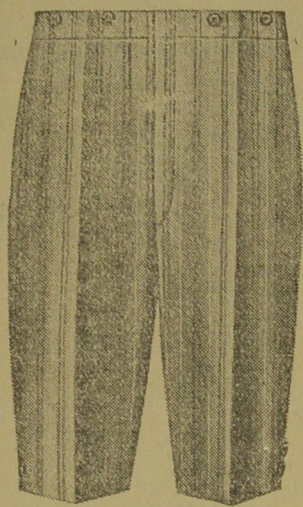

CHINESE BRIGANDS
ATTACKED A TRAIN

Hong Kong, Aug. 27—Several hundred of Chinese brigands today attacked a running train at Fuyuen on the line from Canton to Hankow. The engineer, in spite of a hail of bullets, refused to put on the brakes. Several of the trainmen and passengers were wounded and the cars considerably damaged.

When the train reached the market town of Nowot it was found impossible to proceed farther as the rails had been torn up.

The town itself had been completely sacked by the brigands, many of whom are discharged soldiers. They are increasing in numbers and temerity daily.

There is much alarm among the village and country populations and troops have been hurriedly despatched to the scene from Canton.

AWARDING OF CONTRACT
WILL BE DELAYED

Ottawa, Aug. 27—Owing to the difficulty which the government has encountered in securing tenders for the construction of a dry dock at Quebec, the question is under consideration of calling for tenders which will combine the construction of both dock and wharves. For the latter works estimated to cost two million dollars, seven tenders have already been received but no award has been made yet. In the event of the government determining to combine the two propositions the calling of new tenders would be necessary. When tenders were called for a dock at Levis some time ago only one tender was received and that was merely for a contract and not a private enterprise. It is considered that 3 1/2 per cent. subsidy is not sufficient.

A precedent for the combining of the two contracts as proposed above is found in the Courtenay Bay wharf and dock contract, let to the Norton Griffiths Company last spring at St. John.

Among the bidders for the wharves are Sir John Jackson, the great English contractor; the St. Lawrence Dock Co., M. E. & J. T. Davis, and Horace Dunant. The awarding of the wharf contracts will be delayed pending further consideration of the proposed joint contract.

ROOSEVELT GOES TO VERMONT

Montpelier, Aug. 28—Colonel Roosevelt is coming to Vermont tomorrow to begin a three days' speech-making tour of the State. He is scheduled to deliver his first speech tomorrow afternoon at Bennington and later he will be heard at Rutland, Burlington, Middlebury, St. Albans and several other of the principal cities and towns.

In view of the long-time reputation of Vermont as "the barometer State" in presidential campaigns, Colonel Roosevelt and his followers are naturally anxious that the Progressive party shall make a good showing in the State election here next Tuesday. The same is true of the Republicans and Democrats. All parties are sending their best spell binders into the State to aid in the close of the campaign.

The Progressives hope to make a big out in the normal Republican plurality, even if they do not win the election. With few exceptions, Vermont's normal Republican plurality of 25,000 has been followed by a Republican victory in the nation in November following. If the third party succeeds in materially reducing the plurality next week it will be accepted as a good omen by Colonel Roosevelt and his adherents.

Realizing the fight they have ahead of them, the Republicans are redoubting their efforts this year to maintain the normal plurality. Because of the significance which that plurality has been shown to have with respect to the result in November throughout the country, the Vermont Republicans have received the assistance of the national organization to considerable extent.

BRAMWELL BOOTH'S

CAPTAIN TAYLOR IMPROVING.

The many friends of Captain Chas. Taylor of Sheffield, will be glad to hear that his health is rapidly improving. For the last month he has been suffering from stomach trouble and until the last week was confined to his bed. At present he is able to be up around the house, but has not been allowed out. Captain Taylor has the sympathy of a large number of river men and merchants who are in the habit of transacting business at the river boats. This summer he made a new venture and practically built the river steamer Ocone to handle the suburban traffic between Indiantown and Wickham. Two weeks after the new boat went on the route he was taken suddenly ill at Wickham and the boat was returned to Indiantown in charge of her crew, while her captain was taken to his home. The boat has been idle at her moorings ever since for want of a captain. The enterprise has been a losing one so far as this season is concerned.

FOR REPRESENTATIVE SLEMP'S SEAT

Bristol, Va., Aug. 28—Republicans of the Ninth Virginia district rounded up here today to select a candidate for Congress to succeed Representative Campbell Slemp, who for several years has had the distinction of being the only Republican member of the Virginia delegation in the National House of Representatives. Mr. Slemp could have had a re-nomination without opposition, but a short time ago he decided that he would retire to private life to devote himself to his business interests. The indication is that the nomination will go to L. P. Summers, an intimate friend and political associate of Congressman Slemp. The Democrats have selected as their nominee Gen. Rufus A. Ayers of Big Stone Gap, a distinguished Confederate veteran and at one time attorney general of Virginia.
