITIOUS PLANS OF L AND N

New York, Aug. 28—In railroad and financial circles a lively interest is displayed in the meeting of the directors of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company here tomorrow, when it is expected that important details concerning the ambitious plans for the enlargement of the L. and N. system will be made known. The announced purpose of the meeting is to authorize an addition of \$40,000,000 to the capital stock of the company and to consider plans for spending the proceeds of the new issue.

According to stories circulated in Wall Street the L. and N. is to purchase the entire Cotton Belt System operating nearly 2,000 miles of road principally in Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas. In addition to this move the Louisville and Nashville, it is said, will strengthen its hold on the Southern field by making important extensions and additions to its system in eastern Kentucky. The fulfillment of these plans will serve to establish a complete air line from north to south producing States to Mobile, Ala., and at the same time give the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis road, whose entire capital is owned by the Louisville and Nashville a direct outlet to the sea.
