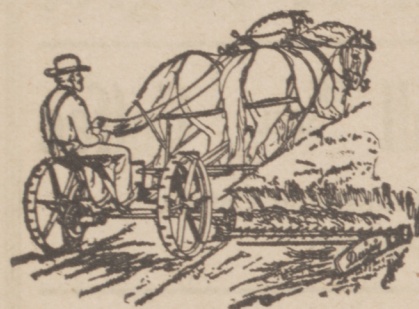

## ST. JOHNS LOST YESTERDAY 6 TO 2--GAME WAS GOOD

Tift Pitched in Good Form and was well Supported  
--Eddie Ramsay Starred for St. Johns--Bob Ganley Used for First Time in Centrefield--Made Good Impression

Fredrickton pulled together yesterday and trimmed the St. Johns, 6 to 2 in what was generally conceded to be one of the interesting games of the season. Tift was doing the twirling for the locals. He was in good condition and received all support. The infield was in the shape that it was the last game but in the outer garden there were a couple of changes. Frank Hughes who has been starring lately as a pinch-hitter played in right-field and in the centre of the lot Bob Ganley the most recent acquisition of the Fredrickton club did fielding stunts in the fashion that he did in the big league teams a few years since. To be more exact he would have fielded in that way if he had got the chance, for the St. Johns did not send the ball out to the middle garden at all. At the bat he got one hit but handled himself, particularly on the bases, like a man who knew what baseball was. Ganley in short made a good impression on the fans and is probably here to stay. Hughes in right field took all his chances perfectly and at the bat got two nice safe ones in four times. Larry Conley in left field fell down on one long fly a most surprising thing for him to do as it is not in the memory of the oldest fan when he did such a thing before.

## ST. JOHNS WEAK IN SPOTS

St. Johns showed good baseball ability in spots but there are places in the team that could be made stronger. At first and at the bat Britt was very much to the bad. The team as a whole was weak with the stick a department in which Fredrickton has lots of strength. Johnny Dolan who as a Fredrickton man was strong with the crowd swung at nothing but air on three different occasions. Tift made nine of the St. Johns do the same thing. Eddie Ramsay at second base had most of the life of the team and scored the two runs credited to the St. Johns.

## INTERESTING GAME

It was an interesting game from start to finish the St. Johns playing sharply enough to keep Fredrickton from running away with the game. Their errors were costly however, although the locals battled hard enough to put the game on ice at almost any stage. They started things in the first inning. Ganley the first man at the bat smashed out a two-bagger and got to third on Mulvey's error which also let Pat Duggan get to first. Larry Conley surprised everybody by striking out. Bob Conley hit to the infield and Britt made another error that let Ganley score and put men on second and third. Callahan hit to Mulvey who caught Duggan going home. Hughes hammered out a single that brought Bob Conley home and Tom Howe retired the side by hitting to Mulvey. Then for three innings there was no more scoring the St. Johns tightening up and playing tight edge ball. In the fifth stanza Fredrickton tallied twice. The inning began with the visitors right on their toes. Ganley was thrown out by Mulvey and Duggan died out to the same player. Larry Conley started things with a hit through Mulvey. Bob Conley hit in the same direction and the St. Johns third baseman made a nice juicy error. He followed it up with another and when Callahan put out a three-base hit, the longest hit of the game, two runs came in. In the next inning there was a repetition of this. Murray and Tift drew singles and Larry Conley a two-bagger. These mixed with a fine large error on the part of Mr. Britt allowed two more runs to be added to Fredrickton's tally. After that the St. Johns had everything nailed down.

## ST. JOHNS SIDE OF IT

The St. Johns did their deadly work in the sixth and eighth innings and one little run in each was the total damage. Until the fourth net a man reached first. Ned Ramsey the first man to bat in that inning drove out a two-bagger. He stole third but it was "one-two-three"

with the other batters. In the next inning the St. Johns got a brace of singles but nobody got farther than second. Ramsey scored the first run made by the visiting team. In the sixth Larry Conley made a mess of his long fly to left field and the St. Johns second-baseman got to second. Mulvey drove out a two-bagger that would have scored the base-runner if he had not stumbled turning third. Dolan fanned but Pinkerton drew a pass and White brought in the run with a sacrifice. Sabourin struck out and the side was retired. Three batters faced Tift in the seventh but in the eighth Ramsey tallied another on Pinkerton's two base hit. He reached first when Callahan failed to stop his drive. After that there was nothing to it.
