 for license has been made.

 next trip to Halifax, for the Perry  
 sails tomorrow.

## TO DISCUSS MUNICIPAL PROBLEMS

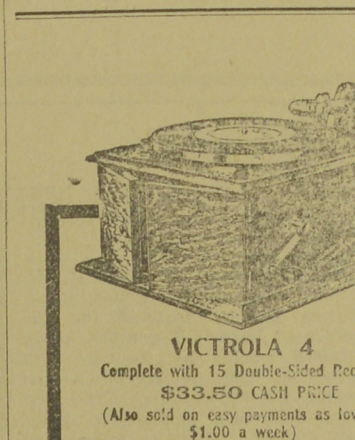
Windsor, Ont., Aug. 27—Delegates

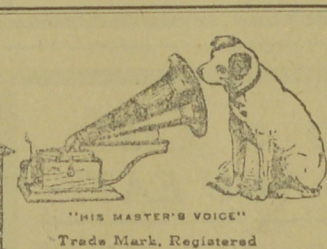

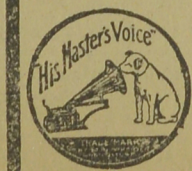

FIERCE FIRE  
IN LONDON  
POST OFFICE

London, Aug. 24—London tonight  
 is entirely cut off from telegraphic  
 communication with the rest of the  
 country and with the continent, and  
 for a time connection with America  
 was severed, as the result of a fierce  
 fire which broke out in the general  
 post office, in which building the cen-  
 tral telegraphic office is situated, and  
 where all the wires of the service are  
 concentrated.

While the fire was extremely fierce,  
 no lives were lost and the damage  
 was confined to the inside of the  
 building.

A thousand employees, a majority of  
 them being women, got out from the  
 structure promptly and without pan-  
 ic. The telegraph service to and from  
 the capital will be crippled for sev-  
 eral days.

The fire started at 7 o'clock this  
 evening and was caused by the fusing  
 of a wire in a test box on the fourth  
 floor. The gallery affected was soon  
 filled with volumes of thick smoke.  
 The building sustained no structural  
 damage, but the losses to cables and  
 instruments and furniture were very  
 heavy, the furniture suffering from  
 the tons of water which the fire en-  
 gines poured in and which streamed  
 through the whole building.

The entire fire brigade of the east  
 and of London, covering a radius of  
 several miles, soon was on the scene  
 with a big salvage corps. By 8  
 o'clock tonight the fire was over and  
 the engines had ceased to pump wa-  
 ter into the building. The lighting ap-  
 paratus was out of commission, how-  
 ever, and a strange scene was present-  
 ed as the salvage men groped about  
 the huge structure with lanterns and  
 with candles flickering dimly.

Thousands of wires underneath the  
 floors had fused and the firemen were  
 forced to tear up part of the floors to  
 get at the flames, the work being ex-  
 ceedingly dangerous.

## GOV. JOHNSON TO TAKE THE STUMP

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 27—Gov-  
 ernor Hiram Johnson, the Progress-  
 ive candidate for vice-president,  
 starts today on a campaigning tour  
 that will probably last two months  
 and will cover a large section of the  
 country. The most attention will be  
 given to the East. Governor John-  
 son expects to deliver his first im-  
 portant speech at the New York  
 State convention of the Progressive  
 party early in September.

## TO CELEBRATE TIN-PLATE ANNIVERSARY

Elwood, Ind., Aug. 28—Governor  
 Thomas E. Marshall, former Vice-  
 President Charles W. Fairbanks and  
 Daniel G. Reid, the New York multi-  
 millionaire and one of the pioneers  
 of the tin-plate industry in America  
 are to be the central figures of a  
 gathering to be held here early next  
 month in celebration of the twen-  
 tieth anniversary of the inaugura-  
 tion of the first American tin-plate  
 plant. All three of the notables  
 named were present in 1892 when  
 the tin-plate plant was formally op-  
 ened in this city with an oration by  
 William McKinley, at that time gov-  
 ernor of Ohio and later president of  
 the United States.

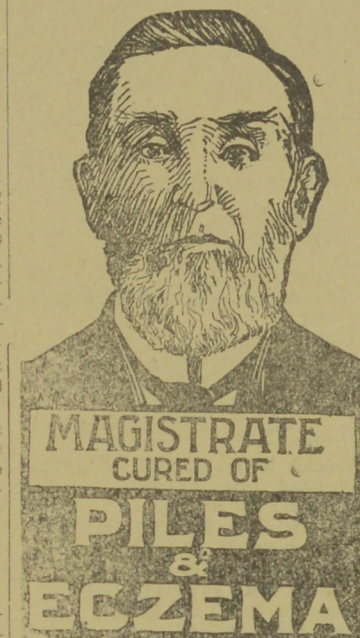
MRS. ROSENTHAL

 prosecution.

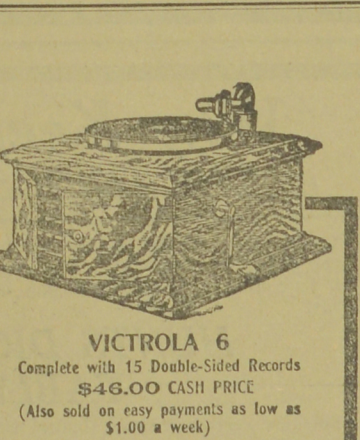
## MOTOR BOAT RACES AT ASTORIA
