London, Dec. 23.—The Lusitania, the Christmas ship from New York, landed yesterday in time not only for her mail to be distributed all over the United Kingdom, but even to reach the continent in time for the holiday.

For more than two hours the railroad porters at Paddington Station were struggling with the luggage of her passengers who disembarked at Fishguard. Three special boat trains were found necessary. The number landing, 720, beat the record, and was considerably greater than the list of the Christmas boat last year, the Mauretania, which brought 94.





BIG LIQUOR SEIZURE

NEAR MONTREAL

Montreal, Dec. 23.—Ste. Agathe des Monts, the famous Laurentian resort was yesterday the scene of unwonted disturbance and riot, when a descent was made by police of the Thiel Detective Agency of Montreal, upon number of places where liquor was being illegally sold. This action, which was at the instigation of the provincial government, created a good deal of opposition and the detectives after making raids which resulted in gathering up 250 packages of liquor, worth \$2,000 were followed down to the railway station by a crowd and as they boarded the train, one menaced them with a revolver, for which act he was taken into custody and brought down to Montreal. 250 packages of liquor worth about \$2,000 were seized.
