PASSED AWAY AT
HANLEY, SASK.

Succumbed to Paralysis While Visiting His Brother-in-law—Body to be Brought East for Burial

Mr. Albert E. Everett whose serious illness from paralysis at Hanley Sask., has several times been referred to in these columns, passed away at ten o'clock on Saturday night. The sad news was contained in a telegram received this morning by Mr. Frank L. Cooper and created but little surprise as word had formerly been received that all hope for recovery had been abandoned. The body will be brought east for burial and will reach here the latter part of the week.

Mr. Everett went on a trip to the west and was looking over the ground with a view of locating. He had been in Vancouver and other coast cities but when stricken down was visiting his brother-in-law Dr. J. G. MacNeill M.L.A., at Hanley, Sask. The news of his death was learned here with very great regret.

The deceased was born at Kingsclear forty-eight years ago. His father was the late Benjamin A. Everett, who was well known in this city where he resided for a number of years prior to his death. Mr. Everett spent several years in the west when a young man and for a time made his home in Boston. In 1892 he returned to Fredericton and leased Long's Hotel which he conducted with considerable success for a period of three years. In 1896 he acquired the Brown lot on the corner of Brunswick and Westmorland Streets and erected thereon the large hotel known as Windsor Hall, which was opened for business the following year. He conducted this hostelry for twelve years, but the venture not proving a profitable one, he retired from the management two years ago and took up his residence at Kingsclear. He had lived in the west and engaged in the insurance business.

Mr. Everett always took an active interest in civic affairs, and for one term represented St. Ann's Ward in the city council. He was a man of kindly disposition and was possessed of many excellent qualities which won for him the respect of all who knew him. There is no doubt that business troubles weighed heavily upon his mind and were in a large measure responsible for his untimely death.

He is survived by a sorrowing widow, a daughter of Mr. John A. Campbell, ex-M. P. of Kingsclear, one brother and five sisters. The latter are Mr. Ernest Everett of St. Louis, Mo., Mrs. Fred Burpee of Jacksonville, Carleton County, Mrs. J. H. Latham of Winthrop, Mass., Mrs. (Rev.) D. Rand Pierce of Lowell, Mrs. Ward Burpee of Vancouver and Miss Caroline S. Everett of Boston.

WORK ON NEW TAVRIA

PAVEMENT BEGUN TODAY

Work preparatory to laying Tavia pavement on Queen street between York and Carleton streets, was begun this morning. That portion of the street between York street and Wilmot's Alley has been fenced off and a crew of men and the steam-roller are engaged in removing the old macadam. When the foundation is sufficiently prepared the courses of crushed stone and tar will be laid.

When this block is completed Queen street from Westmorland to St. John will be entirely paved with Tavia and Hassam pavements. A portion of York street will also probably be paved this summer but it is now considered improbable that any great amount of pavement will be laid on that street as it is thought advisable to let the earth settle well in the trench which is being dug for the new surface-sewer before pavement is laid over it. It is possible however, that pavement will be laid on another street.

TEACHERS' COURSE
AT NO. 3 REGT. DEPOT
BEGINS TOMORROW

Forty Five Teachers to take Course Which Will Last Four Weeks--Qualifications Necessary

The course for school teachers at No. 3 Regimental Depot in this city opens tomorrow and will continue for four weeks. Forty-five teachers have been accepted by the department to take the courses in physical and military training. Last year the class which took similar courses numbered fifty and the training over six weeks. The cutting down of size of the class and the length of time this year is on account of the appropriation in the Militia Estimates not being as large as was expected.

QUALIFICATION NECESSARY

According to the regulations of the Militia Department all teachers must be qualified as instructors in physical training the qualification to be obtained within four years of the date of publication of the regulation 1910. Upwards of one hundred applications from those desirous of taking the course were received this year, the teachers being eager to embrace the opportunity.
