FINANCIAL and COMMERCIAL

EUROPE'S MONEY MARKET.

Conditions are now favorable on Europe's money markets, largely because of the gradual release at Paris, of money hoarded during the Morocco conference.

Your market's renewal of loans to Europe, maturing this week, has also insured continuance of comfortable conditions, especially as it is considered that Europe's repayments to America will probably be made in the spring of the year, when conditions are usually easy on the continental markets.

Nevertheless, the maximum of ease has probably been reached here. The Bank of England, with its exceptionally strong reserve, will be able to exercise control over Lombard street in December through bills discounted two months ago, and coming to maturity next month. There is vague talk that Italy also may borrow in America on bills of exchange.

RISE IN CONSOLS.

The Stock Exchange outlook is doubtful. Its best point is easy money; its worst, the complete absence of the public. For the reasons already indicated, the situation at Paris and Berlin is better; but both markets have sustained a considerable strain, and recovery will have to be gradual.

The rise in consols is partly due to the fact that bankers are considering a scheme to provide for repayment of the national debt within a fixed period, instead of the present system of a loan perpetual in form. This plan will be considered later by the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

Cobalt, Nov. 7.—Within the past week there has been a general improvement in the position of La Rosse Consolidated. At Lawson Crosscut half way up the slope from the 180 foot level on vein eight, what appears to be another ore chute has been encountered to the west. It will average five thousand ounces, six inches wide, and after being drifted on for fifteen feet is as good as severed in the head of the drift. The Lawson has never this year produced less than \$40,000 per month, and is likely to produce much more now.

ST. PAUL DIVIDEND.

New York, Nov. 7.—A director of St. Paul states that while there appears no possibility that the company can earn its common dividends in current six months a reduction of dividend has not been considered at any of the board meetings. This will not come up for formal discussion until early in the new calendar year, and at that time business conditions will enter largely into the question of continuing dividends on a seven per cent basis.

SOMETHING IN A NAME.

The Northern Ontario Trust, Limited, has a very high-sounding name. It is, in fact, quite classy. The application of the word "trust" gives one the impression of a great financial institution which has secured its footing by scores of years of the best traditions and highest standards of financial workmanship. The government officials who allowed a company to be incorporated under such a name must have had little appreciation of the fitness of things. The Northern Ontario Trust, Limited, is (would you believe it) a Porcupine "proposition." It actually has assets comprised of a house in the gold district, and shares of the Achilles gold mines. The trust company also owns an interest in other claims.

The word "trust" ought to be guarded as jealously as is the word "bank," and it seems out of place to have any kind of Porcupine company operating under that name.

CAN THE SHADOW BE LIFTED

The Wall Street Journal says that former Attorney-General Olney has joined the ranks of those who express inability to discover the transparent clearness found by President Taft in the decisions of the Supreme Court on the Sherman law. Mr. Olney declares that it is not within the proper scope of the Supreme Court to take up and disentangle the mechanism of each big corporation. As he says, if every business combination is to be subjected to this ordeal the wonder will be not that the mills of the national judiciary grind slowly but that they do not cease grinding altogether. Mr. Olney comes to the support, therefore, of those who are urging that the subject should be taken up anew by Congress, the only body which can effectually and permanently lift business out of the slough of despond to which it is now plunged.

In effect Mr. Olney joins those who have been urging a special commission to deal with the subject temperately and fully. Among those who have recently declared in favor of such a plan is Judge Prouty of the interstate commerce commission who suggests a commission similar in character to the interstate commerce commission. This would seem to be in accord with the theory of President

Taft of a regulation of big business enterprises like that adopted towards the railways. Pending an entire re-examination of the question of the relations between the government and big business, the country should be permitted a breathing spell, in which Mr. Wickersham at least should be persuaded to confine his utterances to the courts.

It is difficult to understand President Taft's contention that the law has been made so clear by the recent decision of the Supreme Court that there is no longer any alternative but to enforce it. If the law is clear and certain he could get bigger fees than any corporation lawyer ever received by declining re-election and explaining to the present bewildered heads of big business exactly what are the law's requirements. If to his mind the law is clear, he is a bigger lawyer than any of the men employed by the trusts.

If the same amount of time and labor is to be required to enforce the dissolution of all the big corporation that is demanded in the cases of the Standard Oil and American Tobacco companies, children yet unborn will grow to manhood waiting for future decisions of the Supreme Court on corporation organization, if the country has not in the meantime sunk into economic anarchy or surrendered in despair to the rule of some man on horseback.

international fuss lamed up; then another spurt—but spurt of good intentions. Dreadnoughts take years to build, and any particular row is likely to be history before aid which Canada would suddenly decide to offer to Britain could be transmitted into ships.

Unless it was decided as a principle to make a gift of a Dreadnought or two to Britain every year from Canada, the gift would be less than Canada ought to do and would be such a hazardous business as to mean little to England which would have to formulate its annual naval program without attempting to rely upon Canadian spurts, which might not materialize in any particular year. And if, on the contrary, it were planned by any Canadian government as a matter of principle to make a gift of a ten million dollar ship to England every year, getting no value in Canada for the money, how long

would this country stand it? The thing would make the very name of the Empire as a red rag to a bull to a great many people in this country, who would become easily reconciled to expenditure upon a navy of our own.

A Canadian naval force can be built up in complete co-operation with the imperial authorities, prepared and handled with a view to the best advantage of the British navy, and of the Empire as a whole. The point is for us to keep out of unnecessary political and domestic entanglements by not paying money or doing things about which our own people would have no further say, and about which our British kin might—to our minds—make mistakes. The success of the British Empire, in its colonial relations for a century, has been the success of autonomy. A hundred years of history have shown that where Canadian development has proceeded under the principle of Canadian freedom of action and self-effort, the political effect has been only to strengthen the imperial bond; but that where British supervision or British diplomacy has intervened actively in Canadian responsibilities there have generally been complaints here, right or wrongly, with injury to the warmth of pro-British feeling. We doubt if any naval policy save that of Canadian home effort would show any different ultimate result.
