## PROVISIONS ADVANCE.

All grades of sugar have advanced in New York and although there has been no change in the local market, dealers are expecting prices to go up at any time. American pork went up fifty cents a barrel yesterday. Present quotations are \$27 flat for clear backs and \$25 for clear pork. The market is reported very firm.

## HEAVY SHOWER.

PROF. F. P. DAY  
RECEIVES OFFER FROM  
AMERICAN INSTITUTION

Professor of English at University of New Brunswick Wanted by College Near Pittsburg, Pa.---Senate to Consider Matter

SUCCESSOR MUST BE SECURED  
BEFORE PROF. DAY WILL LEAVE

It is understood that a change may take place in the faculty of the University of New Brunswick before the beginning of the academic year which opens on September 12th, but nothing definite is yet known. It is probable that an announcement concerning the matter will be made this week. Prof. F. P. Day, who has held the chair of English Language for the past three years, has been offered a position on the staff of an educational institution near Pittsburg, Pa. He will not leave the U. N. B., however, unless the Senate of the University can make arrangements whereby a substitute for him can be secured and with the beginning of the academic year so near it is expected to be difficult to obtain a professor.

Prof. Day since coming to the University of New Brunswick has proved himself a strong member of the faculty and has become deservedly popular with the students. His departure, if it comes about, will be generally regretted, not only by those connected with the University but also by citizens of Fredericton generally.

MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR  
LATE GENERAL BOOTH

To Be Held Sunday Evening at Salvation Army Citadel--Funeral Service This Evening.

The local corps of the Salvation Army is to hold memorial and funeral services for the late General William Booth, the head of that body. This evening there will be a funeral service at the S. A. Citadel, King Street, which is to be along lines similar to that of the great service to be held in Olympia Hall, London. At noon Thursday an hour will be devoted to prayer service. This will correspond in time to the burial of the dead general at Abbey Park Cemetery.

The local memorial service will be held on Sunday evening next. The clergymen and other prominent citizens will be invited to take part. Capt. White, who is in command of the local corps of the Salvation Army has received instructions with regard to the services, it being intended to have them held simultaneously where corps of the Army are located.

MARYSVILLE MAN  
DROPPED DEAD YESTERDAY

Richard H. Finnamore for Many Years Night Watchman At Cotton-Mill Died of Heart-Failure

Richard H. Finnamore, a well known resident of Marysville dropped dead at his home about six o'clock last evening. Death was due to heart failure. The deceased was aged eighty one years and for a long time was in the employ of the Gibson Manufacturing Company as night watchman at the cotton mill.

Five sons and three daughters survive. They are Charles, John and Harry of Marysville, Edward and Morton of Wisconsin, Mrs. John Long Mrs. Gordon Gilmore and Mrs. Minnie Cochrane of Marysville.

The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon. Service will be held at the late home of the deceased beginning at 2.30. Rev. Mr. Hicks assisted by Rev. Mr. Williams. The deceased was a member of the Loyal Orange Association and the funeral will be under the auspices of that order. Interment will be made at the Methodist Cemetery, Marysville.

BOY, DEAF AND DUMB, STRUCK  
BY C.P.R. TRAIN THIS MORNING

Leonard Madore, Aged six and Half Years, in Victoria Hospital With Fractured Skull--Outbound Train Struck Him Near Forest Hill Crossing--Failed to Notice Approach of Train--No Blame for Accident Attaches to Train-Crew

Leonard Madore, aged six and one-half years, son of Mr. William Madore of Morrison Mill, was struck by the C. P. R. train bound for Fredericton Junction at about ten o'clock this morning and received injuries which may result fatally, although it is yet impossible to make any definite statement concerning the matter. The accident occurred a short distance east of the Forest Hill railway crossing. The boy when struck by the train was thrown some distance. Dr. W. H. Irvine was called and ordered him removed to the Victoria Public Hospital at once. It was found that the base of the skull was fractured on both sides. After being at the hospital some time the child showed signs of returning consciousness but his condition is very serious.

## PLAYING ON TRACK.

The boy with another little brother was playing on the track when the outbound train, with Conductor McGovern in charge, came along. Both boys are deaf and dumb and were not aware of the approach of the train. Noblame for the accident attaches to the crew of the latter as under the circumstances the accident was unavoidable. One of the children escaped injury, leaving the track but the other was struck and thrown several yards, landing on the side of

the hill at the foot of which the railway runs.

## PHYSICIAN SUMMONED.

The train was brought to a stop as soon as possible and the conductor and other members of the crew hurried to where the boy was lying. Dr. Irvine was summoned by telephone and was soon on the scene. Before his arrival bystanders did what they could for the child. He was unconscious and was taken to the hospital in that condition.

The boy is one of a large family, residing at Morrison's Mills, and the accident has particularly sad features. His father was reported some time ago to have mysteriously disappeared but this afterward was found to be incorrect.

## BASEBALL TAG DAY.

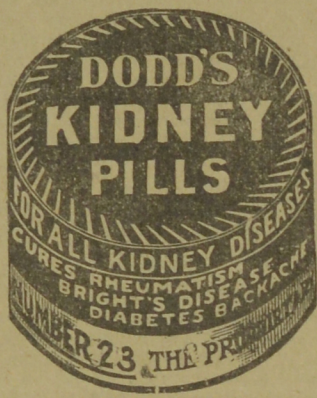

## FOR ALLEGED CAUSE.

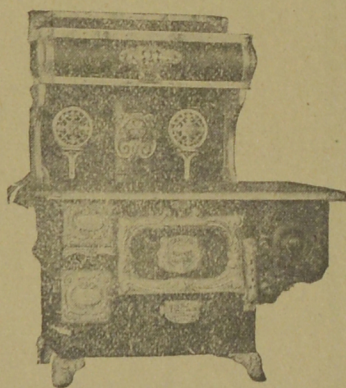
