

Pensalcola, Fla., Dec. 18-A \$10,000 ilver service, a bronze historica ablet and a stand of colors were presented to the battleship Florida, the "queen of the navy," at ancho in Pensacola harbor, today by committee of eminent representatives

of the State of Florida, headed by Governor Gilchrist. Rear Admiral Lucien Young received the gifts in behalf of the Navy Department and Captain S. H. Knapp' for the battleship. Both lofficers made address the occasion were escorted over the wessel and invited to partake of a collation.

The silver service is a gift to the battleship from the people of Florida. Funds for its purchase were raised by popular subscription, aided by a generous appropriation from the legislature. 
SMELT FISHERMEN

The smelt is the smallest and most delicious fish caught in these waters. The average weight is one or two ounces. Though found in a comparatively limited district, in rivers entering the Gulf of St. Lawrence and Strait of Northumberland, the principal streams being the Miramichi. Buctouche and Richibucto. The take last year was 7,238,700 pounds. The value of last year's catch of the principal species of fish and crustaean in the province was as follows:

Herring, \$820,132. Lobster, \$770,078. Smelt, \$726,261. Sardines, \$551,204. Cod, \$337,692.
