GOLDEN POTTLECH IN SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., July 17.—Fourteen years ago today the steamer Portland arrived in this port from Alaska, bringing a ton of virgin gold from the rich new field of the Klondyke, and starting the great gold rush which gave a wonderful impetus to Seattle's growth and prosperity.

In celebration of the anniversary the "Golden Pottlach" carnival was ushered in today with the firing of sunrise salutes. Aeroplane flights, water fetes and sports, with vessels of the United States Navy participating, daily historical and artistic pageants, parades of all nations, a Japanese float of lanterns, a Chinese dragon parade, Indian dances and ceremonies, floral fetes, masquerades and the Coronation of the King and Queen of the Pottlach will fill out this week.

Preparations for the big events have been going on for months. An elaborate system of street lighting has been installed, a great court of honor erected and practically the entire city has been decorated with flags and bunting.

ELECTION TO BE FOUGHT ON A SINGLE ISSUE

(Montreal Herald)

Events are moving rapidly to clear the way for a straight fight between the parties on the single issue of reciprocity, as defined by the agreement framed by Mr. Fielding and President Taft.

There seems to be no doubt, after what happened in the Senate yesterday, that the agreement will be ratified, and ratified soon, without amendments merely to waste time. The chances are, therefore, that Washington will have done its part before the first of August.

Then Canada will have, for the first time since 1866, the chance to take what, until the other day, Canadians were all supposed to be eager to get access to the natural products of the country to the markets which are most convenient, but which have been closed for over half a century.

On the one side will be Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberal party, standing sponsor for the agreement by which the gates are to be opened.

On the other side will be Mr. Bowden and the Conservative party, voting that the gates must be kept closed.

If the farmers in the counties want the advantages the agreement offers, they have only to indicate their approval of the agreement.

To do so they have no choice but to vote for the Liberal leader and the candidates who support him, for his opponent, who must succeed him in office in case of a reversal, is pledged to the aim to prevent the agreement being ratified.

It is a simple issue, therefore, which cannot be qualified or evaded, between those who want to take advantage of the agreement and those who are pledged and determined not to let them do so.

There is not much doubt about what happened to the Senate yesterday to Mr. German when he met a convention of his old friends in Wellington. It is a sign of how the farmers of Ontario feel. The convention was unanimous against the man who has six times been elected by its aid, and who, on any other issue, could probably have taken a good percentage of the delegates with him. The reports from all along the St. Lawrence counties tell the same story. The farmers who have been waiting for this, mean to have it, even at the cost of a temporary breach of their party affiliations. Nova Scotia, Quebec, the Prairie Provinces are of the same mind. The sooner it is over the better.

BLACK HAND

BADLY WORSTED

Jeanette, Pa., July 15.—Upon the signal of the "Black Hand" to turn over money to its agent, George Laberto, the wholesale fruit merchant shot and killed Venet Ceciliano, an Italian barber, here today and immediately eight letters from the "Black Hand" demanding money of Laberto upon pain of death, were turned over to the police by Mrs. Laberto. Today Ceciliano entered Laberto's store and was starting a stogie when Laberto opened fire with an automatic revolver, from the rear of the establishment. The lighting of the stogie was the signal for Laberto to pay Ceciliano \$2,000. This signal was explained to Laberto in a letter he received after his barns were burned down and several horses destroyed. The first shot struck Ceciliano in the face and he fell to the floor, three more shots struck him in the breast and legs. The fifth shot carried away a little finger on the hand of Laberto's daughter who stood in line of the firing. Ceciliano was taken to a hospital where he died and Laberto has escaped.

BISHOP BOWMAN NEARS 95th MILESTONE

East Orange, N. J., July 14.—Right Rev. Dr. Thomas Bowman, the senior bishop of the Methodist Church, will quietly observe his ninety-fourth birthday anniversary tomorrow at his home in this place.

THE ANGLO-JAPANESE TREATY

London, July 15.—The existing treaty of commerce and navigation between Great Britain and Japan will expire by limitation tomorrow and will be replaced on the following day by the treaty which was signed in London last April after long negotiations. The new treaty removes the opposition of British merchants to the recently adopted Japanese tariff, which heavily increased the duty on British manufactures, as under the new pact Japan reductions varying from 12 to 30 per cent. upon a large number of British imports.

MACCABEES OF THE WORLD

Cleveland, O., July 17.—"Maccabee Week," or the quadrennial meeting of the supreme tent of the Knights of the Maccabees of the World, began today with an attendance of thousands of members of the order from many parts of the United States and Canada. It is the first time in the history of the order that its supreme law-making body has met outside of Michigan, the executive offices of the organization being situated in Detroit, and it has been planned to make it the greatest gathering ever held by the order. A class of 2,500 members will be initiated, and 25,000 Maccabees will participate in the parade.

The reports to be presented to the convention by the supreme officers show the order to be in a highly flourishing condition, both numerically and financially. Organizations now exist in sixty States, Territories and Provinces, the total membership approximating 300,000, with over

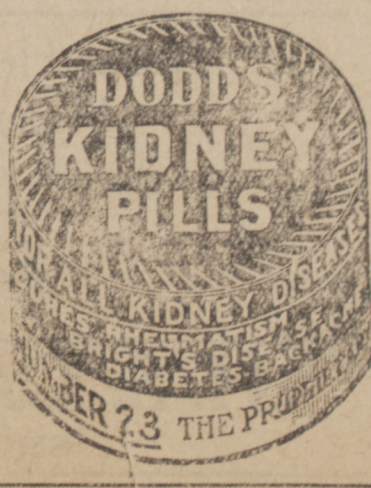

TELEGRAPH DISPUTE WAS COMPROMISED

Ottawa, Ont., July 15.—The unanimous finding by the Board of Conciliation on the dispute between the G. N. W. and its telegraphers has been received by the labor department and is largely the nature of a compromise. During the airing of the case the company increased its salaries and the increase is confirmed in the board's decision with slight further increases. Employees who had been dismissed because they alleged they were union men have been reinstated with a few exceptions where there were other complaints against certain men.

The report is signed by Judge Teetzell, chairman; David Campbell for the men and W. H. Markey, K. C. for the company.
