THREE NEW

MEMBERS TO JOIN
GRAND CIRCUIT

Goshen May Retire Until it has Mile Track—Pittsburg Again to Take up Harness Racing

(Boston Globe)
The makeup of the Grand Circuit for 1912 is being more generally discussed by followers of the harness horses than any other subject at present. This is unusual, as the annual meeting of the stewards at which the racing dates of the circuit are fixed is still three weeks off and in years gone by circuit affairs have not attracted much attention until after until after the holidays.

There are many reasons why the circuit should be of so much interest during the off season, the chief of which is the activity of Harry Devereux, president of the organization, in trying to arrange matters so that the stewards will have some well-defined plans to work upon when they gather in New York, Jan. 9.

Results of the Cleveland man's work are seen in the announcement that Pittsburg wants to come into the circuit and that Goshen will waive its right to give a circuit meeting over its half-mile track, if the best interests of the sport seem to demand that circuit racing be confined to mile courses.

THREE NEW MEMBERS

The circuit seems almost certain to have three new members—Pittsburg, Salem, N. H., and Lexington. The Kentucky Association has been formally asked by the stewards to join and there is no ground to doubt but what the invitation will be accepted, while the applications of what was once the banner circuit city and of the splendid New Hampshire plant will meet with little, if any, opposition.

The action of the Goshen management in expressing willingness to be an inactive member of the circuit until it has a perfectly appointed mile track. If the dislikes of the big line trainers for a two-lap course cannot be overcome, is very pleasing, but is only what could have been expected of the high-class sportsmen who comprise the Orange County Association.

With Pittsburg in line and Rockingham Park taking the place of Goshen, the circuit would be considerably stronger than ever and would insure a route of campaign that could not fail to be particularly attractive to owners and trainers.

PITTSBURG IN

Pittsburg has not been on the racing map since the early days of the low wheel, rubber-tire sulky, but the memory of the meetings there will make all the old guard circuit followers anxious to be on hand when it returns.

Pittsburg has never lost interest in the harness horse and the men behind the movement for a circuit meeting are the ones who have made it possible for the Western Pennsylvania city to carry off the major portion of the trophies at the intercity meetings of the Amateur Driving Club League the past few years.

Pittsburg and Rockingham both will have meetings up to the highest standard. The Granite State track will be under the management of Wilbur Duntley, a man who has grown up in the racing game, yet who believes that the sport from the box office end has not been handled to the best advantage.

Whether the Rockingham program will be headed by a \$10,000 or two \$5000 purses depends on the desire of the men who pay entrance fees. Duntley will be a bidder for one of the rich fortunes.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON, who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
