BARROW SAYS EASTERN LEAGUE IS STRONG AS EVER

Montreal Club's Franchise not to be Transferred—Finances of League are not Unsound

Toronto, Nov. 15.—Edward Barrow, president of the Eastern League, takes violent exception to the stories emanating from Newark to the effect that the organization is tottering financially, and that several magnates have placed their clubs on the market. Barrow, in his denial of the reported existing conditions, admits that two or three club owners might dispense with their franchises, but that these franchises have been sought and are not being peddled.

"Any club in existence can be bought if the amount of money wanted by the owners of the franchise is paid over," says Mr. Barrow.

He insists that his league is on a firm foundation and that some one of a creative turn of mind has been issuing these harmful stories to injure the Eastern League. As regards the transfer of the Montreal Club, Barrow said that the Montreal Club is not, and will not be, for sale; also that the Montreal club will be in the Eastern League next season.

"It has been reported that the Jersey City owners were desirous of selling their stock. If James T. Lillis wants to get rid of the stock his father owns in the Jersey City club he does not have to seek a buyer, for I can get a purchaser within twenty-four hours," said Mr. Barrow.

JIM FERGIE KNOCKED OUT BY MCINTYRE

Sydney, C. B., Nov. 14.—Mickey McIntyre knocked out Jim Fergie, who claims the lightweight championship of Scotland, in the sixth round of a 10-round bout here tonight.

Fergie made a good showing in the first round, but was not in condition to stand the pace, and it was only a question of how long he would last after the second round. Fergie was about 10 pounds overweight. The general opinion here is that he can make all the men in his class go some. Fergie has boxed a draw with Matt Wells.

ANDY MORRIS NOT 'IN IT' WITH ROSS

Pittsburg, Nov. 14.—Tony Ross, the heavyweight Italian from Newcastle, put it all over Andy Morris, the New England aspirant for "white hope" honors, in a six-round contest here tonight. Morris was outclassed from the opening of the first round until the close of the fifth, receiving punishment which would have put a weaker man out of business. Ross playing hard and effectively for the body at all stages. He also landed frequently on Morris' face with telling effect.

While Morris landed often, he did not seem to inflict any painful punishment, and Ross was continually grinning. Some of the New Englander's blows landed on Ross's face, and at the close of the contest the New Englander was bleeding profusely from cuts on the cheeks and forehead.

Ross should have won in four rounds, but his lack of generalship and failure to take advantage of openings made it possible for his adversary to stay the limit.

The sixth round Morris came back strong, and it was the opinion of the spectators that had the contest gone to 10 or 15 rounds he would have gained the decision. The distance was just a trifle too short for him.

FIFTY CLUBS WANT TO ENTER BASKETBALL LEAGUE

Toronto Man Behind New Organization --Principal Cities of Central Canada are Included

(Toronto Globe.)

Dr. Peacock, manager of the Central Y.M.C.A. senior team, champions of Canada, is progressing quietly with the organization of his basketball league, to embrace all of the important centres of the game in the Dominion. Fifty clubs have already asked for places in the league, in which there will be three series—senior, intermediate and junior. The latest applicants for membership are Fort William, Port Arthur and Sault Ste. Marie, but these cities are so far distant that they will not likely be included on account of the travelling expenses which would be incurred. Montreal Y.M.C.A. is thoroughly in accord with Dr. Peacock's scheme, it will not have a team this season. Ottawa has entered two teams, and Montreal A.A.A. will have one if the test mounts, or other Montreal organizations make an entry. Most of the larger towns and cities in Ontario will be represented.

MEETING FRIDAY TO ORGANIZE MARITIME HOCKEY LEAGUE

Moncton, Nov. 15.—An interprovincial professional hockey league seems assured. A meeting to organize is called at the Learmont Hotel, Truro, for Friday night. A. E. Holstead, manager of the Moncton rink, will represent Moncton at the meeting, and will enter a team. It is also understood that the Moncton man will leave in a few days for Upper Canada in search of players for the Moncton team.

CARL MORRIS MATCHED WITH CON COMISKY

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 15.—Chicago promoters have matched Carl Morris of Oklahoma, and Con Comisky of Chicago, and the fight will take place in Kansas City on Nov. 28th.

Morris has not agreed to all the terms of the articles, but he is expected to sign shortly.

This will make each boxer do some close figuring, lest the other fellow has a big advantage in weight going into the ring. Some boxers gain more weight after weighing in than other boxers, so that when making the match the weight to be at such a low figure when the weighing is done, that the gain made in the 27 hours will not give any of them an advantage going in the ring. Boxers agreeing on catchweights will not have to weigh in.

Mike Gibbons, the Western welterweight, and Willie Lewis are slated for a bout in New York in a couple of weeks.

Promoter McIntosh of Australia is making more flattering offers to Frank Liaus to go to the Antipodes. McIntosh offers him five bouts. Paris promoter is also offering Klaus to box in the French city.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate.
