TEACH CHILDREN
TO SPEAK ENGLISH

Montreal, Oct. 20—Canadian children's harsh vowels and rough manner of speaking were deplored last evening by Bishop Farthing in the course of an address of welcome to the Protestant teachers of the province at the evening session of their annual convention.

"Teach them to speak English, to breathe through their noses and to speak through their mouths as God intended them to do," said His Lordship. He considered it regrettable that Canadian children should lack culture and be unable to speak pleasing English, a condition which led many employers to prefer English boys to the Canadian youth in their offices and which might be largely overcome if Canadians could acquire a softer and more intonation in their vowels.

Labor unions in Colorado have bought a coal mine near Erie, which promises to furnish them fuel on twenty-year contracts at a price lower than current rates. It is a union project throughout. The mine is owned and worked by union men and the coal will be delivered to unionists by union teamsters.

The St. Louis labor leaders are endeavoring to land the headquarters of the International Association of Machinists which are to be moved from Washington, D.C. The only two places under consideration are St. Louis and Indianapolis. The machinists organization is second only to that of the United Mine Workers. It is stated that annually \$2,400,000 in dues and assessments is handled at headquarters. The new headquarters will be selected by a referendum vote.

A few days ago he started out for a little walk inland, following a survey line. Before going far he lost the line, though he walked to and fro all day he could not pick it up again. At night he built a fire and slept. Next day he set out again. Walking in a circle he only succeeded after a day's march in getting back to the remnant of his last night's fire. He was then without a match and had to sleep in the cold. Again next day and the succeeding night he walked about vainly trying to find the way out. He could hear shots and shouts of the searchers, and the sound of the breakers on the shores, but could not find any path out.

At last on the third day he found the trail to Cape Fife, but mistaking the direction walked further into the bush, where fortunately he was picked up by a settler.

During the whole time Mr. White subsisted on wild berries and is little the worse for his adventure. Nothing daunted by his experience, he is still firmly decided to spend the remainder of his days with his wife on Graham Island.

MOTHER AND CHILD
DIE TOGETHER

St. Thomas, Oct. 18—Failing to bring about a reconciliation with her husband or get support for herself and three-year-old child, Mrs. Margaret Pearson wife of "el" Pearson a Pere Marquette brakeman this evening deliberately ended the lives of herself and little one. Both were struck by a train at First Avenue, just within the city limits. Mrs. Pearson died just after she was discovered about 7 o'clock with her dead baby clutched tightly in her arms. The body of the child was badly mangled. An inquest will be opened tomorrow morning by Coroner Grant. Mrs. Pearson and her husband had been living apart, she and the child with her father, Peter Anderson of Sarnia, and he with his mother a dressmaker here.

Some days ago Mrs. Pearson came here and interviewed the County Attorney and Chief of Police in reference to laying a charge of non-support against Pearson. Sunday night she was noticed with her child down at the railway station, and was taken to the home of Mrs. Thomas Martin of Forest Street. This afternoon workmen say they saw mother and child wandering aimlessly about on First Avenue not far from where the bodies were later found. The two bodies were discovered by the crew of a C.P.R. engine running light. They were unable to stop in time and knocked the bodies to one side.

All the circumstances pointed to another train also striking the mother and her child.
