BY A. R. GOULD

Flemming Reported as Saying Valley Railway is not Necessary--Hazen Makes Same Old Announcement

At a meeting held at Centreville Saturday night Hon. J. D. Hazen with the Dominion election less than a week away again produced the Valley Railway contract as a would be vote getter. The premier made the rather hazy announcement that a contract with A. R. Gould for the building of the line would be signed within the next ten days. Mr. Gould was present and spoke on the subject of the Valley Railway in the course of his remarks giving Hon. Wm. Pugsley credit of giving him all possible assistance.

FLEMING'S POSITION

Hon. J. Kidd Fleming did not attend the meeting although advertised to speak. In connection with the announcement of Premier Hazen it is interesting to know that Hon. Mr. Fleming stated that the Hazen Government could be returned to power without the support of the river counties and that for that reason it was not necessary that the Valley Railway should be built. The Provincial Secretary made this statement to a resident of Southampton who is prepared to back it up.

CENTREVILLE MEETING

The St. John Telegraph this morning had the following interesting account of what took place at Centreville.

Centreville, Carleton county, Sept. 16--A Conservative meeting was held here this evening and was addressed, among others, by Premier Hazen. Evidently with the hope of making some capital for the provincial government, Mr. Hazen had A. R. Gould president of the St. John and Quebec Railway Co., present. Referring to Mr. Gould as the contractor with whom the provincial government was about to enter into a contract for the building of the St. John Valley Railway, the premier called upon Mr. Gould to speak regarding the Valley railway situation.

Mr. Fleming was announced as a speaker at this meeting but he did not turn up.

Mr. Hazen said that he expected the contract with Gould to be signed within ten days. Many of those present remembered Mr. Fleming made exactly the same statement some weeks ago, and they wondered why Mr. Hazen should spring the same old story.

The audience realized that the dominion government, while ready to carry out its part of the Valley scheme, has been waiting for word from Mr. Hazen and Mr. Fleming for some weeks, and that the delay is wholly due to the local government.

A. R. GOULD

Mr. Gould did not touch upon the political situation in Canada, and in referring to the Valley Railway, while giving credit to the provincial government for agreeing to guarantee the bonds, he was very emphatic in stating that when he went to Ottawa and saw the Minister of Public Works he received all possible assistance. The Ottawa authorities, he said seemed exceedingly anxious that there should be no delay in commencing construction and showed no hesitation in agreeing to give the dominion subsidy for the line, and also assistance for the large bridges and to lease the line, operating it in sections as completed.

The audience seemed pleased to hear that the provincial government had at last after months of procrastination, decided to enter into contract with the St. John and Quebec Railway Co. for the building of the line, but more so that it was to be operated as part of the Intercolonial Railway, thus carrying out the views of Mr. Carvell and those of the Minister of Public works.


