DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence.

Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem.

Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.

NEGRO BUSINESS MEN MEET

Little Rock, Ark. Aug. 16—Between seven and eight hundred delegates, among whom are scores of colored men who have made a success in commercial enterprises and others who represent prosperous towns controlled entirely by negroes, are attending the twelfth annual meeting of the National Negro Business League which was opened in this city today. Booker T. Washington is the president of the league, the object of which is to inform the world of the progress the negro is making in business and to stimulate local business enterprise among the members of the race. The present meeting will continue its sessions until Saturday. The progress being made by the negroes of Oklahoma has induced the officers of the league to set aside tomorrow as Oklahoma Day, when delegates from that State will tell of the growth and prosperity of the town of Boley, which is inhabited and controlled entirely by negroes. One of the evidences of the town's prosperity is found in the fact that it has just installed a \$35,000 light and power plant.

FRIENDS OBSERVE 225TH ANNIVERSARY

Media, Pa. Aug. 16—In the village of Concordville in the country made historic by the battle of the Brandywine, the Society of Friends held an all-day celebration today to mark the 225th anniversary of the Concord Friends' Monthly Meeting. Congressman Butler, President Swain of Swarthmore College and other men of note delivered addresses.

PENNSYLVANIA DEMOCRATS ACTIVE

Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 16—The members of the Democratic State General Committee assembled here today for a meeting the purposes of which are to consider proposed changes in the party rules, to be recommended to the next State convention for its approval, and to carry out the plans for the redistricting of the State, so as to abolish the nine districts now existing and to establish 32 divisions one for each congressional district.

CLERGYMAN ENDORSES RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT

(St. John Telegraph)
At this time in the campaign, when certain politicians are trying to stir up passion and prejudice, when attempts are being made to blind the electors to the real nature of the issue before the people, it is a pleasure to direct attention to the words of a thoughtful clergyman who has given earnest thought to the principal question now before Canadians. Here are the sentiments of Rev. J. J. McCaskill:

"As I consider the reciprocity issue far above all party questions and of the first importance to the Maritime Provinces especially, I have decided to speak in its favor through the province during this campaign."

"It would mean a new era of prosperity to all our industries. Hundreds of thousands who now earn a bare living because they have access only to an uncertain, limited and distant market, will, under the advantages of reciprocity, experience a new prosperity."

"The young people who have gone to the American cities will return to their homes, and our deserted farms and languishing towns will throw with new life."

"This is a belated measure of justice to the farmers and toilers, who in the past have taxed themselves so freely for the benefit of the special interests. The increased prosperity will enable them to continue protection to the manufacturers without feeling the burden so grievously. It will remove many of the disabilities under which the Lower Provinces have labored since Confederation, and in this and other ways must prove of inestimable advantage to the whole of Canada."

There are the facts of the case, set down without bias or feeling. When reciprocity is so viewed—fairly, as an economic question—who can have any doubt as to its benefits? Rev. Mr. McCaskill's words put to shame all those who are attempting to distort the issue.
