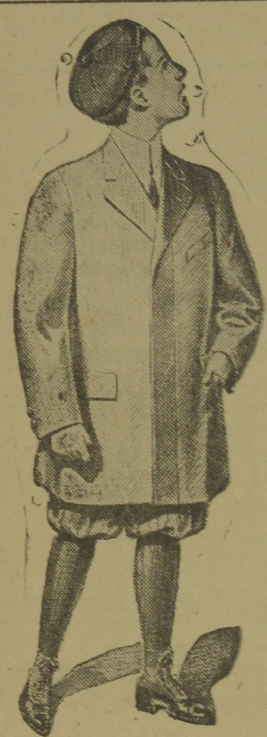

RUBE MARQUARD HEADS NATIONAL LEAGUE PITCHERS

Has Won 25 out of 32 Games---
Joe Wood of Red Sox Leading
Americans

"Rube" Marquard's two wins sent him up many points in the standing of the National League pitchers, and he would have been next to the top of the list when Wagner of Pittsburgh, dropped a game had not Kroh of the Boston Braves, secured the credit for winning the first game for which he has been held responsible since he joined the team.

Marquard has now won 25 games, losing 5, and continues to run a close race with Joe Wood of the American League, for premier honors for the majors. Leifield with his seven wins and a defeat, it keeping just a shade ahead of Marquard in per cent., but the big Giant has everything his own way compared with the pitchers who have been doing regular turn work.

Lately Christy Mathewson's cunning has not been as apparent as it was, his last win just turning his figures by .700. Hendrix of Pittsburgh and Reulbach of Chicago, are close on Matty's heels and both have been doing just as good work as "Big Six" this season.

DAVE DONALD TO DIRECT PLAY FROM THE BENCH

Marathons Make Change in Their Arrangements Which are Thought to be for Better

The St. John Standard today says: "D. B. Donald is now in sole control of the Marathon baseball team and will accompany the Greeks when away from home as well as looking after them on the home grounds. The owners of the team claim that there has not been the best of judgment in some of the games and also that the discipline has been rather lax. The management has decided that in future certain rules will be observed by players and fines imposed for failure to live up to them.

"The reason for the change is largely due to a feeling that for money spent on the team the brand of baseball which such money should buy has not been forthcoming and that although the members of the team, as individual ball players, stand as well as any team in the league, the team work has been lacking and there has been poor judgment in the handling of the men at crucial times. In future Mr. Donald will act as bench manager and direct the playing of the Marathons.

"In yesterday's game it was felt that the Greeks, with the proper direction in the crises, should have won and that, as has been pointed out before, more games have been lost through poor management than through errors on the part of individual players. Hence the change decided upon.

KELLY COMES BACK

Memphis, Aug. 26.—Danny Cullen of Los Angeles, had the better of the early rounds of his eight-round contest with Leo Kelly of St. Louis, at the Phoenix A. C. tonight, but Kelly made up in the final sessions and was awarded the decision. Young Jack Johnson of Boston, was testing Silas Green of New Orleans, who he was hit foul in the sixth. Green was disqualified.

BEN HOUSER BUYS FARM NEAR LEWISTON

Lewiston, Me., Aug. 27.—It has been learned that Ben Houser, first baseman of the Boston Nationals, has purchased the Edward Moore farm in Litchfield, near this city, and will make his winter home there in the future.

Mrs. Houser, who was formerly Miss Gladys Gupit of this city, has been in Lewiston for a few days and made the purchase. She returned to Boston and will later go to Philadelphia, where Mr. and Mrs. Houser have made their home. They plan to come here soon at the close of the season and remain at the farm until the time for spring practice.

Joe Wood the Boston Red Sox star, is the leading pitcher in the major leagues. Joe has come home a winner in 26 times out of 30 starts. The Detroit Tigers fell down badly on their eastern trip. Even the mighty Ty Cobb couldn't start anything that would help the Tigers climb.

Derrill Pratt is the only member of the St. Louis Browns batting for 300 or better and Konetchy and Huggins are the only Cardinals in the honor list.

The shift from Philadelphia to Boston must have been the right guess for John Titus. The veteran outfielder is producing the regular article for the Braves.

It is said that Manager McGraw of the New York Giants, is sweet on Arnold Hauser of the Cardinals, and would like to put over a trade for the clever shortstop.
