SUMMER SCHOOL CLOSED AFTER MOST SUCCESSFUL SESSION

Scholarships Presented by His Worship Mayor Thomas Last Evening--Votes of Thanks Passed--Names of Scholarship Winners

The Summer School of Science for the Atlantic Provinces of Canada, which has been in session in this city since July 12th, closed last night with the public presentation of scholarships in the Assembly Hall of the Provincial Normal School. The scholarships were presented by His Worship Mayor Thomas, who made a brief address in which he expressed the heartiest good wishes of the citizens toward the school and also the hope that those in control would see fit to bring the school to Fredericton on some future occasion.

Next year the Summer School of Science will meet at Yarmouth, N. S., from July 10th to July 31st. The attendance this year was 383, the largest in the history of the School. S. A. Starratt, B.Sc., of Roxbury, Mass., has been re-elected president of the School. D. W. Hamilton, Ph. D., of this city, is one of the vice-presidents and Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, H. H. Hagerman, M.A., and L. W. Bailey, LL.D., are directors. FISHWAYS LIKELY TO BE INSTALLED AT SALMON RIVER

Stream Near Grand Falls Contains Over Hundred Fine Salmon Pools --Inspected Last Week

It is probable that in the near future the number of good salmon streams in the province will be augmented by the addition of Salmon River, Victoria County. The Board of Trade of Grand Falls, recently requested the Department of Fisheries to instal fishways on this stream to enable the salmon to pass the dams of the three mills situated on the stream. Fisheries Inspector H. E. Harrison of this city, visited the river in question last week and made a thorough inspection of it. He was very favorably impressed with the appearance of the river and thinks that if properly cleared out it will become one of the finest salmon streams in New Brunswick.

FOUR DAYS' TRIP.

Inspector Harrison drove from Grand Falls to the head of the stream, taking a day and a half to cover twenty-eight miles. With a guide he then went by canoe from the head of the stream to its mouth the trip occupying two days and a half. The water in Salmon River it is said, was never lower than it is now but there is sufficient to take salmon to the head. Under present conditions they can go up as far as the first dam. The stream has upwards of a hundred fine pools which vary in depth from a few feet to twenty-four feet.

SALMON SEASON POOR.

Up to the present time the run of salmon has been light and few have been caught. Lately there have been indications that the fish are running in increased numbers. A considerable number of grilse have been caught at Hart's Island Pool.

FIREMEN'S FESTIVAL

The Fredericton Fire Department will hold a festival at Scully's Grove tonight. The firemen will assemble at the central hose station, King Street at seven o'clock and at 7:30 will march to the grove headed by the 71st Regt. Band which has been engaged to furnish the music for the festival. The route followed on the march will be King, Westmorland, Queen, York, King, Carleton, Queen and Regent streets.
