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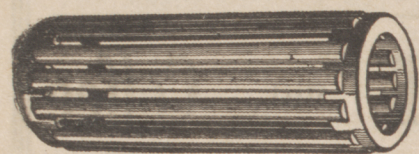

TurfSUPPORTERS OF
BALL CLUB OBJECT
TO CRITICISM

Fans are Sore Because Tift Was Singled Out as Cause of Woodstock's Victory

A large number of the supporters of the Fredericton Baseball team last evening expressed the strongest disapproval of statements published in both Fredericton and St. John to the effect that Tift the Fredericton right-fielder in Tuesday's game with Woodstock was largely responsible for the victory of the visitors. Strong objection is made to statements such as the following,—"while the score does not show any errors charged up against Ray Tift in right field, the former Brown University player's poor work was responsible for several of the Woodstock runs," also "the most disappointing part of the Fredericton team's work was Tift's playing in right field, his slowness in handling ground balls and poor throwing into the infield with men on bases giving Woodstock two or three more of their runs."

STRONG OBJECTION

A large section of the baseball public object to this player being singled out as the cause of the loss of a game in which it is generally recognized that Fredericton had an off day and in which both infield and outfield showed signs of disorganization. Tift made one poor throw to the infield. The others were too long to catch the base-runners who were safe by a close margin. In justice to Tift who pitched the six inning exhibition game in the evening and was batted hard, it should be said that he was notified only five minutes before the game that he was to pitch and had no time to warm up. It had been generally understood that Larry Conley was to go in the box and it was a surprise to all when Tift was ordered in.

At a time when the baseball club is about to make an appeal to the public for additional financial support, a large section of the club's supporters should not be antagonized in the manner mentioned before.

While with the Fredericton club Tift has proved himself a valuable player and a perfect gentleman who has made many friends here.

MARATHONS WON
FROM ST. JOHNS
IN THE EIGHTH

Errors Marked Game at St. John Yesterday--Greeks Had Fryer, New Second Baseman

St. John, Aug. 3.--The league game of ball on the Marathon grounds yesterday afternoon was enjoyed by a large crowd of people and was one of the best of theseason, the Marathons winning by a score of three to one.

Sweet was in the box for the winning team and came very nearly making a record on a no-hit and no-run game. The only run made, by the St. Johns was on two errors in the fourth inning, while only one hit was made off Sweet's delivery and this single was not made until the 8th inning, Sabourin being the lucky batter.

During the entire game only five St. John players got by the first base. They could not solve Sweet's curves.

Dr. Hight was the pitcher for the St. Johns, and, like Sweet, he pitched a steady game of ball. Six hits were made off his pitching and two of these were two-beggars. He had eight strike-outs to his credit and Sweet had seven. It was a good game of ball to watch. The teams seem to improve in their playing as the season advances. The fans were all satisfied that the teams played fine ball yesterday afternoon and such games will always draw large crowds.

The only run made by the St. Johns was in the fourth inning on errors of Winter and Lynch. In this inning the Marathons also made one run, an error by Sabourin, another by Sullivan and a two-base hit by Nelson being responsible for the run.

The teams were quickly retired in the next three innings, when in the eighth inning the Marathons gained two more runs which won the game for them. With one out Fryer, the Greeks' new second baseman, made a single to centre, Sullivan failed to connect with one from Connolly and Fryer went to third, McGarey, next to bat, landed the ball into right field for two bases and Connolly and Fryer scored. The next two men flied out.

John Dever, of last year's St. Peter's team, is in the city on a visit and played in right field yesterday for the St. Johns. Both he and Fryer, who yesterday played their first game here this season, were given a good reception when they went to bat.

SEVEN HEAT RACE
AT MONTREAL

Driver O'Neill Fined for Trailing the Field Four Heats--Horse Known Here

Montreal, Aug. 1.--The feature of the first session of the trotting meeting under the auspices of the Montreal driving club, at Delorimier park yesterday afternoon, was the form of the winner of the 2.15 pace, Altissimus, a bay gelding by Nelson Wilkes, owned by William O'Neill of Lexington Mass., and driven by O'Neill.

After pacing ninth in a field of 10 in the first heat and last in the third following trials, O'Neill sent Altissimus to the front of the fifth heat, an easy first in faster time than was made in three of the first heats in which he trailed the field.

The judges called O'Neill to the stand after the fifth heat, and failing to get a satisfactory explanation, fined him \$25 for not trying. Altissimus then won the sixth and seventh heats and the race.

PENISA MAID DIED
FROM KIDNEY TROUBLE

The famous trotting mare, Penisa Maid, 2:04 1/2, for which the Winnipeg owner, R. J. Mackenzie, paid \$25,000 a few months ago, died at Grand Rapids Saturday from kidney trouble with which she was attacked after a workout on Thursday. Three veterinarians were in attendance, but none of them were able to give her any relief. The Chicago expert, Dr. McKillop, was summoned, but the mare died before he arrived.

She had raced but once since Mackenzie secured her, winning at Kalamazoo last week, but at Indianapolis she had worked a mile better than 2:02, and it was the belief of the critics that she would have beaten two minutes this season.

BASEBALL NOTES

Jack Doyle is now umpiring in the Eastern League and making good. "Comback Jim" is the title of a new song written in honor of Jimmy Callahan of the Chicago White Sox. Detroit seems to have it on all the American League teams with the exception of New York. The Yankees have won nine of the eleven games played with the Tigers.
