NOTED MEN WHO HAVE DIED DURING THE YEAR

New York, Dec. 30.—The list of noted men and women who were removed by the hand of death during the year just closing, contains the names of many distinguished makers of history, at home and abroad, of many leaders, statesmen, diplomats, and prominent members of the various professions, men of the Church, scientists, educators, artists and others too numerous to mention.

Among the prominent Americans claimed by death during the year were many closely identified with public life. John Marshall Harlan, Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court; Stephen B. Elkins, U. S. Senator from West Virginia and formerly Secretary of State under President Harrison; and William P. Frye for thirty years U.S. Senator from Maine, were probably the three most widely known. The list includes the following U.S. Senators and ex-Senators: Charles J. Hughes of Colorado; Albert Beard Kittredge of South Dakota; George Wyckliffe McBride of Oregon; Roger Q. Mills of Texas, author of the Mills tariff bill; Thos. H. Carter, twice U.S. Senator and founder of the Prudential Insurance Co., of America. Others were Hiram A. Tuttle and John McLane both former governors of New Hampshire; George Washington Glick, former governor of Kansas; Frank W. Benson, Secretary of State and former governor of Oregon; Abiram Chamberlain, ex-governor of Connecticut; Fletcher Dutton Proctor, former governor of Vermont; Congressman and ex-Congressman Nehemiah Day Sperry, "Father of the Rural Free Delivery" system; Sydney E. Mudd, of Maryland; Edmund H. Madison, of Kansas; Henry Clay Lounds, of New Jersey; James P. Latta of Nebraska; Gen. George W. Gordon of Tennessee; Commander-in-Chief, of the United Confederate Veterans and James Proctor Knott, ex-Congressman and former Governor of Kentucky.

Among the noted Canadians who died during the year just closing were Sir Charles A. P. Pelletier, Lieutenant Governor of Quebec; Desiré Girouard, senior judge of the Supreme Court of Canada; Sir John Carling, a former member of the Canadian cabinet; Louis J. Forget, member of the Senate; George Johnson, former chief statistician of Canada; Archbishop O'Connor and Archbishop Fergus Patrick McEvoy, of Toronto; Rev. William Patrick, principal Manitoba Presbyterian College; James Bell, professor of surgery, McGill University and Israel M. Ross a prominent railroad builder of Western Canada.

Among the noted foreigners called by death this last year were many statesmen and men of affairs, known throughout the world, including Peter A. Stolypin, Premier of Russia; Baron Eorhtote, formerly Governor-General of Australia; Sir Charles Dilke a prominent leader of the Liberal party in England; Buncavature Corroese, ex-President of Panama; Baron Banffy, former Hungarian premier; Maurice Rouvier, twice premier of France; Martinez Camoes, president of the Supreme Court of Spain; Henry Maurice Bertrou, French Minister of War; Gen. Brun, former French Minister of War; Prof. Maschika Shimose, inventor of the high explosive used by the Japanese navy and Marquis Jutaro Komura, former Minister of Foreign Affairs of Japan. The list also includes Princess Clotilde, aunt of the present King of Italy; Maria Pia, formerly Queen Dowager of Portugal and Louise, Dowager Duchess of Devonshire.

The list of noted churchmen removed by death during the year includes Archbishop Patrick J. Ryan, of Philadelphia; Bishop Augustine Van de Vyver, of Richmond and Bishop Bonacum of Lincoln all of the R. C. Church; Bishops Willard P. Mallien and Oscar Penn Fitzgerald of the W. E. Church and the following P. E. bishops: Wm. Paget of Maryland; Alex H. Vinton of West Mass.; Edward F. Atwill of West Mo.; Ozil W. Whitaker of Pa.; Alex Mackay Smith of Pa. and John Mills Kendrick of Arizona and New Mexico.

Literature deplores the loss of David Graham Phillips, Mrs. Elizabeth Stuart Phelps, George Cary Eggleston, Thomas Wentworth Higginson, Vaughan Kester, Antonio Fogazzaro, Mrs. Katherine Cecil Thurston, William Clark Russell, Mrs. Arthur Stannard (John Strange Winter) and Harry Kellogg Durland.

