Montreal, Dec. 1.—Mayor Guerin yesterday issued a proclamation calling on the citizens of Montreal to observe December 12th as a public holiday, and to decorate their buildings in honor of the first official visit to this city of the Duke and Duchess of Connaught.

AMERICAN WEDDING IN COPENHAGEN

Washington, Dec. 2.—Official society here read with interest of the wedding of Miss Carmel Egan and Gabriel O'Reilly, which according to the cable despatches was celebrated this morning in the Cathedral of St. Aungar in Copenhagen. Both of the contracting parties are well known in Washington. The bride is the daughter of Maurice Francis Egan, for many years a member of the faculty of the Catholic University here, and now the United States minister to Denmark. Mr. O'Reilly, the bridegroom is one of the officials of the insular government in the Philippines. He is a native of North Dakota and was practicing law in Minneapolis when the war with Spain began. He went to the Philippines with the Minnesota regiment and remained in Manila when peace came. He was made superintendent of the public schools of the island and later was given charge of the government department created to promote the native Filipino industries.

TEACHERS MEET IN EVANSVILLE

Evansville, Ind., Dec. 1.—More than 1,000 teachers are attending the annual convention of the Southern Indiana Teachers' Association, which began a two days' session in this city today with W. P. Reavis of Oakland City, presiding. Among the well-known educators who are here to address the convention are President Robert L. Kelley of Earlham College, President Francis J. McConnell of DePaul University, and Stanley Krebs of Swarthmore College.

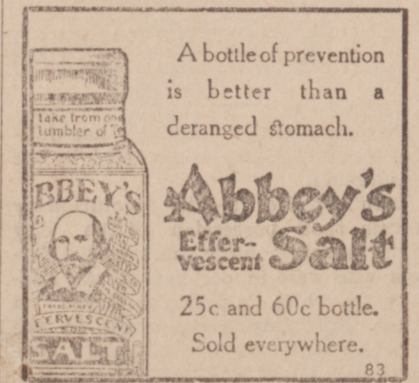
TO START CAMPAIGN AGAINST MONTREAL SLUMS

Montreal, Que., Dec. 1.—Mayor Guerin has called a meeting of citizens next Tuesday to consider the project of establishing here, a system of model houses for the working classes. This movement has made notable progress in England during the last decade, and it is believed that the moment is opportune to do something to start a campaign against the slum, which is slowly but surely, getting a footing in Montreal.

INTERNATIONAL LIVE STOCK SHOW

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 2.—The offer of \$100,000 in premiums has attracted a record-breaking display of champion animals from the United States, Canada and Mexico to the annual international live stock exposition, which opened in the Dexter pavilion at the stockyards today and will continue for one week. Canada is particularly well represented at the exposition this year and will compete against a large assortment of highly bred stock from all the cattle raising districts of the United States.

In addition to the usual display of cattle, horses, swine and sheep, the management has provided for a number of special features. The students judging contest will be conducted on a broader scale than ever before and will be participated in by representatives of many of the leading agricultural colleges of the United States and Canada. A competitive test among shepherd dogs is one of the entirely new features. Another feature is the display of a dozen yearling sheep, bred and owned by the United States Department of Agriculture. This will be the first opportunity shepherds have had to observe the progress of the experiment in breeding range sheep started by the department five years ago, and still in progress at Laramie, Wyo.



NOVEL PROPOSAL RE "RED LIGHT" DISTRICT

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 30.—As the result of the renewed civic agitation as to what shall be done with Winnipeg's red light district, the candidates now standing for civic officer have agreed that a plebiscite should be taken and the ward giving the largest majority in favor of retaining the district, shall have the red light district within its precincts.
