

PEACE MOVEMENT DENOUNCED

New York, April 13—The Herald publishes the following cable from Vienna:

A dispute between members of the Austrian Peace Society and the Austrian Navy Association arose at a meeting of the former organization this afternoon at the University Building. Members of the Navy Association attended the meeting and denounced in vigorous terms the peace movement. The attack was directed principally at Baroness Bertha Suttner, the leader of the movement, who was accused of being an anarchist.

Her defence of the cause was loudly applauded.

WAR ON LONG HAT-PIN

Milwaukee, Wis., April 13—Mary Swain Wagner, president of the American Suffragettes has declared war upon the long hatpin. She goes so far as to say that she is going to have a bill introduced in the legislature.

"I know it will take about three minutes to get a unanimous vote on the subject," she said today. "It is all ones life's worth, or ones eyes, to get into an elevator or street car, especially with the short women, who always have the biggest hat and the longest pins. I think they ought to be compelled to wear a cork on the end of the hat pins, or else cut 'em off."

TO QUESTION HARCOURT

London, April 13—Several questions will be put to Rt. Hon. Lewis Harcourt next week regarding the preferential agreement between the West Indies and Canada. Sir Gilbert Parker is to ask whether the government has a legislative federation of the West Indian Island under consideration. He will also suggest the appointment of a separate empire trade commission to enquire into the resources trade and commerce of the whole crown colonies.

PATTON RELIEVED OF SUIT

Chicago, April 13—James A. Patton, retired board of trade operator, felt relieved over the dismissal of a \$6,000,000 damage suit which had been filed against him two years ago. The suit which was instituted by Dr. Paul Burmaster, president of the Chicago Anti-Gambling League, was dismissed in court, when the complainant failed to file a declaration of law in the case. According to Burmaster's counsel, the suit was filed under a law practically obsolete. The law provided that any person who had been defrauded through stock speculations could recover fifty times the original amount from the broker.

THOUSANDS SIGN PETITION

London, April 13—A petition containing over 100,000 signatures praying the Home Secretary to reprieve Frederick Seddon, who is under sentence of death for the murder of Miss Barrow, was presented. Mr. McKenna's decision is expected Tuesday, the execution being for Thursday.

EX-TENNIS CHAMPION WANTS DAMAGES

Cleveland, Ohio, April 13—Alleging that her skill in tennis, ice skating and whist had been impaired by injuries to her right ankle and right wrist, sustained in an automobile accident here in August, Mrs. Annie G. Burgess of Toronto, until a year ago champion woman tennis player of Canada, wants \$5,000 damages against the Rinehart Brothers' Company, street paving contractors.

NEW BRUNSWICK'S SHADE TREE LAWS

(Forestry Journal.) The only legislation directly applying to shade or street trees in New Brunswick seems to be the "Act respecting Local Improvement Associations," passed in 1903 (3 Ed. VII. c. 22.)

By this Act it is enacted that ten or more persons may be incorporated for the purpose of improving and ornamenting the streets and public squares of a city or town by planting and cultivating ornamental trees, under the provisions of the New Brunswick Joint Stock Companies Act.

Any city or town may hand over to such an association the care of its streets and is empowered to make the association a grant for the purpose of assisting in its work. This grant may be levied and collected as part of the regular assessment.

A fine up to twenty dollars is provided for anyone injuring or interfering with the work of such an association by driving animals or vehicles across its property, playing ball thereon, etc., the fine to be payable to the association.

Fredericton, the capital city of the province, has an association formed under this act, which has done much in beautifying the city. Lt. Col. Loggie, deputy surveyor general of the province, is the president of this association.

HOE LIBRARY SALE RESUMED

New York, April 15—Once more book experts from all parts of the world have gathered in New York City to attend the sale of rare volumes from the library of the late Robert Hoe. This afternoon the auctioneers began the sale of the third section of the immense collection which was divided into four parts for the purpose of the sale. The disposal of the first part of the library yielded the enormous sum of \$997,363. The sale of the second section brought \$471,619 in January of this year. The third part is numerically equal to each of the others but is of somewhat smaller value. It includes, however, many oratorically illuminated books several nials of unusual beauty and thirty-eight manuscripts, mostly dating from the fifteenth century.

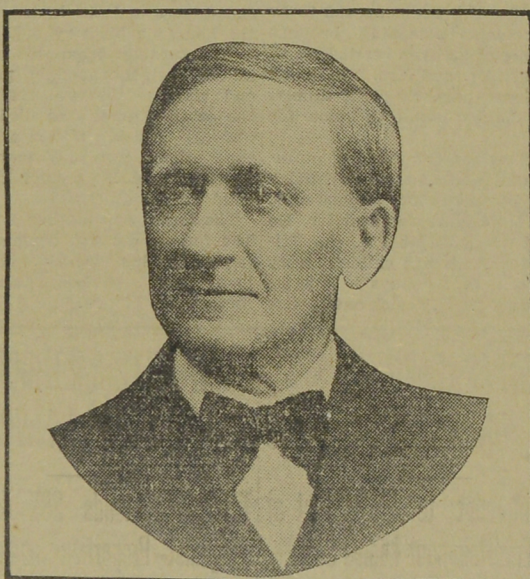