The stage was impoverished by the death of Denman Thompson, Sydney Brough, Rose Eytling, Wright Lorimer, Edward Harrigan and Harold Kyrie Bell.

Other noted dead of the year are Paul Morton, president of the Equitable Life Assurance Society and Secretary of the Navy under President Roosevelt; Tom L. Johnson, four times Mayor of Cleveland; Edwin A. Abbey the noted American artist; John W. Gates, American financier; Sir William S. Gilbert, the librettist of "Pinafore" and "Mikado"; Mrs. Carrie Nation, the militant temperance advocate; Sir Robert Hart the eminent authority on Chinese commercial affairs; Rear Admiral Winfield Scott Schley, U.S.N. the hero of Santiago; John R. Walsh formerly a

prominent Chicago banker; Ida Lewis Wilson, the famous keeper of the Lime Rock Lighthouse, Newport, R.I.; Joseph Pulitzer, proprietor of the New York World and the St. Louis Post-Dispatch; Eugene F. Ware, former Commissioner of Pensions and writer of poetry under the name "Troquill"; Gen. Clement A. Evans, former Commander in Chief United Confederate veteran; Col. John James McCook, noted soldier of the Civil War and famous New York corporation lawyer; Cornelius N. Bliss, Secretary of the Interior under McKinley, and many years treasurer of the Republican National Committee; John F. Eglew, diplomat and author; Sir John Aird, the builder of the Assuan Dam; Rear Admiral Charles Stillman Sperry, U.S.N. ret.; Col. Wm. C. Green, copper mine operator; Gen. Ferdinand C. Latrobe, seven times Mayor of Baltimore; Sir Francis Galton the noted English explorer and author; Gen. Piet. A. Cronje, noted Boer leader in the war with England; Rear Admiral Silas W. Terry, U.S.N. ret.; Baron Albert von Rothschild, the Vienna banker; Sir Gaspar Purdon former director of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York; Charles Frederick Moberly Bell, managing director of the London Times; Edward A. Moseley, Secretary of the Interstate Commerce Commission and an authority on railroad safety; John Passmore Edwards, the English publicist, philanthropist and peace advocate; Halsey Cooley Ives, director of the St. Louis Museum of Arts; Gustav Mahler, the eminent composer and conductor; Felix Mottl, director of the Royal Opera at Munich; Rear Admiral John C. Fremont, U.S.N.; Prof. Francis Andrew March the noted philologist; Herbert G. Squires, former U. S. Minister to Panama and Cuba; Rear Admiral James H. Sands, U.S.N., ret.; H. Victor Newcomb, former president of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad; Thomas Ball the sculptor; Sir Joseph Dalton Hooker the noted English surgeon and naturalist; Bartlett Tripp, Ambassador to Austria under Cleveland; Irving Bedell Dudley, American Ambassador to Brazil; Charles S. Francis, former American Ambassador to Austria and Baron Gustave Samuel James de Rothschild, of the Paris branch of the house of Rothschild.

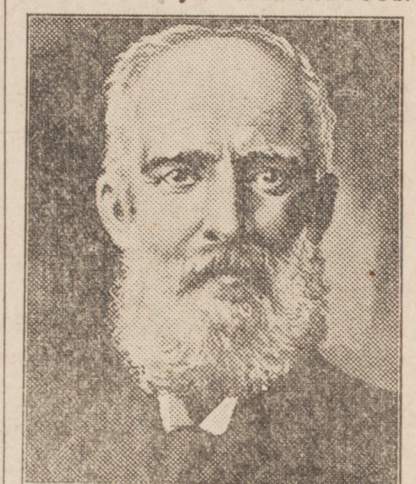

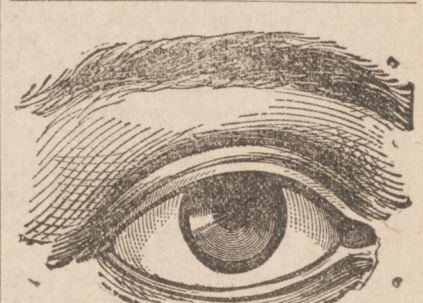
