CONSERVATIVES INCREASE MAJORITY IN THIS COUNTY

O. S. Crocket Received Majority at all but few Polls--Resources of Civilization Used

The election in York yesterday resulted in the return of Mr. O. S. Crocket, the Conservative Candidate by an increased majority. The result was not unexpected as the Conservatives were well supplied with "resources of civilization" while the opponents went into the fight without such valuable aid. The result of the election is a good indication of the value the "resources of civilization" possess.

In Fredericton the contest was close Dr. Atherton the Liberal candidate winning at No. 2 poll, the Court House by 31, but at the City Hall Mr. Crocket's majority was sufficient to overcome that and give him a majority of 44 in the whole city. In the other parts of the county the Conservative candidate ran well receiving substantial majorities at all but two or three of the smaller polls.

CONSERVATIVES CELEBRATE

The successful candidate arrived in the city from Harvey last night by auto and was given a most enthusiastic reception by his friends and supporters. He made a short speech and was escorted to his home by a crowd of several hundred people headed by 71st Regt. Band. The Conservative victory was celebrated in very noisy fashion about the city until an early hour this morning.

LARGE VOTE CAST

A large vote was cast not only in Fredericton but also all over the county. Out of upward of 1,800 eligible voters in Fredericton about 1,300 exercised their franchise and in the county out of about 8,000 eligible voters more than 6,000 cast their ballots.

MOTION FOR REVIEWING INTERESTING JUDGMENT

The Supreme Court met at 2.23 this afternoon to deliver judgments in several cases. The full court is present. Judgments are to be delivered in two cases arising from the winding up of the Nepisiquit Lumber Company and in two Scott Act cases. A common motion of considerable interest is to be made this afternoon. The motion will be to revive a judgment in favor of the late George F. Gregory against James H. Crocket. The judgment was obtained in 1891 and was for \$4,000. This amount has never been paid and steps are being taken to prevent the judgment running out. It will be twenty years within a few weeks since the judgment was given. Gregory & Winslow are acting for the estate of the late Judge Gregory in the matter.

LARGE ATTENDANCE AT EXHIBITION YESTERDAY

Turnstiles Recorded 6,135 Paid Admissions--Immense Crowd Received Election Returns at the Fair Grounds--Exhibition Officials Gratified by Attendance Figures to Date

The registered attendance at the Fredericton Exhibition yesterday was 6,135 a figure a few hundred less than that for the corresponding day of 1909 but which never the less was remarkable, the day being that of the general Dominion elections. The fact that the Liberal Committee in Fredericton had placed its telegraph service at the disposal of the Exhibition management for the announcement of the exhibition returns on the grounds attracted thousands of people there in the evening. Two services were available, the Western Union and the C. P. R. The returns were thrown by stereopticon on a screen placed on the west side of the Main building. In addition to the returns pictures of the two leaders, Mr. R. L. Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier together with those of other candidates were shown. The crowd which filled the open space on the west side of the building was very evenly divided in its sympathies and cheered impartially as the returns came in.

FINE WEATHER

The exhibition was favored with the finest weather since the opening of the fair and that helped the attendance. The usual music was furnished during the day by the St. John Pipe Band, Houlton Boys' Band and 71st. Regt. Band. The performances in the Amusement Hall were attended and the outside attractions were largely patronized. The judging of the various exhibits was continued and pretty well completed. 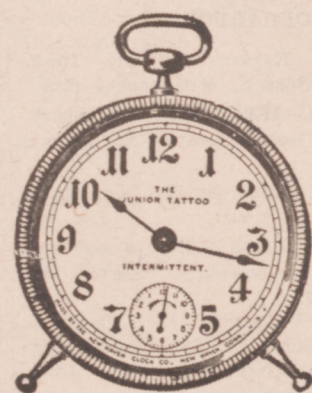

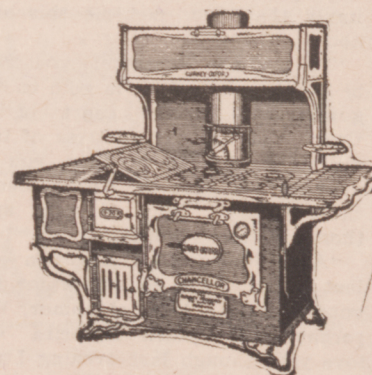
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
