**TO RESUME LORIMER QUIZ**  
 Chicago, Ill., Oct. 9.—The member of the Senate committee appointed to inquire into the elected of Senator Lorimer of Illinois have rounded up here preparatory to resuming their investigation, which was broken off at the adjournment of Congress this summer. The committee expects to get down to work tomorrow morning. The court room of Judge Geoscupin the Federal building will be used as the place of hearing. The number of witnesses to be heard is much larger than during the original sessions in Washington. Investigators have scoured Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan and have summoned scores of persons who are supposed to have more or less personal knowledge of some of the circumstances attending the election of the Illinois senator.

It was tried at the June term of the court, before the Judge and jury, but the jury failed to agree and the case was again brought down to trial at the present term of the court and after three days hearing resulted as above stated. The court then adjourned till Tuesday, October 31st when the only case on the jury docket and the remaining non-jury cases will be disposed of.

**TORIES OF TORONTO ARE FEELING SORE**  
 Toronto, Oct. 9.—Toronto Conservatives are up in arms against the suggestion that Mr. W. T. White, manager of the National Trust Co., shall be given a portfolio in the new Borden cabinet. Protests have been sent to Hon. R. L. Borden by members of the Central Executive, and by individuals who assert that those who have fought the battles of Toryism during the days of bitter disappointment, are likely to be forgotten in the days of victory, made possible by the assistance of certain disgruntled Liberals.

Among those who telegraphed to the new premier, stating in plain English the views of representative Conservatives in Toronto, was Thomas Hook, president of the Ward 3 Conservative Association. He admits that a telegram was sent, and that there is considerable dissatisfaction among the workers of the party in the city.  
 Mr. Hook said:  
 "The whole town will be up in revolution if Mr. Borden appoints a man who has been a Liberal all his life and who is a representative of the Trusts, to a place in the cabinet. I know what is the feeling of my Association."  
 Knowing this, Mr. Hook sent a telegram of about 150 words, setting forth in the plainest terms the feeling of the Conservatives of the City of Toronto. He pointed out that the fight during the days of repeated defeat had been made by those who had everything to lose and little to gain by remaining faithful to the party, but that when the day of victory came, these steady supporters of Conservative policy had been in danger of being overlooked, and that new allies, whose own interests commanded their allegiance, had suddenly secured a commanding position in the consideration of the make-up of the cabinet.

To this, Mr. Borden sent a reply which was anything but satisfactory to the recipient. It was polite and evidently intended to be diplomatic, but it did not give the absolute assurance of return for past services which was required.

Havana, Oct. 10.—The forty-third anniversary of the beginning of the great struggle for Cuba's independence, which lasted from 1868 to 1878, was generally observed throughout the republic as a holiday, today. The patriotic exercises were mostly confined to larger cities, where the day was observed by the closing of all public offices and the profuse display of the national flag.

**ANOTHER BATTLESHIP SUCCESSFULLY LAUNCHED**  
 Portsmouth, Eng., Oct. 9.—Great Britain's largest and best armored battleship, King George V, was launched successfully today. The warship was christened by His Majesty's aunt, Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein. The King George V had been on the stocks two weeks less than the average dreadnought, having been laid down on January 16 last.
