

SMALLPOX PATIENTS HAVING TOUGH TIME

Calgary, April 13—Eleven persons infected with smallpox are in one of Calgary isolated hospitals under conditions that rival the "Black Hole" of Calcutta. Without clean bedding, medical attendance of any sort, without heat, sewer or water supply they are quarantined in the bleak barracks on Crescent Heights known as the Pest House. Three women three little children all under three years of age and five men comprise the group.

NEW YORK HAS FINEST LIGHTHOUSE

New York, April 15—What is said to be the finest lighthouse in the world, located at Richmond, Staten Island, was put into commission today. It is to light the new Ambrose channel leading into New York bay and will be visible for twenty-one miles. The light is 300,000 candle power.

\$100 REWARDS TO FENIAN VETS

Ottawa, April 12—The cabinet has passed an order in council releasing the money appropriated as a reward to the veterans of 1866-70. They will now be entitled to \$100 each on making proof of service.

GRANITE CUTTERS' PROGRESS

Quincy, Mass., April 15—A convention of the Granite Cutters' International Association began in this city today with representatives of the craft in attendance from various parts of the United States and Canada. It is the first general convention held by the granite cutters in more than thirty years. During that time the hours of labor have been reduced from ten to eight a day, with universal Saturday half-holidays. From an average of \$2.25 a day a country-wide minimum of \$3.25 also has been established.

FRENCH AVIATOR KILLED

Paris, April 13—Lieut. H. A. Boncour of the 27th Infantry Regiment, was killed this morning in an aeroplane accident. He was making a flight in the vicinity of Barleuc in the department of the Meuse, about 125 miles to the east of Paris, when he fell from a great height, while passing over the Village of Laimont. His aeroplane collapsed from an unknown cause and was totally destroyed, and the body of the aeronaut when found in the debris, was almost unrecognizable.

Paris, April 13—An examination of the body showed that Lieut. Boncour's eye-glasses were covered with frost and it is supposed that this prevented him, while attempting a landing, from seeing that he was flying directly into a thick forest until too late. In trying to avoid dashing into the trees, he probably made a sudden turning movement, which caused the aeroplane to turn over.

COAL TAKES A DROP

London, April 13—The price of coal was reduced 10 s. a ton on the London coal exchange yesterday bringing the best coal down to 34 s. (\$8.16) a ton. This was the largest drop in prices ever recorded at one time.

WAS MARRIED TO HIS HALF-SISTER

Cincinnati, April 12—A strange story which resulted in John P. Ruch Jr., aged 22 years being divorced from his half-sister, Helen Hoffman Ruch, 24 was related in the insolvency court here today. The brother and sister were married Oct. 25, 1910 neither at the time knowing of the blood relationship between them. The discovery of the relationship was discovered a week ago and the action for divorce followed.

It was explained to the court that the mistake had been possible because of the fact that the mother for a private reason had hidden from the children the fact that they were brother and sister allowing them to believe that the girl was only an adopted child. The petition for divorce, filed by the husband was upon the formal ground of neglect. The divorce was granted upon that ground for the purpose of protecting the young couple so far as possible in the record. The father and mother of the young couple were not in court when the hearing was held.

The relationship of the Ruchs was disclosed to the young husband and wife by Judge William Lueders of the probate court, a few weeks ago in the presence of their mother Mrs. John P. Ruch.

Neighbors of the Ruch family informed Judge Lueders that they believed the couple were half-brother and half-sister. He learned after investigation that the two had grown up together under the belief that the girl was only an adopted daughter of Mrs. Ruch.

The youngest of their children is only a few weeks old.

GREAT BRITAIN HAS AN AVIATION SCHEME

London, April 13—Details are out in regard to Great Britain's aviation scheme. The plan for 363 trained flyers for the army and 40 at the beginning for the navy. Not more than 60 of these flyers however, will be trained this year. Provision is made for 84 aeroplanes for the army and 12 aeroplanes and hydro-aeroplanes for the navy. About one half of the machines will be bought in Great Britain with a view to encouraging the industry.

Willimantic Coan, April 15—A ten per cent wage increase was put into effect today at the mills of the American Thread Company here. More than 2,000 operatives are benefitted.

PEARY'S ASSOCIATES ON TRIP

Washington, April 13—George Borup and D. B. McMillan, two of Peary's associates in the successful dash for the North Pole, are to head an expedition to be sent out by the New York Museum for the exploration of land in the middle of the Arctic Ocean, which Peary sighted while on his memorable trip.

The party will sail July 30 next in the sealer Diana and will be equipped for two years.

Berlin, April 13—Some stir has been created here by the assertions of the Tagblatt that when the Kaiser was in Venice recently, he said to Signor Cirmini, a member of the Chamber of Deputies:

"If I had a people as intelligent and patriotic as the Italians, I would conquer half of Europe."

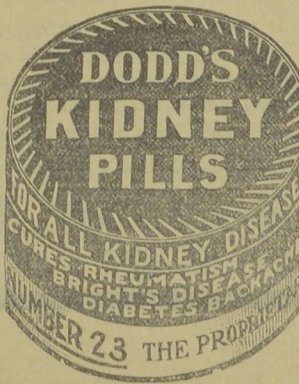

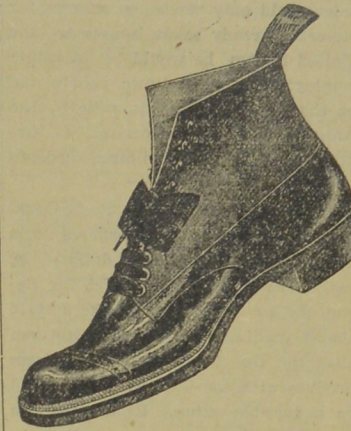
